Bart introduced Anne Stang as the speaker for this meeting.

Anne was born in Macklin and raised on a farm near Primate Saskatchewan. She attended the Universities of Saskatchewan, Alberta and Western in Ontario

completing degrees in Education and Library Science.

She has been the president of the Calgary Chapter of the American Historical Society of Germans from Russia since 2011.

Anne traced her ancestors from Germany to Russia to Canada with a few stops in between. The group maintained the Germany language to this day and she is still proficient in German.



President Dale thanked Anne in the usual manner.

Coronal Jim Hennessay (Ret), a member of the Heritage Club, introduced Major Chris Hunt as the speaker for the day. Major Hunt served in Kosavo and in Afghanistan and is now retired from the regular army and working for the Provincial Government. He was very involved with the 500 reservists who worked here during the big flood and will be taking over the reserve group here in Calgary.

In WW II the Regiment landed at Dieppe with 29 tanks but their commander drowned in one of the tanks as they tried to make land. In spite of this loss and others, 15 tanks did make it across the seawall. Sadly, 15 of the men were killed and 157 were taken prisoner by the Germans. The Regiment did reform and successfully landed in Sicily in 1943.

At the present time, there are 68,000 active servicemen and women and 27,000 reservists.

During WW I, 625,000 Canadians served with 61,000 killed and 154,000 wounded. The odds were that 1 in 3 would be killed or wounded — not good odds. During WW II, 1.1 million men and women served and the odds for survival were better than during the WW I conflict as it was a much more mechanized war. In the Korean War, 27,000 served and 516 were killed. In Peacekeeping over the years 125,000 served with 125 being killed. In Afghanistan from 2001-2014 158

were killed and 2000 wounded in total for the Canadian military. There were 42 from Major Hunt's Regiment who served in this war and Corporal Nathan Hornburg was killed in action.

On a happier note, it was announced that the meeting would result in over \$7,000 for the Veterans Food Bank.

District Governor Martin Harvey recounted a very personal story of visiting his grandfather's grave in France with his 90year-old father, who was only three years old when his father went off to war never to return.

As a symbol for the Calgary Women's Emergency Shelter, the tulip denotes the many Calgarians who push through the darkness of family violence and abuse trusting that, with a little support, they too will bloom again in lives free from abuse.

Rotary Curling League of Calgary

Rotary is an international organization of people who come together to create positive, lasting change in our communities and around the world. Locally, there are 12 clubs in Calgary.

The Rotary Curling League of Calgary has been supporting our agency for the past 17 years. The league was formed from the popularity of the sport in Calgary amongst Rotarians. Members from different clubs would meet once a week. After curling, members would join together in fellowship and for many years different members would bring a small item to raffle. Eventually the league stopped the weekly raffle draws and decided to have a larger one at their annual holiday dinner and have a local charity benefit from the proceeds.

Tammy Truman, one of the league members, says that the Calgary Women's Emergency Shelter was the first name to come to mind when deciding on which charity to support. Realizing that the holidays can be an especially stressful time for many people in our community, especially those fleeing violence, the league wanted to support an organization that makes a difference year round and one that would especially be in need of support during the holiday season.

"Being with family for so many of us, feels safe. Our hope is that someday everyone can feel that way, but have a safe place to go if that is not happening. We believe that everyone should have a chance to bloom," says Tammy.

We want to extend our gratitude to the members of the Rotary Curling League of Calgary for their contribution in supporting our mission to end family violence and abuse in our community.


