# Calgary Heritage Authority Josh Traptow, Executive Director

Bart Dailley introduced our speaker, Josh Traptow, who is the Executive Director of the Calgary Heritage Authority (CHA).

The mandate of the CHA is to advise Calgary City Council on all matters relating to heritage resources in Calgary, to evaluate potential heritage sites, to maintain an inventory of Evaluated Historic Resources, and finally, to promote public awareness of Calgary's Heritage. The Board is composed of 10 to 12 electors, one of which can be a member of Council and one a member of the Legislative Assembly.

The Inventory of Evaluated Historic Resources is a list of sites that have been evaluated by the CHA according to the Council-approved policy. Preservation of these sites is considered to be to the greater benefit of Calgarians.



Some of the sites on the inventory are legally protected by the Province of Alberta as designated Provincial Historic Resources or by the City as Municipal Historic Resources under the Alberta Historical Resources Act. Unless a site has been legally protected as a designated Historic Resource, the normal land use and development conditions apply, including the ability to alter or demolish.

There are over 800 sites on the inventory at present, with 20 to 30 more added each year. the sites have to meet a number of criteria to be selected contid on page 3 ....



Peter Bickham, a self described twominute man, advised us on the Cribbage Windup event on April 14th (prizes, trophies etc). Peter also informed us that International Service and Youth Service had linked up and made a joint presentation to our Henry Wisewood Interact group, resulting in them providing two scholarships to the girls' group we support.



lan Burgess then took the podium and gave us a "short" history on Paul Harris' birthday (February 23rd) and on Polio Plus —



from the Polio epidemic in Manitoba (1952/53), the Salk injection vaccine in 1955, and the Sabin oral vaccine in 1960 to the present — from 350,000 annual polio cases in 1955 to 2 cases so far in 2018. Ian feels that polio will soon be defeated, and it is time to begin finding a new target. Polio has almost been defeated not just by the money that Rotary and our partners have raised, but by Rotary being involved. Rotary brought a network of skilled and connected manpower that overcame logistical barriers, and as a "non-political" group, connected locally and overcame resistance to "Immunization Days" in countries suspicious of motives. Polio Plus efforts have not only been good for the world, but they have brought Rotary together worldwide in a way that only such a monumental project can. Looking forward, Ian would like Rotary to now focus on Influenza. New modern vaccines need to be developed to address over 6 million deaths per year. What is needed is a group like Rotary to champion this effort.

Phew, I did not know I needed to bring two guest speaker certificates!

Minute People continued with **Dave Wylie** seeking hosts for the Rotary Friendship Exchange members from South Africa and Peru in early July (talk to him and Jim Hennessey if you can do this).

The CHA also handles "The Lions" awards. This biannual award recognizes individuals and organizations who have undertaken initiatives, of any scale, in support of heritage conservation in Calgary. They also have a Plaques program putting up plaques on

sites to inform Calgarians about the historical significance of both protected and unprotected heritage sites. They work with owners in a number of cases to help establish uses for sites so they remain active, not vacant.
