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ShelterBox Canada Dale Perret

George Kimura introduced our first speaker, member Dale Perret who is an ambassador for ShelterBox Canada. ShelterBox is dedicated to ensuring no family is left without shelter after a natural disaster or conflict. It began in 2000 and has provided shelter for more than 1 million people. It is partnered with Rotary International and the main concentration is centered in Malawi where 2.5 million people have been displaced, and 900 thousand have been affected by environmental disasters.



ShelterBox Canada is also working in Nigeria where a fire destroyed 10,000 dwellings, in Cameron where tents have been provided, and in Syria where tents were provided in relief camps.

My Life in Broadcasting Bart Dailley

George Kimura introduced our second speaker, member Bart Dailley, mentioning some highlights of his story: born in Toronto, tried to become a baseball player/umpire, got into radio starting at CJFS, started at CHQR in 1976, became a Calgary Flames broadcaster. Bart joined Rotary in 1992. He has three kids and five grandchildren.

Bart's Story:

He played every sport there was growing up, and excelled at baseball, but was never able to turn it into a career. He started as a Floor Trader at the TSE, and was paid \$39 per week, so he augmented his income by acting as a bookie, but the TSE took a dim view of this, so his career moved on.

Bart Dailley introduced our club member Dr. Syed Ahmed, Au.D, M.Sc., M.B.B.S. Dr. Ahmed graduated from Dow Medical University, Karachi, Pakistan in 1980. He completed further education at Washington University, MO and A.T. Still University, AZ in the USA. Dr.

Ahmed works through his business, Amplifon Rockyview Hearing Clinic as a Doctor of Audiology and an Education Consultant.










Rotary Athletic Park of Olds

He chose to become a sports broadcaster, and started in Nova Scotia. His real surname is "Warburton" but that turned out to be a name that never worked on radio. He then moved on to his mother's maiden name of Kelly for awhile, but when he moved west to Rosetown Saskatchewan, the anchorman was also named Kelly, so Bart had to change his name. He became Bart Dailley, a made-up name as he was on the radio every day. Bart met his beautiful wife, Barbara, in Rosetown Saskatchewan.

He came to Calgary as a sportscaster. Of his career in broadcasting, Bart noted that a job as sportscaster is not highly paid. The most he ever made as a sportscaster was \$36,000 per year. The offset to this was that he got to meet great people. He was the broadcaster for the Flames' games in their first year.

Short story: Bart went into the Stanley Cup Champion Montreal Canadiens' dressing room, and sees general dressing room hijinks, and a player 'stinging' another player with his towel, and thinks to himself "these are champions!?" when Bob Hope walks in right behind him. Guy Lapointe says to Guy Lafleur in a 'stage' whisper: Bob Hope has never seen a hockey game in his life, Bob Hope then told the room, in a very loud voice, right by Bart's ear, that he was a New York Rangers fan, and proceeded to ream off stats on the players on that team to prove it!

Celebrities whom Bart has met are many, including for example, Stompin' Tom Connors, Loretta Lynn ,and Fergie Jenkins, to name just a few.

The second most important day in Bart's life was in August 1981, just after he lost his job as the Flames play-by-play man. Evangelist Billy Graham came to town and Bart made Jesus Christ his Lord and his Saviour, and this would not have happened but for his losing his job as a play by play man! Today Bart continues this legacy of salvation as a preacher of the Gospel.

It was in Scotland that he met and became fast friends with Henry and Janet Popoff.

Crazy oil patch pressures convinced Pat to return to farming. However after 2 years of farming, impatience beckoned him back to the oil scene. In 1978, along with a partner, he started a gas well testing company, and along with NEB slumps and a further stint with Baker Oil Tools in Scotland, Pat retired from his last partnership back in Calgary in 2013.

It was under Henry's influence that Pat joined the Chinook Rotary Club in June 2018.
