## "It's a Crime Not to Read"

## Ellen Humphrey, President & CEO, Calgary Public Library Fdn

Ellen started her presentation by asking all who did not currently have a library card to raise their hand. She then had Constable Young go around and hand out a card to everyone. She asked these folks to simply go to their closest library and set up an account using their new card.



She advised that the Library Foundation raises money for all libraries to expand their reach. The Government provides sufficient funding to cover the basics ... the real estate, the books and the staff ... leaving the foundation to raise funds for their other initiatives.



She provided a little history, crediting Calgary's first library to Annie Davidson, a widowed mother of 10 who established Calgary's first book club. She wrote to Andrew Carnegie seeking funding for our first library, resulting in its construction and opening on January 2nd, 1912. Jumping to the present, our newest central library recently opened and had over 122,000 people visiting the site in the first four days. Ellen advises further that statistics show that 18,000 Calgarians visit one of Calgary's 20 libraries every day. Our libraries are popular with seniors, the young, new immigrants and young families. A new library is scheduled for opening on January 15th in Seton.

The new Central Library is 245,000 sq. ft., a multi level facility with lots of windows and natural light. It is a cornerstone of East Village and a catalyst for further development. It has been designed to be a public place so visitors will feel like they belong there. They believe that literacy begins with the very young and that libraries must be kid friendly. Libraries should get children ready for school as well as support their learning as they progress.

With regard to "It's a Crime Not to Read", it is a program which pairs police officers with kids in high needs areas at the grade three level. The officers read to the children, both at their schools or at the library, which builds a good relationship with the Schools and the Community. Approximately 1,600 kids have gone through the program during the past year. The initial idea, which led ultimately to the development of this program, actually came from the Rotary Club of Calgary East. There are currently 22 schools in Calgary participating in this program. Constable Young works through the Fish Creek Library and reads to children approximately 1.5 hours per month. The Calgary Board of Education selects the specific schools which participate based on which they believe would benefit the most. This program builds positive relationships with the Police Service as well as promoting reading as an important skill for childhood development.

The Calgary Public Library Foundation has a goal of raising \$350 million (\$75 million from private sources, of which \$42 million has been raised). Currently 3,300 volunteers provide service through the library system. Ellen wrapped up by thanking Rotarians for their support and for their hospitality.

Join our movement to reach **Every Girl. Everywhere. Period."** 


