Some frightening statistics

- 1.4 billion people in the world have some form of disability
- 5.3 million people = 16% of Canadians have a disability
- 1 in 7 people currently in Calgary, and in 5 years it will be 1 in 5
- 7% of Calgary youth between 15 to 24 years have a disability and it is the fastest growing group



Vecova is planning for the future, not the here and now, by building a new and larger centre on the same site they have now. This centre will support people from the age of 16 to the end of life. The Centre will employ people with disabilities and provide wellness services, employment and enterprise, living support services, social research



and innovations. The partners in this enterprise are the community sector, Calgary Airport, and Rockyview School District.
