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### **Wildlife in Calgary Parks** Chris Manderson, Calgary Parks



Bart Dailley introduced our speaker, Chris Manderson, who is the Urban Conservation Lead at Calgary Parks. He joined Calgary Parks in 1998. As Lead he is responsible for managing urban ecosystems, integrated pest management, and habitat restoration.

Chris' talk went into the Calgary ecosystem and its changing nature. He discussed landscapes then and now, and that wildlife, initially displaced, had now come to terms with and had figured out "life in the city". Major parks in the city cover 4,500 hectares out of the 8,500 hectare city park system.

He went on to talk about the Biodiversity Strategic Plan (2015) and the need for habitat connectivity.

Not all species are tolerant of change that urbanization creates. The Pin Tail Duck and Burrowing Owl are gone from the Calgary landscape. Other species such as the Jack Rabbit, feral rabbits (ex pets) and racoons have all adapted well.



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### Tsuut'ina Police Force Keith Blake, Chief



Bart introduced our speaker, Chief Keith Blake. He was sworn in as the 5th Chief of Police for the Tsuut'ina Nation on May 16th, 2013. He had previously served 24 years in the RCMP at various locations around Alberta. He had first hand experience working in 7 different First Nations Communities over that period. Keith Blake then introduced Steve Burton and Brithany Quellette as valued members

of his service.

Chief Blake went on to describe the past, current and future of policing on the Tsuut'ina lands. In 2004 full police authorization was granted to his force. It had grown to 25 officers drawn locally and from various police forces across Alberta and Saskatchewan. There are currently 2,300 band members making this a very high level of policing, but it is in recognition of the changes the ring road and associated development will bring.



Of the officers, 8 are funded partially by Federal and Provincial ministries. The 16 others and support staff are funded by the Nation. Of the 25 officers, 25 are indigenous and there are 30% female officers.

He spoke of the changes that the major Taza Development will bring. It will require them to evolve from a rural to an urban focused force.

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# Wildlife in Calgary Parks

Species in the city are somewhat different than their rural counterparts. The Black Cap Chickadee has evolved a larger brain and more active, deeper voice. House Sparrows came from the middle east, but now are essentially only an urban bird in the cities of the world. The Magpie was not a city dweller but co-existed with the Bison. With the decline in the bison population, the Magpies almost disappeared, but then evolved by figuring out city life, and their population boomed.

Various predators now make their home in the city. Coyotes have been very successful both here and now spreading far from their original southwest USA home ground to virtually all of North America, and now venturing down into South America. They are a smart and adaptive urban dweller. We get occasional Black and Grizzly bears in the city, ones who have learned the "joy of dumpsters". Cougars are often spotted in Fish Creek Park. Bobcats are a more recent entry. Not being fond of snow like their Lynx cousins, they took their time expanding their range into Canada. Now they have found urban environments, they are settling in and expanding their population in Calgary.

Chris finished off with reminding us of the most dangerous animal in Calgary - Deer. With over 430 collisions per year, and an average cost of \$6,000 per incident, it costs the city and insurers over \$3.2 million per year.
