Ron May, the Club Representative for Interact, talked about how the program started during his presidency, championed first by Norm Moro and then by Barry Korpatnisky.



David Irving

David was a native of PEI. Following his agricultural upbringing and schooling at Prince of Wales Academy, he enrolled at the University of New of New Brunswick,



where he obtained a degree in Electrical Engineering in 1960. Following graduation, he joined Shawinigan Water and Power in Quebec, where he experienced several engineering roles. In 1965, he moved to Calgary and began his career with Transalta Utilities. In 1969, he transferred to Lethbridge as Division Manager. While there, he served his profession and community as President of The Lethbridge Rotary Club, President of APEGGA (professional engineers, geologists, geophysicists), Chairman of the Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors, as well as on boards of several other community organizations.

David, Margaret and their daughters Kimberley and Kelsey, returned to Calgary in 1993. He retired from Transalta in 1994. Back in Calgary, he joined the Rotary Club of Calgary (downtown), and transferred to the Chinook club in 2010.

David served as a dedicated and distinguished Rotarian in 3 clubs for close to 50 years. He will be dearly missed.


