

At the District Board Meeting on April 24th, we discussed the hardships, especially financial, that are being faced today by our Clubs and members that will continue beyond our fiscal year-end. A motion was passed to reduce the District net asset base for the purpose of an immediate special distribution of \$25 per active member and issued to Rotary and Rotaract Clubs, based on our March 31, 2020, membership. These net assets were created through the activities of Clubs and their members. We believe that each Club will be able to best determine the use of funds to support their Clubs and members.

We wish to have this distribution completed as soon as possible!

Did You Know?

Did You Know? We have had a number of interesting members over the years, and equally a number of incidents and activities.

For example, Carson Rockley was proposed as a Charter member but chose not to join. He later referred his son John Rockley to the club, and John was proposed and became an Active Member under the classification of Commercial Printing. John resigned several years later, and accepted proposal to Active Membership in the Calgary Rotary Club. In 1995 his son Spencer died while boating on Kootenay Lake. John had been a founder, in 1988, of the Willow Park GC Charity Classic. John never overcame the loss of Spencer, who was never found, and he later moved to Parksville BC, rejoining Rotary there. He passed away unexpectedly in 2016.

Dr Dave Chevalier, classification Chiropractic, one of the 3 new members introduced the night of April 12 1977, our celebration of becoming a new club, was another interesting short-term member. He literally went away on a holiday to Mexico a few months after being inducted, and drowned in the ocean while there. Years later we had correspondence from someone who was with him in Mexico, suggesting his death was not an accident! A file on that information remains in our records, nothing was ever resolved. It wasn't up to the club to start an investigation years after the incident. I suggested they take it up with Mexican authorities or the RCMP.

John Zaozirny, classification Law, was a charter member, serving as our first club Secretary. He was only with us a few years, when he became Minister of Natural Resources, in the Provincial Government.

Fred James, the CFL star with both the Calgary Stampeders and Edmonton Eskimos, was a member of our club, after his football career ended. Always very fit, I was surprised to see he had passed away in June 2016.

We have a large, almost filled plaque commemorating the passing of a number of our Active and Senior Active members who passed while still serving the club. We will feature some of those stories in future columns.



International Service

Sandy Swan has been developing a global grant to install **124 solar panels at Rancho de los Ninos, an Orphanage in Mazatlan, Mexico**. The panels will cost \$ 91,250 USD and achieve savings for the orphanage of at least \$ 500,000 over the subsequent 25 years. The funding for the project includes funds from Chinook and our host club in Mazatlan, a \$ 15,500 donation from a Rotarian couple that live in Carmel, Indiana, a Government of Canada grant, and a matching grant from the Rotary Foundation.

The Government of Canada has specified the type of projects they will sponsor, and a lot of effort can be spent to complete their application form and meet all their requirements. Sandy submitted her application to the TRFC grants committee for the Government of Canada grant on April 30. The grants committee approved the grant application for \$19,000 USD on May 1.

Syed Ahmed has been developing a global grant to carry out a **Hearing Assessment and Rehabilitation Project in Islamabad, Pakistan**. The project should run over two years and cost \$ 92,000 USD. The funding for this project includes funds from Chinook and our host club Rotary Club Islamabad Metropolitan, a Government of Canada grant, and a matching grant from the Rotary Foundation.

Syed submitted his application to the TRFC grants committee for the Government of Canada grant on April 30. The grants committee approved the grant application for \$ 22,340 USD on May 1.
