Bart replied he was correct, and that Tom is one of at least 10,000 who claimed to have been at the game even though the arena only had a 6,000 seating capacity! # **Calgary Board of Education** Christopher Usih, Chief Superintendent

Joe Hooper introduced Christopher Usih, the new Superintendent of Schools at the Calgary Board of Education. Mr. Usih has 28 years' experience as an educator, starting as a teacher in an indigenous community in Northern Manitoba and spending most of his career in diverse roles in the Toronto School District as teacher, principal, superintendent and executive. He is a champion of public education, is highly regarded for his commitment to equity, raising academic standards and addressing achievement and opportunity gaps using a responsive and collaborative approach.

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Mr. Usih offered his congratulations to Rotary for their commitment to humanitarian activities around the world.

He stated that the foundation of every advanced country is a strong public education system. Why public education? The alternative to public education is too expensive or does not exist for most families. With public education, the students must come first. Public education is committed to providing every child an education and opportunity to be successful regardless of handicaps, learning style or diverse background. Calgary has a diverse population of 125,000 school age youngsters, with 20% of Calgary's students born outside of Canada.

The challenges of the education system have changed. Gone are the days of preparing a student for a job that lasts for 30-40 years. Students cont'd on page 5 ...

We know that we can and we will eradicate polio globally, but how do we know In Afghanistan, 6.1 million children were able to receive the polio that? 5 Reasons ...

1. Poliovirus causes acute, non-persistent infections

The virus causes acute, short term infections, meaning that a person infected with polio can only transmit the virus for a limited amount of time, 1-2 weeks.

2. Virus is transmitted only by infectious people or their waste

Some diseases can be transmitted in a multitude of ways, which can make a disease an impossible candidate for eradication. But the poliovirus is typically transmitted just one way: through human waste.

Survival of virus in the environment is finite 3.

Did you know there's just one strain of wild poliovirus that continues to infect humans? (There used to be three strains of poliovirus that regularly infected humans.) The wild poliovirus cannot survive for long periods outside of the human body. If the virus cannot find an unvaccinated person to infect, it will die out. This is why we have to keep every single child vaccinated—so the virus cannot find any humans to infect.

#### People are the only reservoir 4.

Hundreds of diseases can be transmitted between insects, animals and humans. One of the things that makes polio eradicable is the fact that humans are the only reservoir.

Immunization with polio vaccine interrupts virus transmission 5. Not only are there two safe and effective polio vaccines, but vaccination against polio generates herd immunity, which increases the percentage of the population that is immune to the disease.

Mass campaigns using oral polio vaccine, where all children in a specified geographic area are immunized simultaneously, interrupts wild poliovirus circulation by boosting population immunity to the point that transmission of polio cannot be sustained.



vaccine in September 2019 thanks to the work of Rotary International and its partners. Afghanistan is one of only two countries that continue to report cases of wild poliovirus.

must be equipped with skills that allow them to succeed in a different and ever-changing world. Education is not just about preparing a student for University. There are many ways to success, such as apprenticeships. Public Education must support all pathways.

#### Questions raised:

• About location of new schools: Location of new schools include not only public input, but input from the City of Calgary planning departments so that schools locations are chosen not just for today's requirements but for the longer term.

• About class sizes: Public education must be prudent with public money. The Alberta Government has not yet set a budget for the current school year. In order to be prudent, the CBE has budgeted on the basis of no increases even though there is an increase in student enrollment of 2%. That does mean an increase in class size.

• About financial literacy programs: Yes, financial literacy is critical and is part of the public education curriculum.

• About the declining language, writing, communication and literacy skills seen with today's students: Stressed that literacy is the foundation of knowledge and must be addressed. However with today's changing world and technology these literacy skills may be different than those needed in the past.

Bart found that part of the routine for road games was meeting with the public address announcer for the home team to let him know the correct pronunciation of the players' names. The Boston PA announcer had a particular issue with how to announce "Pekka Rautakaillo". You had to be at the meeting to get this one!

Bart related how Mike Tyson commented that boxers weren't so tough. The real tough guys were hockey players. Bart then continued on to the boxing theme. Bart remembered a pre-fight press conference with Mohammad Ali. Ali's favourite saying was "I ain't afraid of him (or you)". At each press conference, Ali always looked around at the crowd to find a young boy he could invite up to the podium. When the lad got there, Ali put up his fists and said "I ain't afraid of you!" The boy was encouraged to put up his dukes and throw some punches at Ali, who would intentionally let him land a punch on his jaw. Ali then would drop the floor proclaiming the lad had a powerful punch.

Bart mentioned an event called the Cavalcade of Champions that used to pass through Calgary. One year the event poster proclaimed that among those appearing would be Ezzard Charles. Bart challenged the promoter who confirmed that Charles would indeed be there. Bart replied he couldn't wait to see this since Charles had died two years earlier.

Bart talked about how athletes were not the best people to interview — the best interviews were with the owners. One of his favourites was with Harold Ballard. In a game against Winnipeg on a Tuesday night, the Leafs were tied 4-4, when the Leafs' Laurie Boschman, a former first round draft pick and an upcoming Leaf player, was knocked down hard. He got up and skated away instead of standing up to his attacker. When asked about the incident after the game, Boschman commented that it was against his Christian faith to fight. Boschman was traded on Wednesday. Shortly after, Bart had the opportunity to interview Ballard and asked if he had really traded Boschman because of this faith. Ballard replied with "you're damned right I did", and then proceeded with quite the religious tirade.

Bart relayed two favourite memories from the Montreal Forum. One was the New Year's Eve game of 1975 — the Montreal Canadiens in a tie with the Russian Red Army, considered by many as one of the greatest hockey games of all time. The other was an interview with one of the most revered Montreal personalities, Roger Doucet, cherished singer of the Canadian national anthem for the Montreal Canadiens.

The final story I'll relate took place in Portland Oregon where Bart was on the road with the Calgary Cannons baseball team. The Portland Stadium was a 6 block walk from the players' hotel. On the way to one of the games, the players invited Bart to walk with them to the stadium. Unbeknownst to Bart, the walk took them through Portland's "stroll". The players had set Bart up. They had arranged for 20 or so Ladies to

welcome Bart back as he made his way along the street!

Those of you who did not make it to the meeting missed a classic and thoroughly entertaining performance from Bart. Thank you Bart Dailley!
