A ROTARY LIFE Ashley Morrison, Former Exchange Student

Director of New Generations, formerly referred to as Vocational and youth exchange, Fran Hochhausen, introduced Ashley Morrison, 21, Chinook Rotary's exchange student to Thailand during the Rotary Year 2008-2009.

Ashley is the granddaughter of Danny Holden, a former member of the club who passed suddenly a few years ago.

Ashley's personal commitment to Rotary and what it stands for was infectious throughout her Rotary story. Her journey with Rotary began in 2008 when she was selected by Chinook's youth exchange committee to be our ambassador to Thailand, which she described as a life-changing experience. Moved by the lower standard of living and poverty in Thailand and scarce opportunities



for youth, she made up her mind to do something good for youth in the world and quickly concluded that Rotary was the right train to jump on.

Upon her return to Calgary and resumption of classes at U of C, she became a senior Rotex (former exchange students) and became a leader in orienting, counselling and generating group activities for exchange students inbound to District 5360, including the Stampede, hockey games (when available), winter festival and the District Conference, to name a few.

Subsequently she joined the Metro Rotaract Club where she encourages Rotaract members, past exchange students and others with similar interests, to consider committing to a life in Rotary, culminating with membership in one of Calgary's clubs when qualified: Become a Rotary Lifer, like her.

More recently, Ashley has been an ambassador for Shelter Box, a charity with wide spread support in the world Rotary Community, including Chinook.

In June, Ashley will be travelling to Lisbon, Portugal, for a Youth Conference, then will attend the Rotary International Convention which follows. I am sure she will be eager to tell us about her experience in Lisbon when she returns.

John Beatty thanked Ashley for her presentation by presenting her with a certificate confirming a club donation, in her name, of a micro loan to a family in the Dominican Republic.

Council on Legislation - Rotary News -- 24 April 2013

Representatives at the 2013 Council on Legislation approved a US\$1-a-year increase in per capita dues that clubs pay to Rotary International, starting in 2014-15.

The increase was proposed by the RI Board of Directors based on a five-year financial forecast, if there were no dues increase, RI's deficit would grow to \$9 million in 2018 and reduce the General Surplus Fund below the level required in the RI Bylaws. With the dues increase, the deficit will fall to \$5 million in 2018, according to the forecast, and the surplus fund will then stand at \$88 million, above the mandated level.

Supporters of the dues increase maintain that it will be sufficient to keep pace with inflation without necessitating cutbacks in service. Dues are the primary source of funding for Rotary's operations. The Council action raises Rotary clubs' annual per capita dues paid to RI to \$54 in 2014-15, \$55 in 2015-16, and \$56 in 2016-17. Dues for 2013-14 are \$53, and they have increased \$1 a year for the past three years.

Delegates from Rotary's 532 districts are meeting in Chicago 21-26 April to consider 174 proposals submitted by Rotary clubs, districts, and the Board of Directors — for changes to the policies that govern Rotary International and its clubs. The council is held every three years.

In other action this week, delegates:

• Approved a measure creating the office of vice governor, who would fill in if the governor becomes unable to serve. The vice governor would be selected by the district" nominating committee from among the district's past governors.

• Increased the number of clubs that can take part in pilot projects to 1,000, up from the previous limit of 200.

• Approved a measure allowing Rotarians outside the United States and Canada to receive an electronic version of their official Rotary regional magazine, if one is available. Rotarians within the United States and Canada were allowed the option of receiving a digital version of The Rotarian by the 2010 Council.

• Approved changing the name of Rotary's Fifth Avenue of Service, currently called 'New Generations', to 'Youth Service'. The 2010 Council on Legislation approved this avenue of service for youth, which joined Rotary's Four Avenues of Service (Club, Vocational, Community, and International). The name New Generations was meant to reflect the need to build up the next generation of Rotarians, but proponents of the name change argued on Wednesday that the word "youth" is more universally understood, both inside and outside Rotary, and clarifies the fact that these programs encourage Rotarians to empower youth.

• Approved allowing a district to have an unlimited number of e-clubs, removing a previous restriction of two e-clubs per district. E-clubs meet electronically, conduct service projects, and sometimes also hold in-person meetings.

• Approved a measure, aimed at increasing membership, that provides for satellite clubs, whose members meet at a different time and location from their parent club, but who are also considered members of the parent club.

• Approved a measure allowing participation in club projects to count toward club attendance requirements. The measure amends the Standard Rotary Club Constitution to provide that a member must attend or make up at least 50 percent of club regular meetings or engage in club projects for at least 12 hours in each half of the year, or a combination of both.

• Removed the travel reimbursement policy from the RI Bylaws. This will enable the RI Board of Directors to develop a policy that is flexible, able to address emergency travel situations, and able to take advantage of cost-saving opportunities.

• Defeated two measures that would have allowed clubs to meet less frequently. The delegates also rejected a measure that would have allowed a club to cancel six regular meetings a year instead of four, for holidays, the death of a club member, disasters, or other emergencies.

The Rotary Foundation is now accepting applications for the world-competitive Rotary Peace Fellowship. The fellowship provides academic and practical training for individuals working on solving conflicts and building peace around the world.

Rotary Peace Fellows are leaders promoting national and international cooperation, peace, and the successful resolution of conflict throughout their lives, in their careers, and through service activities. Fellows can earn either a master's degree in

international relations, public administration, sustainable development, peace studies, conflict resolution, or a related field, or a professional development certificate in peace and conflict resolution.

Both exchange students have been facilitated through the Rotary Youth Exchange, a program that allows opportunities like living in another country for a year. Rotary clubs around the world sponsor teenagers so they can have this chance. The Chinook Rotary Club is sponsoring Fleming on her exchange and is hosting Takats during his.

Both Takats and Fleming are very excited about their exchange. Takats has been living as a Canadian since last August when his plane landed in Calgary. When he came here he said he was "looking forward to living in another country for a year. I wanted to challenge myself, in every way I can. I wanted to know just how different living in Canada was. I wanted to learn about the traditions, and the whole worldview of Canadians."

When asked what his

favourite and least favourite parts about Canada were Takats said, "It is definitely the people who live here. I like that they are open to trying new things. There is nothing that I don't like about Canada. Canada and Hungary are different for sure, but that doesn't mean that it's bad. The only thing I can't get used to is the fast-changing weather. One day is plus sixteen the next is plus two. It's just crazy." Takats also explained that although he misses Hungary, when he does go back, he will miss all the friends he has made during his exchange.

Fleming is looking forward to her exchange which will be taking place at the end of this year. There are some things that she will

miss aboutt Canada like skiing and snow; however, she is looking forward to learning a new language and living in another country with a different culture for a year. When asked if there is anything she is not looking forward to she said, "I am a little scared for not being able to communicate fully to anyone for the first few months. It's a little hard to meet people when you do not speak their language very well.'
