

THE OLYMPICS ... AN INSIDER'S VIEW Diane Jones Konihowski

Bart introduced guest speaker Diane Jones-Konihowski, who has been involved in sports for over 45 years as a world class athlete, coach, official, volunteer, sport marketing specialist, fund raiser, administrator, panelist, commentator and columnist.

Diane represented Canada for 17 years in the pentathlon, was named to 3 Olympic teams, ranked No. 1 in the world, and won over 70 Canadian Championships. She was named Canada's Female Athlete of the Year twice and has been inducted into several Halls of Fame in Canada. She has been awarded the Order of Canada and will receive the Queen's Diamond Jubilee medal in September. She actually retired in 1984 but has been very busy volunteering for many charities, foundations, education projects and the like. She was born in Vancouver, grew up in Saskatoon where she earned a Bachelor of Education degree, and in 2002 was awarded an Honorary Doctorate of Laws degree from U of S and Brock University.



She made a very relaxed and informative, mostly extemporaneous, presentation which was very well received. She mentioned the current Canadian goal for the London Olympics is Top 12 which was set by the Canadian Olympic Committee. It is a very ambitious goal as we have only 277 athletes competing which is many less than many other countries. There are 205 countries with 11,000 athletes competing. We do much better in winter Olympics where 86 countries with 3,000 athletes compete. The federal government has increased funding for the Olympics and while there will never be enough, it is being targeted for best results. Some changes have been made this year including

adding a Nutritionist to help the athletes, and more Sports Psychologists to help with all health situations including the endemic sleep disorders that occur at such events often because of jet lag, dorm sleeping quarters and other dislocation problems. The competitors are better prepared than ever in the past due in part to the larger medical team on site.

She mentioned that "doping" is not uncommon and at least 6,000 tests will be done which will be retained for 8 years. Leaders are trying to instill pride in performance rather than doping to improve. Canada's standards of performance are tougher than international standards so our teams are smaller. Also 50% are first time competitors at this level. She says the athletes know who is on drugs. Also empty seats have always been a problem because of the initial distribution to I.O.C. staff


Reminder!!

Rotary International Convention, Lisbon

Rotarians from around the world gather each year to exchange great ideas, connect with old and new friends, have fun, and advance the work of Rotary. The 2013 RI Convention will take place in Lisbon, Portugal, 23-26 June.

From the bustling House of Friendship to breakout sessions to preconvention meetings, the RI Convention is your way to connect with the family of Rotary.

Viva Lisbon!

Lisbon is an explorer's paradise.

The second-oldest European capital after Athens, the city was once home to great explorers like Vasco da Gama, Magellan, and Prince Henry the Navigator. At its peak, the city served as capital to an empire spanning several continents, from South America to Asia. That traditional of exploration is now captured in worldclass museums and monuments, including the stunning Monument to the Discoveries.

Lisbon is also unique among European capitals. Located on the edge of the continent, it developed its own strong artistic heritage. Spared much of the devastation of World War II by the country's nuetrality, the city has not undergone the massive post-war renovation typical in other European capitals. Many of its neighborhoods maintain a charmingly antiquated and medieval appearance.

The city is built on seven hills, each with a different personality. A tram ride to the top offers visitors breathtaking viewpoints. The mild, mostly sunny climate, makes the days seem longer, making it perfect for exploring. Experience the city's genuine and multifaceted neighborhoods, and become fascinated by an eclectic mix of sights and sounds.

Local attractions

Museums and monuments include the Jeronimos Monastery in Belem, a symbol of triumph, the Belem Tower, and the Monument to the Discoveries. Saint Georges Castle and the famous Alfama district offer some of the best views in town. And the Calouste Gulbenkian Museum hosts the oil tycoon's vast collection of art. If you like shopping, Lisbon's your place. Bargains abound. The greater Lisbon region also includes two UNESCO World Heritage sites, palaces, beaches, mountains, and other areas of historical interest within kilometers of the city center.

Nightlife and dining

An international city with a palate to match, Lisbon offers nearly every type of cuisine, but the "must eats" come from the sea. After dinner, take a stroll along the scenic waterfront, experience the soulful sounds of Fado music, or visit the Bairro Alto, an artsy, bohemian guarter of Lisbon known for its lively bars and restaurants.
