# YOUTH FUND RAISING JOCELYN DAVIS

Bart introduced our guest speaker, Jocelyn Davis.

THE ARCH

Jocelyn is a 17 year old Western High School Grad, whose credentials as a fund raiser for charitable purposes and as a student activist are formidable. She started her volunteer efforts at age nine, and has been active with the Interfaith Food Bank and the Famous 5 Foundation. As well she is special advisor to both Volunteer Calgary and YMCA Calgary.



She is Co-Founder and Chair of "The 8th Rung", which to date has raised \$170,000 for international development initiatives. She has already received a Peace Medal, and is involved in fund raising initiatives with the Calgary Board of Education Middle School, and with the Calgary Catholic School District. She has been appointed to the Alberta Government's Youth Advisory Panel.

Most recently she has managed to have the city light the Calgary Tower "flame" in memory of the battle of Vimy Ridge (95th Anniversary). She

received the Queen Elizabeth Diamond Jubilee Medal for her essay on Vimy Ridge. As well, she received a Vimy Scholarship to represent Canada in April 2013 in France and Belgium.

At the age of nine, Jocelyn told us she started (2004) working with CAWTH to provide clean water, and with Light up the World to provide electric light to areas like Papua New Guinea. She managed to develop associate funding with Oil and Gas companies and with CIDA. For this first project she raised \$32,500, and offered assistance to some 6,000 people. She is currently involved with other youth groups in assisting some of the First Nations to attain better conditions on their reserves.



Jocelyn is finished high school and is off later this year to begin studies at Queen's University in International Relations.

Norm Moro thanked Jocelyn and gave her a certificate indicating we had given a microloan to a lady in Dominican Republic. She was very happy at the choice of gift.

# MEETING MINUTES

The meeting today was at Fairview School and started promptly at noon. We were welcomed by Principal Werner Mayland who thanked our club for our continued support. He mentioned he is looking forward to enlarging our partnership. We then sang the national anthem led by three Fairview students.

Pat Garner, who is in charge of this activity for our club, delivered her report. She stated the school has been busy launching new projects. Their goals, direction and achievements have been exemplary with our mandate of Service Above Self. So far Fairview's accomplishments this year have been:

- 1) Introduced a school-wide composting program
- 2) The Social Awareness Committee collected over 1,600 items for Jacket Racket
- 3) \$250 was raised to support "Nicey" the school's foster
- 4) \$2,300 was raised for Hot Day, Candy Grams and Dance to support Adopt a Family. Items were purchased for the family's needs and wants.
- 5) Approximately \$200 for Ban The Bottle Project has been raised toward the purchase of filling stations to replace water fountains enabling the students to fill their own water bottles vs use of disposable bottles.
- 6) Fairview is continuing to work on the Solar Salad Project and is currently waiting for the permits and installation of the solar panels. Teacher Chris Gerein has been working on this project and is expecting to receive grants from oil

companies to assist with the panels and also the composting activity.

Later the Principal mentioned the changing demographics in the city have resulted in relatively few students attending Fairview from this neighbourhood. Most come guite a distance, some on the bus for an hour each way every day. There are 1,000 students who travel to Fairview daily by bus. Traditional learning, uniforms

and French immersion are prevalent here. Students are

here by choice, are dedicated to learning and there are virtually no behaviour problems.

Rotarian Garth Sabirsh reminded us of the Spruce Meadows Horticultural Show on April 13th and 14th, where we will again be parking cars. Garth invited the teachers to join us for
