Rick took us through the structure of the District YEX Committee, and the roles of the various players on it. The 2012 - 13 priorities for the committee are:

- Develop a 5 year strategic plan •
- Focus on Youth Protection program compliance •
- Strengthen communications with the clubs
- Simplify YEX program administration
- Develop and launch a new and improved District YEX Training Plan/Program •
 - Integrate YEX into New Generations

Rick provided the background and reason for each of these goals. On a personal note, he stated that simplifying the program administration was key, particularly with recent staff changes.

The talk then moved on to what clubs can do to help with the program. This ranged from the simple "who's who" on the committee, and ensure contact info is up to date, to the need for a club to appoint a "Youth Protection Officer".

Rick then reviewed Rotary International Policy with respect to youth participating in Rotary activities. This focused on any adult who has direct interaction on a regular basis with youth. District 5360 Policy is that all volunteers interested in participating in District 5360 New Generations Programs must have a valid and current Police Security Clearance for working with youth, which also includes Vulnerable Sector



Screening. In Calgary District the PCS process will be handled by the club's youth protection officer, who will handle the forms at a club level.

All volunteers interested in participating in District 5360 New Generations Programs must participate in youth protection awareness training. These include:

- New Generations Committee members
- **Club YEX Counsellors**
- **RYLA, RYPEN counsellors** •
- SIS mentors
- Host families

The District has a number of resources and programs to help with this process.


The meeting was opened at 12:20 by president Dave Saunders.

There is also a district Incident Response team to deal with major accident, illness or death, harassment or bullying, and emotional, physical or sexual abuse.

Having covered all the Youth Protection issues, Rick went on to promote Rotary member involvement. This included :

- Encouraging your student to engage in club activities i.e.: meetings, social events, fundraisers
- Hosting special activities for the students
- Inviting your student home for dinner
- Including your student in some of your plans

This involvement was seen as key to engaging the student in the local culture, providing learning experiences, helping adjust to "culture shock", and improving the exchange experience for both the student and the club.

Rotary Foundation Month

The mission of The Rotary Foundation is to enable Rotarians to advance world understanding, goodwill, and peace through the improvement of health, the support of education, and the alleviation of poverty.

The Foundation is a not-for-profit corporation supported solely by voluntary contributions from Rotarians and friends of the Foundation who share its vision of a better world.

Rotary's new grant model, often called the Future Vision Plan, is both simplified and streamlined, reducing the number of Foundation grant types from 12 to three. The new model goes into effect on 1 July 2013.

The new grant model includes:

• District grants — block grants that help clubs and districts address immediate needs in their communities and abroad

• Global grants — range from \$15,000 to \$200,000 and offer opportunities to participate in strategically focused, high-impact activities within the six areas of focus

• Packaged grants — enable clubs and districts to work with Rotary's strategic partners on pre-designed projects and activities

Rotary's areas of focus:

The needs spanning Rotary's six areas of focus are vast, ranging from lack of access to clean water to the need for immunization that prevent deadly diseases.

Rotary clubs serve communities around the world, each with unique concerns and needs. Rotarians have continually adapted and improved the way they respond to those needs, taking on a broad range of service projects. The most successful and sustainable Rotary service tends to fall within one of the following six areas:

- Peace and conflict prevention/resolution
- Disease prevention and treatment
- Water and sanitation
- Maternal and child health
- Basic education and literacy
- Economic and community development

Rotary International and The Rotary Foundation recognize these six areas of focus as organizational priorities, and there are countless ways that Rotarians can address these needs locally and internationally.

Rotary Remembers

This week our usual Tuesday noon meeting was held on Thursday evening at the Kensington Legion with all the Calgary Rotary Clubs joining together for a Remembrance Day celebration with former Chinook member Lt. Gov. (formerly Col.) Don Ethell as the guest speaker. As it was a snowy, stormy evening the crowd was not large, but most had managed to arrive before Lt. Gov. Ethell's appearance at 6:30 p.m. along with his wife.

Norm Haines of the Calgary Rotary Club was M.C. for this evening's 'Rotary Remembers' programme to recognize the commitment of Canadian soldiers for over 100 years in many places in the world.

We started with O Canada. Norm reminded us of the need to remember the war veterans by strong financial support for the Veterans Food Bank. He then reminded us of a Guelph, Ont. Doctor, John MacRae, who in 1915 while serving as a doctor at the front composed the poem, 'In Flanders Fields', which was read to us tonight by Sherry. Not mentioned was that Dr. MacRae actually threw away the paper with the poem handwritten on it, but it was picked up by another soldier, given to a British newspaper, and in due course Dr. MacRae was recognized as the author. It is the most prominent writing of the Canadian military having lasted nearly 100 years.

Calgary South club's Hugh Delaney read the names of all their members who had served in the armed forces, including 37 who are no longer with us. Several other local clubs read the names of those veterans who have passed away.

Peter Hardy introduced Lt. Gov. Ethell, the 17th Lt. Gov. of Alberta who was appointed in 2010. He was born in Vancouver, raised in Victoria, joined the armed forces in 1970, and became an officer in the PPCLI in 1972. He took part in 14 Peace Support activities worldwide during his career which ended with the retirement of this highly decorated military leader in 1993. His attention then turned to humanitarian activities and other altruistic projects. He has been recognized with an Order of Canada, several honourary degrees and other honours.

On the 11th Hour of the 11th Day of the 11th Month We will Remember You

Lt. Gov. Ethell started his brief remarks by remembering his membership in the Chinook Rotary club. He stated that despite the weather, he plans to return to Edmonton tonight due to commitments tomorrow. He and his wife have retained their house here in Calgary, and were able to rest there briefly this afternoon after their arrival from Edmonton. For this evening of 'Rotary Remembers' he mentioned that in the Washington Library of Congress there is a plaque that states "Memory is the Treasurer and Guardian of All Things". We are the guardians of the legacy of all the Canadian men and women who offered their lives for our country over the past 100 years. This is the 70th anniversary of the battle at Dieppe where Calgary committed 2 regiments. Canada had 5,000 men in the battle which was 85% of all forces there, and experienced a 70% casualty rate. This battle and the huge price paid had a strong influence on later battles in WW2 and will forever be remembered.

On April 8, 2002 Canada experienced our first loss of life in Afghanistan, with the total now 158 men and women. Many others have been scarred mentally and physically. We gathered here tonight "Lest We Forget".

After the usual thank you on behalf of those in attendance, the crowd gathered to enjoy the light evening lunch prepared by the Legion staff, and to mingle and renew acquaintanceships.
