My YEARS IN BROADCASTING

Darrel Janz, Retired News Anchor

Bart introduced our speaker Darrel Janz. He described Darrel as a "farm boy" and one of his best friends. Born in Saskatchewan, at Main Center, he shares fame with Homer Simpson, who also came from Main Center.

Darrel has been in broadcasting in Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Quebec, Ontario, and Alberta. He has also taught broadcast journalism at SAIT and Mount Royal. From 1973 to 2010, he anchored the 6PM news at CFCN-TV. He is now the weekend anchor and does a weekly feature called "Inspired". He supports a number of charitable organizations.



Darrel says the most popular question he gets is "What happened to Barb Higgins?" Currently she is on a camping trip in Morocco to celebrate her 50th birthday. She spends 6 months a year in Scottsdale Arizona, avoiding snow.

Darrel started his first newscast in 1963. He is now marking 50 years in Canadian television. He has a book coming out shortly (50 Years and Counting). It should be a good read.

Some of his memorable events were:

- he and his pilot covered the first major league baseball game in Montreal by dunking the helicopter in the river, with no injuries
- the Kennedy speech to Kruschev regarding missiles in Cuba
- the Kennedy assassination
- men on the moon
- Apollo 13 "Houston we have a problem"
- the 1970 October crisis of FLQ in Quebec
- a special one on one interview with John Diefenbaker

Several questions were asked, and the talk included several good jokes. He was a very popular speaker.



October is Vocational Service Month

RI President Sakuji Tanaka has asked Rotarians to build Peace Through Service in 2012-13. By using vocational service to strengthen communities and build relationships, Rotarians are taking an important step in creating a more peaceful world. Every vocation can play a role in one of Rotary's ultimate goals. Here is Tanaka's message on vocational service and peace.

Dear fellow Rotarians,

In Japan, we place great importance on the value of work. Whatever we are called to do, we should do it to the very best of our abilities, with dignity and with pride. Whether the job is running a country or shining shoes, there is honor in every vocation.

I grew up embracing this belief, but I had never stopped to contemplate it. One day, in my third year in Rotary, we had a speaker at our club who talked about the purpose of one's livelihood. He asked, why do we work hard? What is the importance of our work?

I had never thought about this before. I never saw it as a question. We work to earn money. We work to be successful. We work because it is required of us. To me, this was all.

On that day, I learned about the idea of vocational service. It was the idea that through our work, we can serve others. We think about others' needs, and grow to care more for the needs of our communities. We build positive connections between people, and a more peaceful world.

Did You Know!? (historic club tidbits)

Did you know? We have now had 35 members serve as President of our Club. Two, Honourary Life Charter Member President Greg McLellan and Honourary Life Charter Member Ian Burgess, served more than the standard one year term. Others have served the Board as Secretary or Treasurer, in addition to the regular passage through the Board. 25 of our Past Presidents are still in active service with the Club. 6 in total, Life Honourary Charter Members have served as President. Remarkably, only 2 Past Presidents are deceased, 8 have either relocated or resigned from service in Rotary.

In total 17 of our members have now passed away, while still in service with the Club.

In 1980, RI encouraged more rapid growth in the Foundation, by suggesting members in good standing in Rotary, purchase Paul Harris Fellowships for \$1,000 USD. Many of the smaller clubs didn't have the budget to award their own members as PH Fellows, ours was one of them. Jim Thompson, closely followed by Herb Imler, Larry Ryder and John McBean became the first members of this Club to subscribe on their own to the PH program, and put our Club in the ranks of having members involved. We were now able to have members who could attend the PH Fellows breakfast at the District Conference annually and the PH Breakfast at RI annual Conventions. Many, many members have followed in support, and many are multiple donors.

Our Club has a solid reputation in the district and RI for 'service above self'. Sadly not all members over all these years have been so dedicated to service, a problem that all clubs have, but our Club has made incredible contributions to our community locally, the City, the Province, country and Internationally. Members have been ambassadors on our behalf, visiting clubs world wide. Visiting clubs elsewhere in Rotary's world is fascinating, everyone should experience this special Rotary advantage when traveling. I for one, have visited clubs all over the world. At several meetings I attended, I couldn't understand a single word spoken, but was made very welcome. One in particular, I ended up as the guest speaker, (the one selected failed to make the meeting), tricked into solving their problem. Adlibbed the whole thing, about the winter Olympics and how winter affects Canada. Many of the very robust members took the afternoon off, came over to our pool side bar, where we enjoyed a few pops, and spent the whole afternoon solving all the world's problems...great fun!
