## **ASRAB** Kevin Kaminski, Disabled Athlete

Bart introduced our guest speaker Kevin Kaminski, a disabled athlete who is blind.

Kevin was born in Regina in 1962 and moved to Calgary in 1966. He originally trained as a Community Rehabilitation Practitioner where he was employed for 10 years. During that time he became interested in massage therapy and became a licensed Massage Therapist in 1995, and is owner of Mountainview Massage Therapy operation.

Kevin has been happily married to Patti since 1986 and they have 2 daughters, Kate 23 and Claire 18. He gives much credit to his wife for being able to lead a regular life despite his blindness. He was 14 years old when he noticed his vision was a problem, when he went duck hunting with his father and was unable to focus his right eye. The problem is Optic Nerve Atrophy, and he was virtually totally blind before finishing high school. He refused to use



a cane. By the way, he attended high school with Fred Jessee's son.

Kevin attended Mount Royal college where he met the founder of Alberta Sports &



Recreation Association for the Blind (ASRAB) who, among other things, introduced him to Goalball, an athletic game which made a great difference to his fitness and athletic challenges, a big step for this former athlete. He has competed in this for over 20 years, has helped earn 6

national championships, represented Canada in 3 world championships, and 3 Paralympic Games (Korea, Spain Greece). He has been Vice-President of ASRAB since 1988, where he founded and nurtured the SightNight Fun Run which has raised \$250,000 to help those with vision problems.

Graham Boone thanked the speaker saying he is an inspiration to us all, and presented the usual certificate helping a person in the DR.

Excerpt - Rotary International News -- 27 September 2011

Do your friends and co-workers know that you're a Rotarian? Do you tell acquaintances about your club's good works in the community or internationally? It's up to every Rotarian to tell the world what Rotary is and does. People are much more likely to know about Rotary and perceive it positively as a charitable organization if they personally know a Rotarian.

Awareness of Rotary varies from country to country, and culture to culture. But awareness of Rotary doesn't necessarily translate into familiarity with what it does. Boosting awareness alone will not be enough to get the public to readily associate Rotary with good works, or to generate greater community involvement.

Demographics play a significant role in whether people have heard of Rotary. Clubs may need to gain a better understanding of

The public's interest in joining a Rotary club is low. Among the countries surveyed, an average of only 16 percent of respondents said they would be likely to join a local Rotary club. More than 59 percent said they would be unlikely to join. In the United States, women were half as likely as men to report interest in joining.

"Because each Rotary club is independent in deciding what services they want to be involved in, this can cause mixed impressions in the communities on what we do," Leung says. "These surveys underscore the importance of having a consistent message."

The 1.2 million Rotary club members worldwide are the organization's greatest strength.
