OFFICIATING IN THE CANADIAN FOOTBALL LEAGUE Tom Higgins, CFL Head of Officials

Bart Dailley introduced our speaker Tom Higgins, CFL Head of Officials. Bart did well considering he was suffering from a splitting headache.

Tom's background has included stints coaching teams such as Calgary and Edmonton. Tom noted that the Edmonton work helped him learn how to think positive.

He believes that our choices determine our destiny. Tom earned his BS from North Carolina State in four years while playing football and wrestling. He learned three rules there:

- 1. Do what's right.
- 2. Do it to your best ability.
- 3. Treat others as you would like to be treated.

CFL officials need to have a thick skin and good skills. Canadian football is more difficult to officiate than the NFL because of the size of the field and the number of players. Generally six plays will determine the outcome of a game, so the officials need to be good.



A command center has cut the review time from 4 minutes to 3 minutes. There were 109 decisions from the center last year. Officials are graded on every play. They compete with each other and for working the playoffs. Senior referees are paid \$1,500/game plus expenses. This compares to NFL people who are paid more than \$8,000/game, and are now locked out.

Literacy

One of Rotary's Areas of Focus is Literacy. Rotary has teamed up with two groups to help promote these efforts, the **International Reading Association** and the **Imagination Library**.



The International Reading Association

The cooperative relationship between the International Reading

Association (IRA) and Rotary International (RI) provides a way to collaborate and combine resources to promote literacy worldwide. A memorandum of understanding between the two organizations was first signed in 2002 and renewed in 2005 and 2009. Rotary clubs and districts, and IRA councils and affiliates, are encouraged to share resources and information and to develop cooperative literacy projects.

The International Reading Association is a professional membership organization dedicated to promoting high levels of literacy for all by improving the quality of reading instruction, disseminating research and information about reading, and encouraging a lifetime reading habit. IRA members include teachers, reading specialists, consultants, administrators, supervisors, university faculty, researchers, psychologists, librarians, media specialists, and parents. The

IRA network encompasses 70,000 members and over 300,000 affiliate members in nearly 100 countries, who support

a thriving professional program of publications, meetings, and advocacy and outreach efforts locally, nationally, and internationally.





The Imagination Library

Launched by country music star Dolly Parton and The Dollywood Foundation, the Imagination Library fosters a love of reading among preschool children by providing them

with a free hardcover book every month from birth to the age of five. Rotary clubs and districts are encouraged to support literacy through the Imagination Library.

Over 675,000 children under the age of five receive books from the Imagination Library each month. The program supports early childhood literacy and a life long love of reading. Over 40 million books have been donated to children since the program began in 1996. Currently, the Imagination Library has programs in over 1,700 communities across Canada, the United Kingdom, and the United States.

Rotary clubs and other community groups help make the Imagination Library work. Participating communities provide access to the program for all preschool children in their area. They promote the program, register children with the Imagination Library, and pay for the books and mailing. Once a child is registered, the Dollywood Foundation takes over sending the child a new book each month.

A committee composed of individuals with backgrounds in education, child development, academia, and early childhood literacy select the books for the Imagination Library. The children's classic The Little Engine That Could[™] is the first book of each library and Look Out Kindergarten Here I Come by Nancy Carlson is the final book in the collection. Each book arrives in a polybag and is addressed to the child.
