ZOOM Meeting Minutes

May 4th, 2021

President Rob opened our meeting at 12:05 by welcoming everyone and acknowledging that this is a special day for all Star Wars fans: May the 4th becomes "May the force be with you".

We had 30 participants on ZOOM today including our guest speaker, Kevin McInnis, Karen Murray from Inclusion Alberta, and Kathryn Breaker, one of our Friends of Chinook Rotary.

He then thanked Stephen and Anne for all their work preparing and distributing our e-Arch each Tuesday. Teen Challenge Program Kevin McInnis



Rob introduced Kevin McInnis, who is speaking for the second time to our Club. He is a former Calgary Police Officer and Pastor for the Department. He retired as an Officer in 2004 and then as a Pastor in 2013. He is now involved with an international, faithbased, addiction treatment centre which operates under the name "Teen Challenge". He is speaking to us today in this regard.



history behind "Teen Challenge". In 1958 the founder, David Wilkinson, became aware of a trial taking place in New York City which involved youth and gang activity. He went to NYC and became engaged with teens in that city which involved dealing with drugs, addiction and the crime related to feeding same. In 1960 the first residential program began in a small residence, dealing with drug addiction from a Christian Faith perspective. Now there are over 200 such residences providing addiction treatment in the United States, and 1,100 worldwide. Closer to home, there are 20 operations across Canada. In 1987, a local ranch became a Teen Challenge residence, and this is where Kevin currently works with addicted young men.

Kevin played a 5 minute video showing a presentation given by a 22 year old recent graduate of the program to his church congregation. It was a sad story with an encouraging end. He was a young Albertan who started using cocaine at the age of 14. He dropped out of school, worked part time but kept getting fired due to his drug habit. He was living on the street and was involved in some 'shady' activity to fund his habit. He tried a detox program, made progress but couldn't seem to make it past 2 to 4 months sober before relapsing. In 2019 he hit rock bottom and accepted that he would die on the street. His parents signed him up for Teen Challenge, a 12 month faith based program and has remained involved as a graduate assistant for a 6th month period. He notes that he has been given a second chance at life, and has been 1 year 7 months sober at the time the video was



made. Kevin has worked with this young man throughout his program and continues as his mentor.

Teen Challenge has been quite successful in treating young men (there are separate operations for women) with drug and addiction challenges. Kevin estimates a 75% completion rate which is considered very good. They provide food and housing for their students and have a \$1,000 entrance fee. They utilize private sponsors to support their operation. The students are provided with counselling services, Christian education and help achieving their GED if needed. Some locations have business training through thrift store operations or garages, depending on the skills of their students. Students can give back to the community by outreach and story telling to local church groups or schools. They are taught how to deal with their anger and how to build healthy relationships. They currently have 50% capacity of 6 students in their program (regular capacity is 12).

They are just completing a \$5.5 million (all funded privately) building expansion which will increase their capacity to 24 students, 6 graduate assistants and staff. Kevin wrapped up his remarks by noting that so far COVID-19 has killed 2,100 people in Alberta and that in the same period, opioid overdoses have killed 1,300. His point is that drug addiction is a very serious problem in our society.



Rob thanked Kevin for his presentation and advised him that in appreciation for speaking today, we would be making a donation to Rotary's Polio Plus.

Sunshine Report



I chose your club for the award. It is given to a club between 49 and 100 members in size. It recognizes club service, engagement with the community and innovation.

When I visited your club I was struck by a number of things that you are doing which I have not found in other clubs of your size, or to the development that you have achieved.

The movie night, a first ever way to not necessarily raise money, but raise goodwill and awareness of Rotary – your partnership with others showed me your willingness to collaborate to make a bigger impact and extend your reach.

The transition of your club to meet at a different times of the day regularly each month to accommodate younger members who are working, and still holding on to some tried and true traditions.

Your newsletter is top shelf, the Roots 2 STEM program is very innovative and incorporates a mentorship program for youth which we as Rotarians have yet to develop. Rotary has trialed a one year Rotaract Rotary mentorship, but not with a younger age group – something I need to work with Doug MacDonald on (Vulnerable Sector).

You are also well on your way with the strat plan, which will set your directional arrows for the journey ahead. Something that so many clubs are lacking right now.

Your club is innovative, not afraid to try new things and take a chance – that is how we learn and grow. That is the direction we need to support. Congratulations on being a leader, an innovator, and community builder.
