Our November meeting focussed on Remembrance Day. So it was fitting that our guest speaker was Dusty Rhodes. The following is the email we received after the meeting:

To the President and All Members of the Rotary Clubs of Calgary and area,

I am sending this email to first off apologize to my closest dearest friends, the many clubs who have requested me to be their guest speaker, who have asked me to speak not only about my bio, but our Great Branch, Centennial Calgary Branch #285 where I am the President. I can't as this is an extremely bad time of the year for me, as I do suffer and have been suffering since 1993, with PTSD.

I served in all Branches of the Canadian Armed Forces, starting with the Navy for 18 months, the Airforce for 6 months, and the rest of my military career in the Army, retiring as a A/CSM in the Army.

There are thousands of Navy, Army, Airforce, UN Peacekeepers, RCMP Veterans and Serving

Members that are suffering with this horrible situation formally called "Shell Shock", now known as PTSD. I also want to ensure that the Veterans today are not forgotten as many have experienced the same unbelievable, horrific experience that I am presently fighting with.

I was in Bosnia/Herzegovina in the spring of 1993 as a Sgt Convoy Commander. My task was to ensure that we replenished our soldiers that were based in the northern part of the former Bosnia/Herzegovina with clothing, rations, ammo, food, fuel, etc. Our convoy consisted of 25 to 30 large military vehicles. We departed from the coast of Bosnia/Herzegovina, Plocie Croatia on the Adriatic Coast. The attachment that I have provided will make you understand what our MSE-Ops/Truckers experienced. I am a Soldier and I will always will be a Soldier. Today I am honoured to be the President of the largest Member Branch, Centennial Calgary Branch #285 in Canada. You all know that I will be there for every Member of Centennial Calgary Branch #285.

With respect to all Veterans that participated in the Bosnia War, the link that I have provided below shows what we as Truckers/Soldiers experienced during our Tour of Duty. History of the Poppy

Each November. Poppies bloom on the lapels and collars of millions of Canadians. The significance of the Poppy can be traced back to the Napoleonic Wars in the 19th century, over 110 years before being adopted in Canada. Records from that time indicate how thick Poppies grew over the graves of soldiers in the area of Flanders, France. Fields that had been barren before battle exploded with the blood-red flowers after the fighting ended. During the tremendous bombardments of the war, the chalk soils became rich in lime from rubble, allowing the "popaver rhoeas" to thrive. When the war ended, the lime was quickly absorbed, and the Poppy began to disappear again.

The person who first introduced the Poppy to Canada and the Commonwealth was Lieutenant-Colonel John McCrae of Guelph, Ontario, a Canadian Medical Officer during the First World War.

John McCrae penned the Poem "In Flanders Fields" on a scrap of paper in May 1915, on the day following the death of a fellow soldier. Little did he know then that those 13 lines would become enshrined in the hearts and minds of all who would wear them. McCrae's poem was published in Punch Magazine in December of that same year, and the poem served as inspiration three years later for Moina Michael, an American teacher. Moina Michael made a pledge to always wear a Poppy as a sign of Remembrance.

During a visit to the United States in 1920, a French woman named Madame Guerin learned of the custom. Madame Guerin decided to make and sell Poppies to raise money for children in war-torn areas of France. The Great War Veteran's Association in Canada (predecessor of the Canadian Legion) officially adopted the Poppy as its Flower of Remembrance on July 5, 1921. Today, the Poppy is worn each year during the Remembrance period to honour Canada's Fallen. The Legion also encourages the wearing of a Poppy for the funeral of a Veteran, and for any commemorative event honouring Fallen Veterans. It is not inappropriate to wear a Poppy during other times to commemorate Fallen Veterans, and it is an individual choice to do so, if it's worn appropriately.

Thanks to the millions of Canadians who wear the Legion's lapel Poppy each November. The little red flower has never died, and the memories of those who fell in battle remain strong.



So, I encourage all of you to take some time on November 11th and pay respect to all who have been, or who still are, in service.

Jim Thompson, Club History

Did You Know? At this time of the year, each and every year for as long as I can remember, certainly before being asked to join Rotary, I pause awhile. The pause is to remember the valiant Canadians who fought in the many wars to preserve our democracy and freedom, and the freedom of so many others around the world.

As a school child in the 40s and 50s, we paused in an all classrooms assembly at Sunalta School here in Calgary, to remember. Some of us, more than you may imagine, had greater connections to the brave souls who fought on foreign lands as Canadians united in the cause ... all volunteers prepared for the ultimate sacrifice.

My family was totally committed. Grandfather James Thompson spent 4 years in the trenches, 1914 to 1918 of WW1 and survived. In WWII, all my uncles were enlisted, Gordon as a paratrooper, Stan in the Army, and the youngest Donald, only son of Grandpa

Gavin, in the RCAF, age 22. Gordon was not injured, Stan suffered multiple wounds in heavy fighting and survived. Donald, a flight navigator in the Lancaster Bomber fleet was killed in 1943, just months after arriving in Europe. He is buried in France at a village near the crash site of the Lancaster Bomber he was in. He is memorialized on the Remembrance Wall at the BOMBER COMMAND MUSEUM OF CANADA, located just down highway 2 in Nanton , Alberta. You should visit this wonderful facility. It is a true tribute to so many who were from the prairies, lost in the war. The medal pictured is AIR CREW SERVICE IN EUROPE MEDAL, sent home with his diary ... all that my Grandparents and Donald's 3 sisters had to remember him by.
