Our guest speaker today was Jordan Guildford who created 'Gems for Gems'.

Mission Statement

Gems for Gems is committed to ending the cycle of domestic abuse by focussing on the economic recovery and empowerment of survivors. Their scholarship program, Hope's Cradle, Ambassador Program and more, are solution focussed and provide high transformational impact to survivors of abuse.

Jordan began her presentation with a theme ... "worst things can be a spark for better times".

At the age of 14, Jordan and her sister noticed that their mother did not have certain things, so they put

together \$20 each, which allowed them to buy her a bracelet. Amazing things happened as a result of this gift from her daughters, and it led their mother to view herself differently, and to give her a new outlook going forward. This change had a profound effect on Jordan.

Their family moved to Calgary when Jordan was 27. She decided to collect used jewelry in order to give small gifts to mothers generally. She had been abused as a child so she put the two ideas together to collect used jewelry, and due to the generosity of a particular business associate, she was able to put together 436 used jewelry packages which were given to women in the shelters.

Gems for Gems is committed to ending the cycle of domestic abuse by focussing on the economic recovery and empowerment of survivors. They created a 'Thrive Program' to help victims of abuse move from basic survival to thriving.

There are four pillars included in this 'Thrive Program':

- Financial literacy
- Coping skills from a psychologist
- Resilience from a speaker who has experienced abuse
- Preventative self-defense

One of the common challenges seen by supporters of abused victims is that no matter how bad it seems to get, the victims continue time after time to return to the abuser. Jordan advises that while such behaviour is on the face very difficult to understand, it is important that we



continue to support the victim as much as possible through this difficult time. She advises that it takes abused women 5 to 7 attempts to leave the source of the abuse before successfully leaving.

They have established a scholarship program with a focus on trade schools in order to give the abuse victims a path forward. There are a number of training facilities and programs which have agreed to provide a free scholarship cont'd on page 3 ...

to abuse victims who decide to further their education in order to create an employment opportunity. Jordan advises that aesthetics training is the favourite choice to date. She advises that this program was launched in 2019, and that 100% of the scholars are now small business owners.

Hope's Cradle

Hope's Cradle is a collaborative initiative to support mothers in need, and save infants from an unsafe abandonment. Gems for Gems is working with Fire Departments across the province and beyond, to ensure that a safe place to surrender babies is available to all in need. The reasons which lead women to this difficult choice vary, but most are in extremely desperate situations and feel there are no alternatives. They are asking for help for as many women and children as possible. This is a global epidemic which needs men and women to act now. Women who are trafficked and get pregnant result in potential abandoned babies.

Their Scholarship Program, Hope's Cradle, Ambassador Program and more, are solution focussed and provide high, transformational impact to survivors of abuse.

Jordan concluded her remarks by telling us about one of their newer initiatives, called 'Gems House', which will be a self-sustaining ecosystem for abuse victims where they can live (together with pets where necessary). This facility will provide a place where women can get prepared to move on with their lives to the next level.


Peter thanked Jordan for her excellent presentation.
