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Refugee Sponsorship Program Michelle Eng, Pastor, First Alliance Church

Our guest speaker was Michelle Eng, Pastor, First Alliance Church, speaking about their Refugee Sponsorship Program. Michelle began her presentation by relating that she is really pleased to be here today, as she has a special relationship with Rotary. While she is not a Rotarian at this time, she did have the opportunity of being a Rotary exchange student in 2011 through which she spent a year living in Turkey. It was during this year that she worked with a number of refugees in that country, which effectively changed her life. It was an amazing experience which combined her two life passions ... her passion for faith, and her passion for helping others.

As a Sponsorship Agreement Holder with the Government of Canada, the First Alliance Church (FAC) focuses on assisting individuals in the local Calgary area with submitting refugee applications. Every year, the Canadian government grants FAC a certain number of sponsorship spaces for refugees. The spaces are limited, and the need is great.

As a church, FAC helps refugees already sponsored by FAC when they arrive in Canada. There are many ways they can help — from the official details and financial support, to helping with English skills and simply building new friendships. They help make sponsored refugees feel welcome and a little less overwhelmed. Reach out to Michelle to ask how you can help welcome FAC-sponsored refugees to Calgary, explore a list of items which you can donate, or mark "refugee sponsorship" on your donation envelope to support a refugee family financially.

Michelle explained that it takes from one to four years to apply for an individual to be approved by our government as a refugee to Canada. It is more difficult to go through this process if one is initiating their application from a country in which Canada does not have an embassy. It is quite common for individuals who are already permanent residents of Canada, to wish to have other family members approved so they can relocate to Canada and join their family. A few of the obstacles which must be overcome are housing, access to furniture and other supplies, and dealing with language barriers, and often, mental health challenges.

FAC is an approved depot for the Calgary Foodbank and as such, has access to food resources to assist refugee families as necessary. They also provide a resource designed to assist refugees in learning to speak English, and Michelle reports that there are currently 65 refugees enrolled in such a class. She notes that 80% of new refugees have never been invited into a Canadian home.

Indigenous Fact

What is the largest First Nation in Alberta?

The largest First Nations cultural group by population in Alberta is the Cree, if the Woodlands Cree and Plains Cree are counted together. Thirty-two First Nations bands in Alberta are affiliated with Cree culture, and are related to other Cree peoples across Canada as far east as Labrador.

The History of April Fools' Day

The origins of April Fools' Day are somewhat unclear, but historians believe the tradition dates back centuries, possibly to the 16th century or even earlier. Here are some key theories about its history:

1. Calendar Change Theory (1582, France)
One of the most widely accepted theories suggests that April Fools' Day originated in France in 1582, when the country switched from the Julian calendar to the Gregorian calendar under Pope Gregory XIII. Under the Julian calendar, the new year was celebrated around April 1st. With the new Gregorian calendar, the new year was moved to January 1st. Some people, either unaware of the change or refusing to accept it, continued celebrating New Year's on April 1st. These people were ridiculed and called "April fools", and others played pranks on them.

2. Ancient Roman Festivals (Hilaria)

Some historians trace April Fools' traditions to the ancient Roman festival of Hilaria (Latin for "joyful"), which was celebrated at the end of March. During Hilaria, people wore disguises and mocked others, including public officials. This festival had elements of humor and deception similar to modern April Fools' Day.

3. Medieval England and "Fools' Errands"

In medieval Europe, especially in England and Scotland, there were traditions of sending people on "fools' errands" — wild goose chases to find things that didn't exist. This could have influenced the modern idea of playing practical jokes on April 1st.
