RI Convention 2025 & Brazil Friendship Exchange Anthony Tonkinson



Anthony volunteered to represent Bev, our Rotary International Convention Champion, and bring us up-to-date on what's happening. He will also tell us about the friendship exchange to Brazil.

Convention Update

There is an upcoming price increase for Convention Registration. It will increase by \$100 USD effective December 16th, so register soon. There are presently 78% of District Clubs with at least one member who has registered. The Break Out Sessions will be held at the BMO Centre. There will be free bus and C Train admission for all registered guests.

The Rotary Convention is offering four Signature Events, described as follows:

• On Saturday, June 21st (from 8pm to 10:30pm at

GMC Centre (Stampede Grounds) there will be a **'Grandstand Spectacular'**, described as "a spectacle of entertainment, showmanship, and toe-tapping tunes that'll have you hootin' and hollerin' all night long. From the electrifying performances of a dynamic marching band to the mesmerizing grace of Indigenous hoop dancing, there's something for everyone. And let's not forget the thrill of horseback relay races, where speed and skill collide in a whirlwind of excitement. Don't miss out on the ultimate celebration of the Wild West — grab your white hat and join us for an unforgettable experience!"

This event costs \$95 USD.

• On Sunday, June 22nd, there are two seperate events which are at the same time (7pm to 10pm), so each guest will have to select one or the other.

1. The first is **'Rocking The Big Tent'** and is described as follows: *"Get ready to kick up your boots and let loose at the Nashville North tent for an electrifying country concert experience! Join us for a night of unforgettable music, high-energy performances, and good ol' Southern charm. From twangy guitars to heartfelt lyrics, our lineup of talented country artists will have you singing along and two-stepping the night away. Whether you're a die-hard country fan or just looking for a boot-stompin' good time, this concert is the place to be. So grab your hat, gather your friends, and head on down to Nashville North for a country music extravaganza you won't want to miss!"*

This event costs \$60 USD.

2. The second event on Sunday, June 22nd, (from 7pm to 9pm) is '**New Blood with The Calgary Civic Symphony'** and is described as follows: *"a widely acclaimed theatre production that blends traditional Blackfoot music and dance with contemporary music by Grammy Award winning singer-songwriter Peter Gabriel to tell the life story of Chief Vincent Yellow Old Woman, a residential school survivor who overcame significant adversity to become Chief of the Siksika Nation in Alberta. The story, as told through the poem "The Indian in the Child", blends young Spirit Dancers with First Nations dance and drumming, and the music of Peter Gabriel performed by the Calgary Civic Symphony. New Blood is a powerful and*

Meeting Minutes





President Rob called our meeting to order at 12:15, welcoming all in attendance.

Indigenous Fact

Pemmican: Traditionally pemmican was prepared from the lean meat of large game animals such as buffalo, elk or deer. The meat was cut in thin slices and dried over a slow fire, or in the hot sun until it was hard and brittle. Then it was pounded into very

small pieces, almost powder-like in consistency, using stones. The pounded meat was mixed with melted fat with a ratio of approximately 50% pounded meat and 50% melted fat. In some cases, dried fruits such as saskatoon berries, cranberries, blueberries, or choke cherries were pounded into powder and then added to the meat/fat mixture. The resulting mixture was then packed into "green" rawhide pouches for storage.
