## Calgary Stampeders Jay McNeil, President

Our guest speaker today was introduced by Tammy, who has enjoyed a close relationship with the Stampeders organization for many years.

Jay has been President of the Stampeders since January 2024, after serving two years as the Vice President of Business Operations and, of course, as an All-Star Offensive Lineman with the team from 1994 to 2007. During those playing years, he received three All-Star recognitions and five West



Division All-Star honours. His playing career included winning two Grey Cups, in 1998 and 2001.

Jay has always resided in Calgary, where he built a strong business career after obtaining his Bachelor of Business Administration from Kent State University, and his MBA from the University of Fredericton. Jay and his wife Tara and his son Cuyler are big supporters in many ways of the Calgary community.

Jay began his remarks by highlighting that the Stampeder training camp opens tomorrow, and emphasizing that he truly does love football.

He will tell us today what it is that football teaches athletes. He was born and grew up in London Ontario and started playing football in grade 9. Jay was a tall and strong young man, and the coach of the high school recruited him to try out for football. He discovered that trying out for football turned out to require a lot of hard work, day after day. This amount of effort seriously cut into his opportunity to spend time with friends, so he quit the team. He advises that he tried all kinds of different sports during this period and quit them all. It turns out, however, that he discovered that he didn't like the feeling of quitting and being disappointed in himself.

He decided that he needed to change this feeling by giving all he had to actually make it through the training camp and hopefully make the team. So that is what he did the following football season, and it turned out to be a successful training camp and he did make the team.



He learned also that being on the team still required the same, if not more, effort and hard work. Most of the players on the team at that time (university years) were on scholarships, and even a number of them left the team rather than adapt to the work level required. #### **Indigenous Fact**

Tsuut'ina T'ina

Once part of the more northerly Danezaa ('Beaver Indians') Nation, the Tsuut'ina are part of the Athapaskan group who migrated south onto the Great Plains during the 1700s, prior to any written records of the area. The Tsuut'ina Nation is adjacent to the southwest city limits of Calgary. The northeast portion of the reserve was used as part of CFB Calgary, a Canadian Army base, from 1910-1998. The land was returned to the Nation by the Government of Canada.

Calgary Curling Club from Friday, May 9th through Sunday, May 18th. The host of the event is the Rotary Club of Calgary, and they have engaged with four other Rotary clubs in the city to provide volunteer assistance managing this event. Each of these clubs volunteered in different areas of the event (Calgary Chinook assisted in providing parking services). Each of the four clubs will be paid \$10,000 for their volunteer assistance during the event, and they will be in a position to distribute these funds to local evidence-based early literacy projects. The funds earned by Chinook in 2024 were donated to Big Brothers and Big Sisters of Calgary and area, and will be used to fund their early literacy program for children up to age eight.



#### **Host Hospitality Event**

Next up was Joe Hooper who was following up on the recently announced Home Hospitality Event being planned at the Legion during our upcoming Rotary International Convention in late June. This event is basically an evening of fellowship (scheduled for the evening of June 23rd) during which members and family from the Chinook Club will host approximately 60 visiting Rotarian families to an evening of good food and fellowship. We are seeking host Rotarians to attend this event and help sponsor the cost for the visiting Rotarians. For example, we are thinking that a single Rotarian would pay \$100 and this would subsidize themselves as well as two visiting Rotarians to a steak dinner with

the routine, he felt pride for having made the team and he just couldn't find it within himself to return to his hometown having dropped out. So he stuck it out, made the team, and ended up having a successful college career at Kent State. After college, he was drafted by the Calgary Stampeders.

He recalled that one of his agents early on gave him three points to remember to be successful in the game. The first point was "do something to get noticed", the second was "don't take any crap", and lastly, "don't make the same mistake twice". He advises that over his career these three items have stood up well.

He also has learned that there are five traits that he recommends for success:

- 1. hard work; 2. perseverance; 3. teamwork; 4. passion;
- 5. leadership

If we work hard trying to develop these traits, then we can become a real life champion.

Jay then told us about this year's football team, and the challenges they face turning around negative attendance and developing a winning team, which will encourage both existing and new season ticket holders to re-book for the 2025 season.

To accomplish this goal, the team has hired some new coaches. They have arranged for a new proven quarterback, and they have the first draft pick in this year's player draft. He says this will guarantee that we will be bigger and bolder, and prove that we are committed to making 2025 a success. Their number one goal is to win a Grey Cup Championship in 2025, and he highlighted that we have successfully arranged to host the Grey Cup Game in 2026. He highlighted also that we have made more trades in November than we had made in entire years in the past. In addition, they have improved the actual McMahon Stadium facility by improving locker rooms and improving the workout area for players.

From a business viewpoint, Jay pointed out that if 14% of Calgary came to only one game, they would reach their attendance goals for 2025. They have established the "Stampeder Bowl" which will

be played during the Calgary Stampede in Calgary against Winnipeg. There will be a significant half-time show and they are hoping to develop a strong attendance for this new game, something like the popularity of our Labour Day game against Edmonton in September.

He wrapped up his comments by highlighting how important it is for the Stampeder players to continue to have a positive impact on the communities in Calgary, and he noted that last year they made 337 appearances throughout Calgary, and spent 530 community hours doing so.

Tammy thanked Jay for his presentation today, and noted that everyone is excited to see what the Stampeders are going to do in 2025. We are excited to see how the new quarterback makes out, and whether we can make the playoffs and possibly go further this year. She advised Jay that Rotary has been working hard to eradicate Polio from the world, and in appreciation of his presentation today we will be making a donation to "Polio Plus" to help accomplish this goal.
