Rob introduced our guest speaker, District 5360 Governor Christina Hassan. Christina is an Estates Practitioner. assisting families in estate planning. estate administration, guardianship and trusteeship applications, and representing adult disputes and estate litigation. She was born and raised in rural Ontario, and has carved her career much like she has contributed to her family farm — through dedication, collaboration, problem-solving and entrepreneurial spirit. She earned a Bachelor degree in Science, and a Masters in Public Health from the University of Waterloo. Christina and her husband decided to make Calgary their home, and the foundation for their careers.



Christina's exceptional career accomplishments include her recognition as one of Avenue Magazine's "Top 40 under 40". She firmly believes that her clients deserve a formidable advocate who possesses qualities of diligence, creativity, assertiveness and compassion. Christina is an avid Rotarian with a deep commitment to embodying the Rotary motto of 'Service above Self'. Her dedication to volunteerism has garnered her numerous accolades, including District Governor of Rotary District 5360, the Queen's Platinum Jubilee Medal, the United Nations People of Action Young Innovator Award, Paul Harris Fellow, Faculty of Health Young Alumni Award, and the Terry Fox Humanitarian Award. While wholeheartedly dedicating her time to her career and Rotary, her highest priority lies in spending quality time with her husband, children, and their family dog, Jolie.

Christina began her presentation by thanking us for welcoming her to our club today. She advised that her presentation today would be two parts: the first during which she would relate to us her Rotary journey, and the second would be an outline of what's happening at the district.

Her Rotary journey began at the age of 13 years old when she went to Rotary with a boy who was an exchange student. Discussing the opportunity with the new exchange student and finding out that it included many new friends, the opportunity to learn a new language, and being away from family for a year, all resulted in her developing a real interest in becoming an exchange student herself. She found a Rotary Club near her home, and prepared by getting her passport and visiting the club. She advised the club members that she could be ready to embark on her Rotary exchange student journey within two weeks, and that she was willing to go anywhere. The members thanked her for showing an interest in becoming an exchange student, however told her that she was too young at this point to do so. They invited her to participate in various volunteer situations over the next couple of years, and by doing so, they developed a close relationship which ultimately did lead to Christina becoming an exchange student (to Germany). Christina came back to Canada determined to become a Rotarian as soon as possible. She stayed connected with Rotary by becoming an Interact member while cont'd on page 3 ...

Indigenous Fact

Deerfoot-Bad Meat was born in 1864 on traditional Blackfoot territory (now the Blackfoot Indian Reserve) on the Western Canadian plains. He was the son of Nato-West-Sitsi (Medicine Fire) and nephew of Big Chief Crowfoot. By 1880, Deerfoot-Bad Meat had become

an exceptional long distance runner working as a messenger for the Blackfoot Confederacy running between camps in the North-West Territories and the Montana Territory. He continued to run successfully in many more local races in the Calgary area and beyond, defeating challengers from as far as away as Europe. In 1886 he won the prestigious Dominion 1-Mile Race, coming within a second of breaking the world record for that distance.

We had 27 participants at our meeting today which included 3 **Guests**: Guest Speaker and District Governor Christina Hassan, and Josette Fraiman and Kim Levenson, guests of Sharon Fraiman. Our guests were introduced by Alex Soutar and welcomed with our 'Welcome to Rotary' verse.





Rob **thank**ed Paul for being our scribe today. He also thanked Brennen and Alex for being our greeters today, and for making everyone feel welcome. He thanked Stephen and Anne for all they do for our Club, most notably the regular production of our e-Arch. In addition, we also wish to thank both Peter and Neil for operating our payment system.

she was in high school, and joined Rotaract while attending University. She also met her husband through Rotary. Here in Calgary, they are members of the Fish Creek Rotary Club, and they consider their Monday evening dinner meeting to be their date night.

Christina developed Stage 4 Thyroid Cancer while in high school, and credits Rotary relationships with giving her the strength

and encouragement to face the battle of dealing with the cancer. At the age of 23, she was given a clean bill of health and decided that it was time to give back. She arranged to travel to Uganda for a period of four months to teach a course on public health. She was provided with information showing children dealing with disease and death in Uganda, however when she was actually in the classroom in Uganda, she realized that she did not have the actual experience needed to appreciate what the local people were dealing with. She visited the Rotary Club in Uganda and got contacts which allowed her to work in the local hospital providing assistance in the delivery room. She saw some very challenging situations, but gained a great deal of experience during the four months delivering babies and working in the hospital.

Upon returning to Calgary from her visit to Uganda, she shared her experiences with her Rotary Club. This led directly to them building a helpful solution to assist with providing equipment and assistance to the Ugandan hospital. Christina learned through the miracle of Rotary, that she could play a part in helping others around the world with their needs and issues.

The second subject which Christina wanted to address today was our District. She advised that she has found that the district board is very strong and providing great governance to our district. She noted that one of the most important resources in the district has to do with membership (led by Jeff Foss). Our district is the only one in North America that is membership positive as of July 31st (after the first month of the 2024/2025 Rotary year).

Christina then discussed the upcoming Rotary International Convention being held in Calgary next June. She noted that they expect up to 30,000 people to be visiting Calgary for this Convention. She advised that in the eyes of many Rotarians, Calgary's first Rotary International Convention which was held in 1996, was considered to be the best ever they attended. She believes that this opinion is built upon western hospitality, and it is our goal to offer the same hospitality to all the Rotarians who will be visiting our city next June. We will need 1,000 volunteers to make this happen. She noted also that there will not be a District Conference in the spring of 2025, due to the fact that the international convention is occurring in Calgary during the same month.

Christina wrapped up her comments by advising that she will stay with us after the meeting so she can meet any members who have any questions.

Rob thanked Christina for her excellent presentation and referred to her as an inspiration to all Rotarians.
