The History of Christmas Bart Dailley

Our speaker today was our very own Bart Dailley. He spoke about the History of Christmas, and while your scribe will do his best to capture some of these moments of history, he acknowledges up front that it is impossible to capture Bart's speaking skill, his humour, and his delivery style.

The concept of Christmas began in the lands of Rome during the first century when people wanted to celebrate the birth of Jesus. Rome had many governing rules, one of which outlawed new religions. So the followers of Jesus had to be covert in their desire to celebrate, and this led to December 25th being chosen as the day of celebration. It seems that there was a non-related festival taking place from December 17th to 24th, which meant that a



celebration on the 25th wouldn't be noticed as the Roman dignitaries would be distracted and hung over.

In the 4th century, Constantine became a Christian so it became safe to celebrate Jesus. The Christian Pope confirmed to the people that Jesus was in fact born on December 25th so it fit right in with the existing celebrations. Nordic and Germanic peoples moved into the Roman lands, and they added their own celebration styles to the Christmas season.

Germany adopted the celebration of Christmas in the year 813, and by 900, the entirety of Europe had joined this tradition. In the 1500s Italy's Francis of Assisi introduced the concept of the Nativity scene, showing Jesus' birth with the three wise men and the Star of David.

From the English perspective, Henry the 8th, Elizabeth the 1st, and James the 1st all celebrated Christmas. When the Protestants were in charge, Catholics had to be restrained in their activities, and in 1600 the puritans took control and Christians were told to celebrate at home and not in public. Queen Victoria revived Christmas in Britain.

In 1818 the Christmas Carol story was created and turned into a play, and the song 'Silent Night' was written. In the late 1800s the concept of Santa Claus was created and the poem "'twas the Night Before Christmas" was written.

In 1931 the US firm known as Coca Cola hired an artist to come up with a visual image which would attract young people to their product, and he came up with a picture of two young people giving a cola bottle to Santa Claus. Santa had previously been depicted wearing a green coat and the artist changed it to red to conform with the Coke brand.

Bob May made up a story about a red-nosed reindeer named Rudolf for his children and ultimately, was encouraged to write it up for others to enjoy.

Did You Know or Wish to Know?

As time goes by in this service club, part of a huge international and very inclusive organization, there are constant changes in the manner in which we function but not in the motto, Service Above Self, or the principals of the FOUR WAY TEST. On the other hand, club demographics changed, attendance rules relaxed, meeting places and Board meeting venues changed, focus on fellowship declined somewhat, and then along came the international pandemic COVID that really threw a curve at everything.

From the beginning of our club in the 70s, we followed hard and fast attendance rules. Miss one meeting, noticed but not uncommon. Miss two in a row, get a notice from the club secretary, that one more without explanation or proof of make-up would result in expulsion! if a holiday was taken where Rotary had a presence, you were expected to include attendance there as part of your holiday. If no Rotary was available, you requested a leave of absence for the time away. 100% attendance by members was rewarded annually by presentation of a pin acknowledging the member's efforts. Some of which in our club, were successful for uninterrupted attendance for decades, makeups included of course! The photo shows club members in 1985 being acknowledged for 100% attendance or longer that

year, many you can still recognize that continue as members now.

Before the joint Calgary clubs began a program of recognizing community individuals through Integrity Awards, our club was already doing it annually. Club members were invited to submit the name of a candidate with a summary as to why. The club



committee would review each, and select one, who would be presented with a Paul Harris Fellowship at a regular meeting, and have his or her special contribution recognized. We did a number of these over the years. The photo shows the late Esther Robins receiving her award. She was the founder of CANCERMOUNT, an organization dedicated to the fighting of cancer. Her Husband Murray Robins, now in his mid 90s is in the photo too.

The Board used to meet once every month, at a different Board member's home. The hosting member provided light snacks after the meeting and some wine or beer, coffee or soft drinks as part of the fellowship. There was no expense submitted to the club.

Attendance at the RI Convention was encouraged, to the incoming President but not mandatory. There was no club expense budget for this Convention in the early years, some of us covered the cost on our own. Later the club became better funded so as to cover the incoming President's travel and registration cost, in the hopes the experience would benefit the club when he or she was in office.

District Conferences were usually multi Member participation and more social. The district was huge then, taking in all Alberta, the SW corner of Saskatchewan and NE corner of BC. Now we have the challenge of restoring club activity to before COVID nightmares.

Gene Autry made it into a Christmas song and the rest is history.

Bart then moved on to personal memories of Christmas past which were both humorous and moving. He says that he doesn't really miss his days as Santa Claus' assistant, but he does miss his many wonderful experiences associated with his involvement with the Santa Claus Parade. He told us about a lad who saw Bart going into his house, still dressed as Santa, and knocked on his door and said, "My brother says Santa is not real", to which Bart responded by reaching out towards the boy and said, "Ggo ahead, touch my arm, now you know I'm real". This led to a number of continuing knocks on the door as the boy took full advantage of his private access to Santa.

Another story was about a boy who begged his mother to ask Bart if he was Santa. Bart said he was and the boy nervously approached and Bart tells the boy to keep his secret and not tell others he was Santa. It turns out that Bart had occasion to visit a school shortly after this took place, and who turns up but the same boy who he had asked not to tell. Bart proceeds to tell the boy that he is only pretending to be Bart Dailley and asks him once again no to tell anyone he is Santa.

Bart also told us about two brothers that he met during a Santa session. The first boy started telling Bart about the items he wanted for Christmas, and kept going for the longest time, a long list for sure. When the brother had a chance to ask Santa for what it was he wanted, he paused for a moment and then said, "What I want is that you give my brother everything he wants, we don't know how long we'll have him". After the session Bart spoke to their parents and discovered that the first boy had terminal cancer. The boy passed the following August.

It turned out that all three of these people were in fact Jesus, who blessed the Christian, and told him how well he had treated all three of his visitors that day.
