## Kerby Center Danielle Murphy and Lori Wilson

Our two speakers Danielle Murphy and Lori Wilson work in the Fund Development Department at Kerby Centre. They proceeded to provide an outline of the services that the Centre provides. These are outlined in the attached slides from their presentation. These services for seniors cover the gamut of assisting seniors in abusive situations (financial and physical), food security, info services, education, and an adult day program providing support and respite..



The pandemic has had a significant impact on the Centre. They had to close their doors and move online to ZOOM and other such digital services. Food security and social isolation became a concern and a focus. Many seniors experienced a loss of their support system, and Kerby Centre tried to fill that gap providing checks on seniors and food delivery. Elder abuse increased with neglect and financial exploitation.



A number of programs are run focusing on the mental, physical, spiritual and social well being of their senior clients.

Questions addressed the number of abuse beds (nine plus one emergency). They have space to increase this but lack the funding for more staffing at present. COVID drove then to shift to a single accommodation model, but the experience has shown the benefits of this structure, and it will likely be the focus moving forward.

As mentioned above, seniors abuse is an issue. Primarily financial and scams, but also neglect and food security. Micro aggressions are also common given the stress we are all under currently.



The speakers were not aware of the origin of the Kerby name. Prior to





**KERBY ELDER ABUSE SHELTER**

- 2022 19% increase in calls for help
- 17% older adults reported for sexual abuse in the last 12 months
- The shelter has 16 private rooms plus 2 shared rooms for women living alone

**FOOD SECURITY PROGRAM**

- 5,000 People have access to our daily FREE food bags in food markets this year
- Our Food Security Program (started 4,000 sq ft) is up next along with free healthcare needs
- We serve 11,000 lbs of groceries (shelves) from 2015

**INFORMATION SERVICES**

300 years of arts served in 2021 to older adults and their families through presentations and resources related to the community.

Here we are, end of January 2022 enjoying, likely briefly, some spring like weather. In less than 2 months, we will celebrate our Club's 45 th year since we were chartered as a club in the Rotary International roster on March 14th 1977). A few of us, just 4 until a few days ago, were part of that charter night celebration at the Palliser on April 12 1977, hosted by our sponsor clubs, The Rotary Club of Calgary (downtown) and The Rotary club of Calgary South.

We had begun our formation in the summer/fall of 1976 ... in fact our very first newsletter, prepared by Charter President Greg McLellan for the 25 members designated, was dated November 16 1976.
