Calgary Horticultural Society Natasha Guillot

Today's speaker was Natasha Guillot from the Calgary Horticultural Society. Her background includes growing up on a farm in eastern Canada. Twenty years ago, she moved to Alberta and had careers at Shell Environmental, the Calgary Flames Foundation and the United Way. Returning to education, she earned a



degree in Prairie Horticulture from Olds College. She then joined the Calgary Horticultural Society in 2019.

The Society is one of the oldest in Canada. Started by William Reader, it continues with its vision and focus on Parks and Greenspaces in Calgary. Recently it has added a focus on helping newcomers to grow things in Calgary's challenging environment. The links to the community has seen them assist with green spaces, most recently in China Town, and also at the Centre for Newcomers.

2022 will see the Society headquarters move to the former Richmond Green Clubhouse. This move excites them with both the increased space for education, and the extensive grounds surrounding the new offices.

Natasha finished her presentation with a plug for those interested to become members of the Society. It has free talks, various resources, and classes, both online and in person given by local experts.


President George thanked her and advised that a Polio Plus donation will be made in her name. cont'd on page 3.

The next meeting will be on February 24th at 7:00pm. In March the plan is to return to in person meetings. More on this to follow.


President George thanked all for attending, and closed the meeting at 1:05pm.

Did You Know or Care to Know?

The McKenzie Meadows Golf course is situated on lands that were formerly a gravel pit, and owned by Alberta Provincial Parks. Several co-investors and I acquired the lands on a long term lease arrangement with Provincial Parks, to develop the public golf course in the early 90s. The lands included the course as it is now built, and the smaller parcel on the south side of 22X, which was to have been another part of the golf course in the form of a nine hole short course and another driving range. I arranged for golf course architect Gary Browning to do the concept drawings for the whole project, and detailed construction specs for the main golf course. It became very evident that the proposed smaller course on the south side of 22X and the driving range there would be seriously compromised if built, by a clause in the lease agreement that would have us vacate those lands on 30 days notice IF there was a need to use the utility corridor adjacent to 22X running east and west. This was a deal breaker as far as constructing a golf facility at a cost of several millions was concerned. We maintained the lease and I assured Parks officials I would find an alternate way of developing it for public use that would not interfere with the utility corridor. That corridor already contained a major natural gas supply line. There were discussions about possible road expansion and overhead power lines, so the change of proposed use was logical.

Ed McLean, another Rotarian member, (serving as club president 1993/94) and I had been discussing trying to do a significant project to create for public use. We had been focused on South Glenmore Park, where we had made significant improvements by tree planting ... perhaps buy an old barn, have it relocated, the building available for community use and our club lunch meetings. It became apparent quickly that this was far too ambitious and terribly expensive. BINGO! I suggested why not approach the Provincial government to allow a Nature Park to be developed, in the name of our club, on the south side of 22X. Ed agreed 100% as there was no land cost, no utilities, no lease and no property tax. The improvements would be at our expense, which I proposed to the government Parks officials, through drawings and renderings, through several meetings following the opening of McKenzie Meadows Golf course in May 1996. The Club unanimously agreed to this urban footprint in the name of our club and the project began.

Corporate donors were willing to support us, with token recognition on site. Most were companies I had dealt with plus both my sons, through their employers at the time, donated substantially, and services for architecture and co-ordination were free of charge. McKenzie Meadows provided much support and materials, and occasional manpower. All have been identified on features in the Park, which officially opened June 18, 2002. It has since been shut down a few times for utility corridor needs,



the flood of 2013 and more recently, the 22X lane expansion. We hope all will be accessible this spring and we can return to having our Annual Picnic in the Park club luncheon in August.

We now have a strong Rotary Club Administration Committee going forward, which will introduce new ideas and maintain the existing infrastructure as The Rotary Club of Calgary Chinook NATURE PARK. Thanks to George Kimura (President 2018/19), Rob Wolfson (President 2020/21), Bill Stemp and Dean White with Neil Beatty as club director for creating the new committee.


