Service Canada Ray Ivanus, Citizen Services Specialist

Our speaker today was Ray Ivanus who is a Citizen Services Specialist with Service Canada. Service Canada was created in 2005 to improve the delivery of Government programs and services to Canadians by making access to them faster, easier and more convenient. They work with community partners to provide information on programs that benefits all their clients, including Indigenous Peoples, families and children, newcomers to Canada, persons with disabilities, seniors, Veterans and their families, youth and students.

Through Service Canada you can access more than 70 services including (to highlight a few) Employment Insurance, CPP, OAS, Passport Services, Veteran issues, Canada Summer Jobs, job bank and many more.



Ray reviewed numerous aspects of CPP, OAS and the Guaranteed Income Supplement, and rather than attempt to repeat everything here, we will simply highlight a number of his major points and provide his contact information for further questions.

Points of Interest

- Check the www.canada.ca website for details on all their programs
- It's a good idea to consult a Financial Planner before finalizing retirement
- Calgary's Kirby Centre can help by providing information and filling out necessary forms
- OAS is portable to other countries
- Everyone should consider setting up a "My Service Canada Account" which opens the door to many programs and related information
- He suggests you call the government at 8:30 sharp midweek, never on a Monday or Friday (for the best service)

Meeting Minutes

January 17th, 2023 Scribe: Paul Gaudet





President Bev called our meeting to order at 12:15, welcoming all in attendance, followed by the singing of O Canada. Our single guest today was our speaker, Ray Ivanus from Service Canada. We had 29 participants at our meeting.

Our Indigenous Fact for the day In September, 2021, Suncor Energy announced a partnership with 8

Indigenous Groups and First Nations located in the Oil Sands area, permitting them to purchase part of the existing northern courier pipeline. These partners will purchase 15% of the pipeline with a value of \$1.3 billion. This will provide stable revenue to these communities for decades to come.

Bev thanked Monty (who has volunteered to take our meeting minutes during February) for being our scribe today (see Sergeant at Arms below). She also thanked John Charrett and George Kimura (our greeters today) for making everyone feel welcome.

While lunch was being served, Bev told us about their trip to Mexico. They had an opportunity to attend a Rotary meeting at the Club (Guayobitos) in which our "Friend" and frequent volunteer, Sydney Richmond, is a member. They heard about their various community projects and discussed how we could work on joint projects. Bev also noted that she and Anthony were able to attend a few Rotary meetings by using Zoom which allowed them to keep in touch.

Sunshine Report

George reports that Pat Hutchinson is recovering at home. Apparently he cannot drive currently due to the level of medications he is taking. He passed his best wishes to all his Rotary friends.

Bev noted that Ruth Wiley was at our meeting and asked her for a health update. Ruth confirmed that she is doing well.

Slate of Directors Update

George advised us that our Club was still in need of two additional

Directors (for Community Service and Club Service) to serve on next year's Board. This is a great opportunity to join our leadership group for a two year term and we hope two of our members will step forward to volunteer. On a positive note, George announced that Rob Wolfson has put his name forward to serve as President Elect next year, and therefore will follow Anthony into the President's chair. This news was met with a hearty ovation from those in attendance.

Rotary Minutes

• Bev told us that the Chinese New Year was upcoming on January 22nd. This will be the year of the Rabbit and leads to a 15 day celebration worldwide.

We currently have a group 13 attending the "Larry Kwong Dinner" which is being held at the Regency Palace Restaurant on Centre Street on January 27th at 6pm.

- Anthony announced that our District Conference is being held this year in Lethbridge, and that registration is open through the District Website. The regular cost is \$350 with an Early Bird cost of \$325. The event takes place on May 5th and 6th.
- Paul took a moment to remind our members of our upcoming bottle/cans collection day on Tuesday, January 24th at the Tonkinson residence in Lake Bonavista.

As Bev and Anthony are back at home, we can actually drop our bottles off any day up until the 24th. Please try to join us in raising funds for our various activities.

• John Charrett provided a report on this year's Fairview Mentorship Program with Roots2STEM. It has commenced on Friday, January 13th with 14 students attending the two hour session. John and Hank provided supervisory assistance at this first event, with Dean providing overall direction. The entire program involves 10 sessions taking place every other Friday

and volunteers are needed. Please contact John if you would be able to participate.





John also confirmed that Dean's Roots2STEM operation is now an accredited STEM School, (Congratulations to Dean).

- Jim Thompson reported that he will be undergoing a second surgery on his hip to repair a problem which has developed, and would be unable to attend meetings for a week or two. He took the opportunity to tell us that he supports the Officers Club at Currie Barracks as a potential host for our two meetings each month. He asks that we take an opportunity to visit the site.
- Dave Wylie reported that we have a legal requirement to provide Board Meeting minutes and we have done so on our website, and are updating this historic record on an ongoing basis. Sergeant at Arms:


