Roots 2 STEM Dean White, Director of Youth Services



George called on our Director of Youth Services, Dean White, who told us about Roots 2 STEM, the business he has created to provide a "STEM" education to the youth in our community.

Dean is an engineer by profession and truly loves STEM education, which is an acronym for Science, Technology, Engineering, Mathematics. He believes that it is challenging for our regular schools to provide this area of instruction as they lack both trained instructors and the proper tools.

Roots 2 STEM is a non profit operation which began in 2014 and reaches 1600 students per year. It operates out of a 7,100 sq ft facility in SE Calgary which has been entirely set up for STEM education, including large rooms for demonstrations as well as individual lab facilities.

Roots 2 STEM conducts many and varied types of training to a wide spectrum of students, including:

- **Junior Engineers**
- Aerospace Academy
- **Summer Camps**
- Maker Fare
- **Rotary Mentoring**
- Space Camp (launch actual rockets)
- Chinook Rotary Programs for Indigenous and underprivileged youth





Their operation relies on the support of volunteers to provide low student to adult ratios and closer assistance. They are developing partnerships with service groups ROOTS **2 STEM** (such as Rotary), community groups and corporations.

John Charret took the podium to give the perspective of a Rotary volunteer, and reported that the facility is extremely impressive. We have been involved with Fairview Junior High for 25 years and currently provide 10 learning sessions for their students at Roots 2 STEM during the January to May period. The school administration continues to express their appreciation for this partnership. John notes that we will continue to require volunteers from Chinook to make this program work. John thanked those members who volunteered this year (Bev and Anthony, Rhea, Dale, Hank, Paul G., and a number of Tammy's staff (which she graciously provides), and of course John himself. He urges members to select Youth Service as a volunteer activity for the upcoming year.

Dean reported on the Chinook Rotary Society Programs which involve providing training to underprivileged youth, and includes providing cont'd on page 4 ...

Directors' Reports

Garth Plunkett, Director of Club Financial.



Garth firstly discussed our fundraising activity which includes a variety of projects, large and small. The largest and the one with the most potential is our RibFest, being held this year at McMahon Stadium on September 9th, 10, and 11th. Our RibFest for the Rotary year just ending was a "Drive Thru" event due to COVID, also at McMahon. It was a partnership between Chinook, Centennial and Calgary East and raised a total of \$9,000.

We just held our Casino on June 16th and 17th and we anticipate raising between \$65,000 and \$75,000 from this event.

Our Fundraising Committee worked hard developing our "Roses for Teachers" project through which we thanked the staff of the three schools with which we have a long relationship (two Interact Clubs and our Mentorship program). We completed Henry Wise Wood and Dr E P Scarlett this winter, and expect to complete Fairview Junior High in the Fall. We consider this event to be an excellent way to improve our identity within the community and to hopefully make a small profit. Garth also noted our Bottle Dive

activity, our Value Village project, our many sports pools and our weekly Chase the Ace pool. Garth thanked Rob and the Fundraising Committee for their efforts in making these events successful.

Garth then thanked Anne Dale who chaired the Foundation Committee this year. We have a total of 27 members who donate monthly to the Rotary Foundation and many Paul Harris Fellowships are awarded each year. Rob is chairing our CRCF Foundation and we recently received a \$11,000 dividend (interest earned from our total contributions) which will help our Society provide educational services to the less fortunate.

Neil Beatty, Club International Report



Our next Director to the podium was Neil Beatty who is the Director of Club International. Graham would normally be making this International report however he is currently hospitalized. Neil was pleased to present his report.

- A global grant application for the training of teachers for the improvement of hearing and the rehabilitation of children's hearing in Pakistan has been submitted to the Rotary Foundation.
- We have received commitments and grants for the funds necessary for our girl empowerment project in the Dominican Republic.
- Some \$9,700 was previously forwarded to the Medical Mercy TB Clinic in Kovel, Ukraine. The funds will remain designated until such time that it is safe to carry out the project.
- We have supported the "RACHEL" children's educational project in Guatemala which brings a digital library facility to offline communities
- We are helping (with a \$1,500 donation) a UK Rotary Club with their project to drill a borehole for the provision of clean water for a STEM school in Zambia.
- have agreed to support (with a \$2,400 donation) a school project in Guatemala which will provide desks, chairs and kitchen equipment. We have applied for a District Grant to further fund this project.
- We are helping Calgary North with

their planned global project in Nigeria which will supply 4 brick making machines to assist in the reconstruction of damaged houses. Our DDF grant for \$5,000 has been approved.

• A \$4,000 donation has been paid to the Rotary Foundation (Canada) to go towards the Ukraine Disaster Response and our District will be matching our donation.

We currently have \$2,060 of our original \$25,000 budget not allocated.

Neil Beatty, Community Service Report

Neil then changed hats and announced that he would also be presenting the Community Service Report as Director Dale Perret was unavailable to attend today's meeting.

Our Community Service budget was \$20,000 and it has been allocated as follows:

- \$10,500 to the Acadia Food Pantry which distributes food hampers to the needy.
- \$5,000 to the Kerby Centre which provides housing support for seniors.
- \$2,000 to Inclusion Alberta to support employment for special needs employees.
- \$2,000 to Community Kitchens towards the purchase of a new vehicle.
- \$500 to the All Chairs initiative to improve technology.

Sandy Swan, Director of Club Operations



Our next presenter was Sandy Swan who is the Director of Club Operations. This covers Greeters, Scribes, Club visits to other Clubs, and our Membership Committee. Paul H is doing a good job handling greeters and Paul G is handling Scribes.

COVID has limited visits to other Clubs but hopefully we can encourage this to restart soon. This is a simple concept and calls for

our members to attend the meetings of other Rotary Clubs and return with any ideas which might make sense for our Club to adopt.

Our efforts to increase our membership have been very challenged, and Sandy notes that such challenges are being experienced worldwide. Our Committee (chaired by Michael Spears) has tried hard to find a way to attract new members but unfortunately success has yet to occur. The committee contacted the majority of ex-members who have left the Club in recent years, and have outlined our new meeting structure in the hope that they might return. We do have a number who have expressed interest but nothing solid as of yet. We worked with RI's guide for finding new members by asking our membership to recommend their various contacts so our committee could reach out to them, however this has not yet generated new leads. The committee also recommended to our Board that we take a look at creating several new membership categories (such as a family plan and categories for younger members) which might carry reduced dues for some period. These recommendations are under review and further information is being gathered. We are also looking at new initiatives to integrate the important areas of Inclusion and Diversity into our membership structure and our Club generally.

Lastly, we are planning to have a tent at our RibFest filled with Rotary information and volunteers to provide information and encouragement to visitors to join Rotary.

Dean White, Director of Youth Service



Our final Director to take the floor was Dean White who represents Youth Service. Dean began by thanking his Youth Committee comprised of Ron May, Dale Perret and Rhea Graham. • He reported that 7 local high school students have received \$1,000 bursaries plus a personal plaque. The Father Greg bursary is for \$2,000.

• We supported 4 students at Rotary's RYLA leadership program at a cost of \$2,000 each.

- Our Mentorship Program with Fairview Junior High went forward this spring and included 16 students being hosted by Roots2STEM, and involved a number of Club volunteers. Dean characterized the program as a great success. In the fall we hope to be involved with Rotary's Rypen program for local students.
- Our Scout Canada troop is getting back into activity now that COVID is permitting them to do so.
- The committee is looking at several options with regard to getting involved with Youth Exchange in some fashion, and Dean will be preparing a report with recommendations.
- •Our two Interact clubs have been fairly inactive during COVID and we are looking forward to encouraging their return to activity in the Fall.
- Rhea highlighted that we have done a good job keeping our Youth programs reasonably active during the year.

President George thanked all the Directors for their work during the year and for presenting their reports today. He also thanked all our members who worked on all our committees, doing their best to serve our community. He took the opportunity to encourage all our members to consider Bev's request for committee participation, and to reply to her as soon as possible.

Our **next meeting** will be on Tuesday, July 5th at noon and will include the "Passing of the Gavel" and the opportunity to welcome in our new President and our new Board. Please don't miss this opportunity to start our new Rotary year in the best possible fashion.

George thanked everyone for attending today and offered best wishes to all. Meeting adjourned at 1:30.




