International Services Report

• Menstrual Health Management Project in the Dominican Republic

Pay for production of 3,800 hygiene kits. Kits will be distributed to girls at the time that education re Menstrual Health Management is offered. Project should be completed in a couple of months.

Pan American Health Organization reports that an estimated 44 percent of school dropouts in the Dominican Republic are a consequence of teenage

pregnancy, limiting adolescents'

professional development and later their employment, increasing the social gap and continuing the cycle of poverty. The education provided to these girls should help to reduce the high teen pregnancy rate.



• Survival Garden Kits Project in South Africa — to raise funds for 1,000 Kits

We provided funds to enable the Hillcrest Rotary Club to purchase 38 kits. A kit consists of the Hippo Water Roller which can contain 90 litres of H2O, plus compost, a rake, hoe, spade, seedlings and instructions on how to garden. We provided additional funds for the purchase of 10 kits which were given to the Lily of the Valley Children's Village. The Hippo Foundation now has a goal to raise funds for 10,000 Survival Kits.







RACHEL Educational Project in Guatemala





This is an \$81,875 US project run by the RC of Chatham, Ontario. 6 local Rotary Clubs supported the project. The RACHEL server is like a mini internet designed for the children who might access it. Expect to provide 10 RACHEL servers in 10 schools and 10 laptops in each

school. Demand for laptops has been so high that this program will also provide 500 Chromebooks for 55 schools that have been provided with RACHEL servers in previous years. Program attacks illiteracy and lack of education in the area.

• Masango Water Project in Burundi

We were working with Markham Sunrise RC on a water project in Burundi. The aim was to pipe water to the village of Masango and to the cont'd on page 4 ...

He told us about his partner, Sarah, who works at the Foothills Hospital as a respiratory therapist, which is a heart and lung specialist. She saves lives and helps maintain them. She just moved from the Foothills ICU to the OR unit, learning new skills each day and powering through the tough days which is what he admires about her. She is what our healthcare system needs because she loves what she

does and it makes him appreciate her more and more each day. They met when Brennen was 19, and they have been together for 11 years. They are working towards their dream, which is a hobby farm with horses. They look forward to their tiny home which will be constructed on their parents' acreage.

He then switched to talking about his family business. He has followed in his father's footsteps and began landscaping and snow removal over 18 years ago. What started as a summer job ended up as a manager of multiple turf and snow removal crews for large condominiums and commercial buildings in Calgary and the surrounding area. He is a landscape journeyman and seasoned equipment operator, and is experienced in human resource management. He presented a brief one minute video which they had made showing some of the work they did on the Stampede Ranch, and some of the equipment which they used there and in other situations. He wrapped up his comments by thanking everyone once again for the opportunity to speak.

He also took the opportunity to thank Jim Thompson who introduced him into Rotary, and expressed how he appreciates how Jim speaks so kindly of his family and of their company. He went on to say that coming into Rotary everyone has been very kind and welcoming. This has helped make everything much more comfortable. Quiacquix Water and Sanitation Project in Guatemala





This is a \$ 138.300 US project, and the application is currently under review by the Foundation. It is sponsored by the RC of Heritage Park, and 8 local clubs are supporting the project. It involves the piping of water into the homes of 400 families. A micro meter in each home will keep track of water usage. Clean

water can be used for drinking, cooking, bathing, and clothes washing. There is no health clinic. Most homes have a packed earth floor. Cooking is done inside the home so there is heavy soot blackening the inside walls and roof. Access to water will provide a lot of relief to these very needy folks.



• Cambodia Literacy Project

Rotary Club of Calgary is the international sponsor for this 3rd phase of this literacy project in Cambodia. This \$ 117,000 program will provide computers, speakers, laminate machines, storybooks, cabinets and coloured pencils. RC of Pursat provides computer training which should empower the teachers.



• Help Walking Project in Colombia

This project involves the acquisition of equipment and treatment of foot disabilities for children. This is a \$ 130,000 USD project sponsored by the RC of Stampede Park. The Foundation has approved the project. Equipment has been ordered and should arrive in the spring.
