Our program this week was a presentation by Hank Popoff on the Rotary Foundation as November is "Foundation Month". The TRF Committee had researched the RI database and had selected two videos which were on topic and heart warming reminders of how TRF makes a difference in our world. Unfortunately we ran into sound challenges and were unable to present them. Hank was fully prepared and proceeded with a power point presentation to deliver the message.

The Rotary Foundation, in the latest full year for which data is available (2021-2022), reports revenue of (USD) \$304 million comprised of \$132 million

through PolioPlus, \$138 million through the Annual Programs Fund, and \$34 million through other Funds.

In the same year, expenditures were \$151 million for PolioPlus, \$73million for 1,199 Global Grants, \$27 million for 478 District Grants, \$8 million for 207 Disaster Grants and \$15 million for other programs. Administration accounted for \$30 million.

The final slide delivers the key message to our members as follows:

"By contributing to the Annual Programs Fund, you advance world understanding, goodwill, and peace through the improvement of health, the support of education, and the alleviation of poverty. There are as many reasons to support the Annual

Programs Fund as there are ways to do good in the world."

We ask our members to consider supporting the Rotary Foundation through the PolioPlus Fund and the Annual Fund. Many of you are regular donors and we are truly appreciative of your past generous support. While there are various ways to donate, going to the Rotary website at www.rotary.org and clicking on the "Donate" button works well.

Anthony thanked Hank for this very important presentation.

The Rotary Foundation





At the 1917 RI Convention, outgoing Rotary president Arch Klumph proposed setting up an endowment "for the purpose of doing good in the world." That one idea, and an initial contribution of \$26.50, set in motion a powerful force that has transformed millions of lives around the globe.

The Rotary Foundation helps Rotary members to advance world understanding, goodwill, and peace by improving health, providing quality education, improving the environment, and alleviating poverty.



PROGRAMS

(All figures are as of 30 June 2022 and in U.S. dollars.)

PolioPlus

Since 1988, Rotary and our partners have immunized nearly 3 billion children against polio. As of June 2022, Rotary had committed more than \$2.3 billion to global polio eradication. We're still working to eliminate the wild poliovirus in the last two countries where it remains endemic and to ensure that it does not return elsewhere. In 2021-22, program awards, including PolioPlus Partners grants, totaled \$150.5 million.

Rotary Peace Centers

Each year, the Foundation supports the training of peace fellows at Rotary Peace Centers, where they earn master's degrees or professional development certificates. Since 2002-03, 1,600 fellows from more than 140 countries have participated. In 2021-22, 130 fellows from 57 countries began their studies at the Rotary Peace Centers, and program awards for the fellows and centers totaled \$3.9 million.

District grants

District grants support small-scale, short-term projects related to the Foundation's mission. In 2021-22, the Foundation approved 478 district grants, and program awards totaled \$27.2 million.

Global grants

Global grants fund large-scale international activities with sustainable, measurable results that support Rotary's areas of focus. Activities include humanitarian projects, scholarships, and vocational training teams. In 2021-22, the Foundation approved 1,199 global grants, and program awards totaled \$72.7 million.

Disaster response grants

Rotary's disaster response grants support relief and recovery efforts in areas that have been affected by natural disasters within the past six months. In 2021-22, the Foundation approved 207 disaster response grants, and program awards totaled \$7.8 million.


Programs of Scale grants

Programs of Scale grants empower Rotary members to work with experienced partners to implement large-scale, high-impact projects over three to five years to benefit a large number of people. Based on a model that has succeeded in reducing the maternal and neo-natal mortality rate in Nigeria, the member-led Together for Healthy Families in Nigeria program was awarded the 2021-22 grant of \$2 million, which was matched by \$4 million in funding from our partners.
