PaceKids School Matt Janz, Annual Giving and Stewardship Co-ordinator



Neil introduced our speaker, Matt Janz, who is the Annual Giving and Stewardship Coordinator at PaceKids. He enjoys sharing stories of growth and success from inside the classroom with a passionate and generous community of supporters. Matt is married with two daughters and they keep active by skateboarding, cycling and cross country skiing.

Neil also introduced Matt's boss, Tara Bishoff, who is the Manager of Fund Development at PaceKids. She has over 23 years of experience in philanthropy, and enjoys connecting community leaders with valued charities. Tara is a proud mother of two teenagers.

Matt is a very enthusiastic speaker and began by telling us that he sees the great affect of Rotary in Calgary. He is delighted to see the Rotary Clubs working with Inclusion Alberta to make an impact on people into the future. While Inclusion Alberta works with young adults to help find them rewarding jobs, PaceKids works with younger children, empowering them through their education. PaceKids has two schools in Calgary, one in Sundance in the south, and one in the north. They currently are assisting 600 kids and their families in Calgary. Pace provides a team of professionals such as teachers, teaching assistants, therapists, speech specialists working through two programs, an ECS Program in school, and an in home program whereby 4 specialists will visit children in their homes.

Pace has roughly 175 staff and their children's ages are 3 to 6 in school, and 1 to 12 for home visits.

Each child is assigned an individualized program designed to meet their specific needs. Pace uses their individual strengths to develop their educational journey. They use various items of regulatory equipment such as stuffed animals, miniature trampolines, wheelchairs, walkers, crocodile walkers and specialized speech equipment. This equipment is supported by amazing donors.

Matt reports that once they are supported, the children's education shows wonderful progress. He related the story of a child named Julian whose only interest was plants. His mother noticed other issues such as mobility and speaking where he was behind others. Julian was diagnosed with autism, level 2. Once he entered Pace he felt safe and began to strengthen his weaker areas.



Great progress was made during his first year, and he actually designed a robot to clean up garbage. This is the power of PaceKids.






