Please send in advance of the meeting or <u>right</u> after the meeting The author of two books and numerous articles on Canadian politics, Dr. Docherty has been a frequent commentator on regional and national radio, and his analyses of provincial and national politics are regularly cited in leading Canadian newspapers.

Docherty is committed to providing an exceptional undergraduate educational experience for Mount Royal University students. His favourite part of the academic year is convocation. Not only does he love shaking the hands of all the graduates, he plays a special role at convocation by playing his bagpipes together with the pipe band that leads Mount Royal grads in and out of each ceremony. Bryan noted that we should invite Dr. Docherty to our Robbie Burns celebration!

In commemoration of Canada's sesquicentennial, Dr. Docherty was honoured to be asked to speak at the Senate Chamber in May, as part of the Symposium which celebrated the 150th anniversary of Canadian Confederation

Dr. Docherty began by saying Good afternoon and thank you for inviting me to speak at your lunch. Today, I'd like to speak about four things.

First, what makes Mount Royal University unique as a post-secondary institution. Second, our contribution to and impact on Calgary. Third, how universities are like incubators for social issues. And last, an invitation to come to our campus and support our students.

At Mount Royal, our vision is to provide an exceptional undergraduate educational experience. While our focus may have changed over time, we bring to learners a strong tradition of higher education achieved over more than 100 years.

Our undergraduate offering has steadily risen to 12 degrees and 32 majors. Our vision is to increase this number to 15 degrees and 60 majors by 2025. When you speak with Mount Royal students and alumni what you will frequently hear is they get individualized attention from our faculty. This is because with smaller class sizes, the priority for our faculty is teaching and learning.





We are also strong advocates for a liberal education. A full quarter of a student's course load includes courses completely out of their area of study. The point of this is to develop intellectual qualities, teamwork skills and well-rounded citizens. We remind the students that their first job may not exist when they start their studies and critical thinking is important.

Another unique aspect of Mount Royal is the opportunity for students to engage in research. They do not have to wait for graduate studies to understand the research process and learn from experienced faculty members. Hand-in-hand with research is practical experience, in co-ops , field schools, work practicums and community service. It's a win-win. High impact experiences for students and graduates who are work-ready for employers.

Last but not least, time and time again we are told that our campus community is welcoming. Like a small town, people know and care about each other. In a survey of middle-year students, 89% said they feel a sense of belonging.

So what does the new Mount Royal University look like? Well, this year we will likely reach having 10,000 full course load students. More than three-quarters of those students are pursuing degrees. Eighty per cent of first-year students said Mount Royal was their first choice. And when it comes to student feedback from universities across Canada, we are among the very top for student satisfaction. Ninety-four per cent of middle-year students were satisfied with the quality of teaching they received. Along with providing an exceptional undergraduate experience to students, Mount Royal University positively impacts the community.

Our annual expenditures see more than \$230 million go into the local economy. We also employ well over 2,000 Calgarians. Seventy-three per cent of our students are from Calgary, so we provide an education for nearly 7,000 full course load students. One-quarter of our students participate in community service learning, contributing over 300,000 of volunteer hours in Calgary. And each year, we see over 1,600 graduates. Based on an employment rate of 92 per cent after two years, this means Mount Royal adds nearly 1,500 educated and work-ready employees to the labour force every year – the vast majority right here in Calgary.

Mount Royal has also recently invested nearly \$200 million into two major capital projects. In 2015, the Taylor Centre for the Performing Arts opened its doors. It is a \$90 million building project that is the home to our Conservatory music program and the Bella Concert Hall. This project was funded by the federal, provincial and municipal governments, with the amazing **Don and Ruth Taylor** providing a very generous donation.

If you haven't seen the Bella Concert Hall, please come see it. I can tell you it's the finest concert hall in Alberta, if not western Canada. It seats about 800 and has unbelievable acoustics. Hopefully you have put your business card into a draw to get two tickets to the Royal Wood concert on May 17.

The second project is the Riddell Library and Learning Centre. Last fall, we opened this \$100.4 million building thanks to funding from the provincial government and the generosity of the Riddell Family Foundation.

The 16,000-square-metre new space is a box of light. Literally because there is so much natural light coming in the windows and metaphorically because it represents enlightenment through creating and sharing knowledge. This is the intellectual hub and heart of the campus, showcasing how people, technology and information converge and interact in the 21st century. Again if you haven't visited this building, I invite you to do so. A community membership is free of charge.







While Mount Royal University provides a positive impact to the community, I also want to acknowledge how generous Calgary has been to us. Here is a great example.

In mid-January, the U of C and Mount Royal hockey teams (both men and women) square off at the Saddledome for what's called the Crowchild Classic. In five years, the Crowchild Classic's attendance has increased from 4,000 to a record of 13,000 people. This makes it the largest indoor university sport event in Canada. Unbelievable. The community spirit among students is amazing.

We could not do this without the Calgary Flames and Ken King. When I talk to other university presidents in Canadian cities with NHL teams, they say, "Let me get this right. The Flames give you the Saddledome for free, encourage large attendance and provide all the services as a community event?" I say, "Yes, they do." and they say, "Well, that can't happen here." I want to publicly thank the Flames, Ken King and the ownership group who make this possible with their generosity and like our students understand the true value of community.

Along with providing an undergraduate education and supporting the community, universities interact with thousands of young adults who want positive social change. We have first-hand experience into the kinds of changes they are wanting. For example, students are leading the way on conversations about gender and sexual orientation. People identify as lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, two-spirited, intersex, questioning, queer, straight or ally. Many of us don't know what these categories are, let alone how to not discriminate and be respectful. Students spearhead training where participants can ask these questions freely and learn how to be respectful.

Another social issue is religious tolerance. Visit Main Street on our campus on any given day and you'll see students in the Muslim Student Affiliation, Christian Power for Change, Jewish Hillel, Secular Humanist, Catholic Christian, Treaty People and Sikh clubs all lined up beside each other with their booths run by the student organizations. It's a great example of respect for diversity and inclusion.

Violence, in particular sexual violence, is another concerning topic. Students, faculty and staff have worked together to develop a dating violence prevention project, a program to support victims and a stand-alone sexual violence policy.



As well, brave students, who either suffer themselves or know others who do, are reducing the stigma around mental health. I led my first President's Task Force in Student Mental Health, and that group is now implementing 41 recommendations across campus to raise awareness, provide support and encourage healthy living.

Another positive social trend is an increasing number of Indigenous students seeking a post-secondary education and a thirst among non-Indigenous students to better understand Indigenous history, practices, culture and knowledge. Mount Royal's Indigenous Strategic Plan commits us to the Calls to Action in the Truth and Reconciliation Commission. In only a few short years, the percentage of self-declared Indigenous students at Mount Royal has risen from 3% to over 5%. We are well on our way to our goal of 7% by 2025, which is the percentage of Indigenous people in Alberta's population. As well we are helping our campus community learn about the history of the treaties, the *Indian Act* and residential schools. With this understanding, we can better understand what Indigenous students and community partners have endured, work towards reconciliation and move more positively forward together. It's a work in progress but we are learning.





For students, faculty and staff at Mount Royal, it's a vibrant and positive place to be. But it is also a great place for community members. Here are ten reasons to come visit our campus. The new Bella Concert Hall is truly exquisite, so please take in a show or concert. This year we hosted Yo Yo Ma and Randy Bachman to a full house.

I invite you to check out our Continuing Education classes. We have practical, engaging and flexible courses and programs to meet your needs. And don't think you have to be a virtuoso to take music lessons at the Conservatory. We have thousands of courses — for infants all the way to rock-n-roll guitar lessons for seniors. Maybe you don't want those relatives staying at your place this summer. Our Residence has reasonably priced hotel rooms and apartment-style conference accommodations.

Mount Royal also has beautiful, modern conference, meeting and event spaces to meet your needs. The new Library has an amazing amount of knowledge and technology to share. While you are on campus, there is a wide range of retail and food services, including one of our business graduates' coffee shops.

The caliber of competition among our athletes is amazing, so come out and cheer on the Cougars teams. If you live or work in the area, use our campus recreation centre. It's truly one of the best in town and very reasonably priced. And if you are a bit stiff after your work out, our injury rehabilitation and wellness centre is staffed with some excellent practitioners.

Last but not least we have an amazing exhibit of both sea and land fossils from the Cretaceous period. Based on the very high percentage of Mount Royal University alumni in Calgary, I am guessing there are many of you in the room. I hope we have your contact information because we want to keep in touch. We send our alumni the award-winning *Summit* magazine. I have some copies here today if you would like to pick one up. There are also alumni-only discounts and offers, for things like concerts at the Bella Concert Hall. Perhaps we can entice you to mentor one of our eager students or as a seasoned-professional give us advice on our undergraduate programs.

We are always looking for financial support so we can provide the best academic, personal and professional experiences for students. We have three focus areas right now. There are 29 Military Memorial Scholarships, which honour past students who lost their lives during military service and benefit current students.

And of course there are always scholarships and bursaries for students. Every year, we distribute about \$3.8 million per year in scholarships and bursaries to students. We are greatly appreciative of donations to increase support to those students who excel, who give back to the community and who are in need. In closing, I hope you take me up on my invitation to visit the Mount Royal University campus. And when you are there, true to our welcoming culture, give me a call and I'll buy coffee. Thanks and have a great afternoon.

Doug Lacombe thanked Dr. Docherty for sharing all of the good things that Mount Royal University is doing Many of us have hired graduates of Mount Royal University. The University is feeding the engine of the City and is a champion of rational thinking during these challenging times. **President Bill** added his thanks and advised that the club would be donating \$100 in Dr. Docherty's name to our Stay in School program.

Strategic Planning Update: **President-Elect Ron Prokosch:** I am here today to give you a bit of an update on the strategic planning activities and to introduce you to the committee structure for next year. You recall that in late January we introduced you to the 6 Strategic Goals that the Strategic Planning Committee determined as key for our progress over the next three years: Membership, Club operations, Public Image and Communica-tions, Local and International Community Service, Youth Services and Foundations and Giving.

At that time we advised you that the next step would be to meet with committees and groups of committees to establish key objectives and action steps to keep us vital and relevant and effective into the future. Since then, we have met with a number of committee groups (such as all the membership committees – all the Stay-in-School committees, all the Youth Services Committees including the presidents of Rotaract and Interact) and with a number of individual committees and individuals.

We still need to pull all of the information together into a single document as a reference tool to guide our work over the next couple of years. That should happen over the next few weeks. In the meantime I can tell you that the process was invaluable in updating our committee structure for the coming year.

At this point our Strategic Direction is in place, our organization and committee structure are coming into place and with the work of Treasurer Larry and President Bill the adjustments to budgeting and financial report are also almost in place. This means that all our key business processes are aligned.

One of the items that came out of the strategic planning committee was advice to reduce the number of committees. We have been able to do that (reducing from 67 to 50 including 4 projects and 3 new committees). In doing this we have been able to provide support, backup and succession for a number of 1 person committees. On your table you will see the one page document that outlines the Committee Structure for 2018-2019. (you will need your glasses).

David Young – Club Service – Ways and Means, **Len Kushner** – Club Service - Operations, **Dorothea Schaab** – Community Service - Youth Services, **Dana Hunter** – Community Service – Ways and Means, **Glen Godlonton** – Club Service - Membership and Social, **Kevin McLeod** – Community Service - International and Vocational And **Jim Hutchens** – Community Service - Local

All members will be receiving an email identifying these Committees and their Chairs and another document asking which Committees you would like to be on and which Committees you would prefer not to be on. - If you **Register and pay online** you will be able to receive a makeup. Remember to always create a "NEW" registration if you are going in to do makeups more than once. The makeup will count for 14 days before or after the date that you paid online just like any other makeup.

We are going to take 3 months to trial this and we hope you will all get online and see what you think.
