Welcome to the April 14th meeting of the Rotary Club of Calgary at Stampede Park. I am the Club's President, Craig Stokke

Dr. Williamson, I am excited to hear about the tremendous advances medical research, especially when you stop to think about some of the crazy medial practices in history. Now, I may be a bit young to remember the really "really" wacky medical practices of the past... like how my Grandpa could walk into a pharmacy and buy Heroin off the shelf to cure his cough. Yes, until 1914 that was really a thing. Then the medical experts figured "hey, we should put a prescription on that", which they did until 1924.



I clearly remember sitting in the doctors office or dental office beside the big ashtrays so patients could get their last puffs in while waiting for their appointments. So, that made me wonder about some of the other crazy historical medical practices. Rome's first official physician, Arcagthus, was given the nickname Carniflex, meaning executioner. One of the worst thing you could do when you're sick is to drain your body of all its blood, but for centuries, that's exactly what "doctors" did to their patients. Crazy as it sounds today, bloodletting made a lot of sense for over 2000 years. Arsenic is something most people associate with rat poison, but for a time in the 1800's, people happily consumed it as a form of a diet pill.

Alcoholism is one of the most serious diseases, afflicting millions of people every day, so it's no surprise people turn to unconventional methods to treat it. For many people in the 1960's (who either didn't want to, or were unable to attend meetings), there was always LSD. Funny enough, in 2012 doctors actually found it to be 59% effective.

Have you ever told someone to go blow smoke up their ass? Well, that was really a thing. I won't go into it here.

When radium was discovered, it was one of the biggest finds in the 19th century. Before the effects of radiation on human cells were fully understood, companies put radium in everything from toothpaste, chocolate, and water, pretty much everything meant for consumption. This continued well into the 1930s. Of course lead was a problem too.

When you look up our medical history it's quite fascinating... and quite frankly, its surprising we actually survived as a species.

SERGEANT-AT-ARMS: Keith Davis continued in his ongoing effort to educate member of our club on various matters (at their expense of course). This time he chose the subject of Easter and asked some provocative questions: The Easter Bunny has become a key figure for children at Easter. But have you ever asked the question "Why?" Why not a gopher, or a cow, or even a skunk?



- Q: When did rabbits become associated with Easter, and why? It's unclear but it's probably related to the fact that rabbits are known to be prolific (that means they "do it" a lot) and are an ancient symbol of fertility and new life.
- Q: What do you call a gathering of rabbits, such as might occur on the eve of Easter Sunday? A "fluffle", a "colony" or a "herd" if the gathering is large enough.
- Q: Where do rabbits live? No, Bill Sumner, Calgary is not an answer. "warren".
- Q: We also see chickens primarily young chickens or chicks associated with Easter. What do you call a gathering of chickens? "peep", a "flock" or a "brood".
- Q: When was Easter first celebrated? In the 2nd Century AD, although the earliest Christians may have celebrated the resurrection.
- Q: **Why do we celebrate with Easter Eggs?** The egg became a symbol of the resurrection, as the egg Represented new life emerging from the shell.
- Q: Why do many societies worldwide colour Easter eggs? Church leaders originally banned eating eggs laid during the Holy Week. So those eggs were saved, and coloured brightly, then given to children as gifts. Many of those eggs were coloured red to signify the blood shed on the cross, and the colouring of Easter Eggs remains to this day.
- Q: **Is Easter purely a Christian rite?** Not necessarily. In fact, Easter is closely linked time-wise to Passover and to the Exodus from Egypt, as well as to Ramadan, and even to some pagan rituals that took place before the birth of Christ.

DR. TYLER WILLIAMSON: CENTRE FOR HEALTH INFORMATICS UPDATE

SPEAKER INTRODUCTION: Bill LeClair: Prior to more formally re-introducing Dr. Tyler Williamson to this Club let me give you a little background on how we met. When I was President, I received an email from Stephanie Ng at UofC asking if our Club members wanted to visit and see the Neuro Arm in Action. We had donated money to UofC for it. Fast forward a couple of years when I was on the Large



Grants Committee chaired by Myrna Dube-Thompson. We were discussing possibilities and Benno Nigg suggested UofC. I remembered Stephanie Ng and called her but ended up speaking with Andrea Ostergard. I told her we were looking for a program but something leading edge. That lead to Tyler, an application from UofC and a \$100,000 grant from our Club.

Tyler Williamson is the Acting Director of the Centre for Health Informatics, formerly the Associate Director. In addition, he is an Associate Professor of Biostatistics in the Department of Community Health Sciences as well as the Director of the Health Data Science and Biostatistics Diploma Program at the University of Calgary. He is a member of the O'Brien Institute of Public Health and the Alberta Children's Hospital Research Institute. He's earned a BSC Statistics at UofC '05, PhD Biostatistics UofC '11 and received NAPCRG New Investigator Award in 2018 for outstanding work as new primary care investigator within the North American Primary Care Research Group (largest primary care research organization in the world).

His research interests include health data integration (combining electronic medical record & health administrative data), chronic disease surveillance & research using electronic medical record and health administrative data), chronic disease surveillance and research using electronic medical record data, and non-canonical link functions for binomial generalized linear models. He is nationally & internationally recognized in the use of electronic medical record data for public health surveillance, health services research, & practice quality improvement working with organizations such as the Public Health Agency of Canada and Health Canada's Marketed Health Products Directorate.

SPEAKER: Tyler Williamson is the Acting Director of the Centre for Health Informatics, formerly the Associate Director. In March of 2020 our club made a \$100,000 donation to this centre. Little did any of know what was going to happen. Covid hit and the Centre was able to spring into action gathering data and initiating projects that became invaluable in understanding what was happening.














DR. TYLER WILLIAMSON: CENTRE FOR HEALTH INFORMATICS UPDATE

Dr. Williamson's presentation is available by watching the online meeting link and you will need to take a look to appreciate what our funding has started. He indicated that some \$2,000,000 in funding followed our seed money and they have developed numerous programs that we see reported continually. One in particular analyzing Wastewater is now a standard and while we see it reported for Calgary and Edmonton it is now being used in many other local facilities, cities, towns and First Nations.

Dr. Williamson is now connected to a World Class Project called Serotracker along with supporting five or six young investigators at CIHI with their projects.



Tyler closed by saying that your generous gift has had a profound impact on the Cumming School of Medicine and the Centre for Health Informatics Thank you.



<u>Warsaw Rotary - Humanitarian Support in Ukraine - Russia War - Zoom meeting 11am MST Thursday April 14th</u>

Rotary Club of San Antonio - We will meet with the Warsaw Wilanów Poland English-Speaking Club on Thursday April 14 at 11am MST to discuss their club's significant support to Humanitarian Operations in the *Ukrainian-Russia War*.

As Warsaw is English-Speaking Club, and as they border the Ukraine, they are uniquely posed to act as the hub for international funds and aid pouring into the Poland for distribution to the Ukraine. Is supplying piosand water-filtration systems that produce clean, crinkable water to thousands of local residents. This phase of the project aims to supply filtration systems to 650 households (hundreds of other households received filtration systems in earlier phases).

The project includes three home visite: the filter installation and two follow-up visits for filter inspection. The project also provides training on system maintenance, oducation related to good hygiene practices, and the administration of antiparasitio medications to participants when necessary. This three-tiered approach — filter installation, resilth and hygiene training, and medical intervention — should result in significantly fewer people suffering from the debilitating and often deadly impact of parasites.
