I phoned my favourite restaurant and said I would eat my breakfast on their patio, wanting to support them, but now they don't open until 9 am, which is too late for me to be productive at the office.

So, I phoned Denny's placed an order for a "build your own slam" and picked it up on the way into the office. I can't stand the thought of eating bacon and eggs out of a Styrofoam container, so when I got to the office, I moved the meal onto a proper plate, and could feel a sense of calm coming over me. That was, until I opened the bag with the condiments... MARMALADE!?!?! Are you kidding me? Really? How far do they expect to push a person?

MARIO STELLA 2020-21 Fund Committee Report

Main Speaker: Myrna Dube-Thompson (Chair): Mario Stella Grant Committee

Myrna, along with Ken Farn and Spencer Tonkinson presented a Powerpoint presentation on the life and philanthropy of Mario Stella and an update on the funding decisions made as a result of Mario's generous donation to our Club.

Highlights of the PowerPoint presentation are as follows:

Defining Mario-Mario was born in Blairmore and moved to Calgary at age 18. After graduating from SAIT, he worked long 16 hour days for the Gallelli Group of companies. After Mario met and married the love of his life, he struck out on his own business journey.

Mario as self-made businessman-He started his business journey with the purchase of Riverside grocery store. In 1967 he started a development company, Stella Holdings Ltd. And successfully developed numerous properties. During his career he owned, built and sold commercial malls and warehouses.

Mario, Proud Rotarian-Mario joined Calgary South in 1985 and was a proud member for 28 years until his sad passing in 2013.

Mario, Passionate Philanthropist- Mario found many ways to give back to his community in life and in death. His donation of over 2 million dollars to our Rotary Club established the Mario Stella Endowment Fund which is restricted to transportation initiatives for persons with disabilities.

Fund History- In 2018-2019 a bus was awarded to Renfrew Education Services; in 2019-2020, a bus was awarded to the Father Lacombe Care Centre; Funds available for the current Rotary year was \$65,240.

2020-2021 Donations:

Hull Home Services Donation: Ken Farn spoke about the \$18,510 donation to Hull Home Services and the specific services provided by their Independent Living Services division for youth between 16 and 24 who are unable to use public transport due to safety concerns as a result of developmental disabilities, mental health concerns etc..

Ken went on to explain the services Hull Home Services provides:

For over 55 years, Hull Services has been supporting mental health and behavioral needs of our most vulnerable children, youth and their families in the Calgary area. Many of those served by Hull Services struggle with serious behavioral issues, often as a result of traumatic experiences such as abuse, poverty, violence, addictions, developmental delays and other mental health challenges. What Hull Services does every day is not glamorous, but is essential for a healthier society.









City of Calgary @ 2.5% Other financial support comes from: Alberta Government, Calgary Foundation and FCSS (Family & Community Support Services)

The balance comes from Grants and donations.

- Alberta Children's Services contributed 65.4%

Although three of Hull's major programs are in need of a new VAN, each estimated to cost approximately \$26,000. Our Rotary Club through the Mario Stella Transportation Fund is currently only able to provide \$18,500 towards the purchase of one (1) van. So Hull Services has decided that these funds plus an additional \$7,500 raised from other donations, will go toward the purchase of a new van for the Interdependent Living Services (ILS), Killarney Group Care Program, a community based program for youth and young adults ages 16 – 24 who have developmental disabilities, including mental health concerns as well as social, emotional and behavioral challenges. These individuals require extensive support in developing social adaptive skills and self-direction necessary for future independence. ILS provides a continuum of services, including 24 hour support and supervision geared toward the development of social adaptive skills necessary to increase self-reliance and healthy independence.


A key component of the ILS program is the Work Experience Program which offers meaningful day programs for young adults with complex needs. The work experience program closely tracks the youth engaged, their working hours as well as projects and jobs completed. On a yearly basis, approximately 80 individuals take part in the work experience programs. By giving them the chance to engage in meaningful work opportunities, they are better able to integrate productively into society.

As you can appreciate, Van Transportation is critical to the overall program as it provides a safe means of transporting youth with complex behavioral needs to medical appointments, community outings and home visits etc. In particular, a van is absolutely vital for transporting young adults involved in the Work Experience Program, safely and on time, to and from their respective iob sites.

Always an area of interest for Rotary is the maintenance or sustainability of vehicles. So we are pleased to advise Hull Services has a full time auto maintenance department with a certified mechanic who is also a teacher. The mechanic works at the William Roper Hull School and teaches auto mechanics to students, utilizing some of Hull's fleet of 46 vehicles as learning tools for students interested in the field of auto mechanics. The average age of Hull vehicles is 8-12 years, which means they will get significant long-term use from this Rotary grant.

Our Rotary Club has supported Hull Services in the past, mostly through our Small Grants Program, and we are pleased to once again, through the Mario Stella Transportation Grant, assist this very important community service organization.

Numbers Served:

In a typical year, over 4,000 children, youth and their families are supported through one or more of Hull's 26 programs and services. In the year ending March 31, 2020, the numbers rose above 7,400 individuals.



Created in 1994 by a passionate group of parents who wanted to see their children thrive, Pacekids Programs has impacted the lives of thousands of children and families through an Alberta Education licensed Early Childhood Ser-

vices (ECS) program and a variety of Family Support for Children with Disabilities (FSCD) funded in -home and in-community programs. Since its creation, Pacekids has remained focused on the family unit and continuously emphasizes the importance of meeting a child and family where they are at.

We serve children with Autism, Cerebral Palsy, Global Developmental Delay, Down Syndrome, Brain Injury, Speech & amp; Language delay, etc. in the Calgary area.

Project Focus:

Pacekids was seeking \$46,726 for the purpose of purchasing and outfitting a Ford Transit Passenger van with a wheelchair lift to transport children with special needs to and from critical early intervention programming. Pacekids' Early Childhood Services (ECS) operate out of two locations in Calgary and serve nearly 200 children with special needs annually. Door-to-door transportation is offered to all children attending ECS programming and is a highly valued offering that is utilized by most of our families. Pacekids' ECS program has grown substantially in recent years and therefore adaptations to our transportation model have been necessary. As such, in the fall of 2016 Pacekids trialed a hybrid transportation model, utilizing transport vans in combination with staff using personal vehicles to transport children to and from programming. The integration of Pacekids' current transport vans has proven incredibly successful in reducing costs, risk, and liability.

Who and How It Will Help?

Providing the means for children who otherwise would not be able to access programming. Many families served by Pacekids are considered low income and do not have the means (car) or availability (many work shift work jobs) to transport their children. As Pacekids provides a crucial, specialized service, families come from all over Calgary, making the distance to the program an obstacle should they have to transport themselves. Pacekids' van model adds value to the child's school experience. Children gain valuable experience riding along with other children, seeing their friends, and greeting the driver. This experience also helps to better prepare children for the bussing system they will likely have to be part of once they move on from Pacekids and integrate into a public-school system. Our Van will provide 72 to 110 children transportation over the life expectancy. As that might sound low, we have provided them with a van equipped with a much-needed wheelchair lift and therefore it might only transport 1 child at a time.

What We Funded with the Mario Stella Grant:

We were able to fund the entire project by providing a beautiful van with recognition for Mario Stella and the Rotary Club at Stampede Park. In total the project included a Ford Transit Van (\$31,500), Wheelchair Lift (\$11,750), Van Wrap Including Rotary Logo (\$1,700), Winter Tires (\$1,200), Winter Safety Kit (\$181), Car Seats / Booster Seats (\$395).

President Penny:





APRIL BIRTHDAYS



April: Ambitious and charismatic, people born in April and meant to be leaders. You are stubborn, bossy, smart and creative which is a good combination and means you are always surrounded by friends and lovers.

- April was the second month in an early Roman calendar, but became the fourth when the ancient Romans started using January as the first month.

- The name for the month of April originally came for *Aprilis* which means to open.
- Small animals that hibernate are usually coming out of their burrows in April. The birds fly back northward and settle down to have their families. The bees and butter-flies begin to gather nectar from the first flowers of the season.
- In some parts of the world, it is planting time, while in other parts, it is the harvest
