This is President Chas' Speech in its entirety. There maybe some overlap with the first page of the Bulletin

Good afternoon fellow Rotarians and well— my friends!

I use that introduction for two reasons. Firstly, because I consider myself among friends. Secondly, because I want my talk today to focus on the casual nature of me speaking with friends.

As some may know - both of my folks were involved in Rotary - my father Gene a member of this Club and my Mom Marge who was a Rotary Ann and a Partner. I remember them telling me that Rotary will give you friends you never thought you'd have.

When I became a member of this Club in 1996, I was told that Rotary will bind you with friendship. So, as I stand here - humbly - as your President for this year - some 20 plus years into my own Rotary journey - I realize they all were right.

In my view, and I'm certain I'm not alone, that idea of comradery, togetherness while helping others is the unseen bonus that has indeed kept me in South Club more than I'd realized. This is the essence of what I have to say to you today.

First, I want to give a little context. We have just finished a very busy July. By all accounts we may be looking at a record-breaking year from the Dream Home. We just had another very successful SIS golf tournament and our Club continues to be the leader that our predecessors wanted it to be.

To that end, I have pondered what my vision for South Club should be for my year. I realized that I have been fortunate to follow two Presidencies whose years included some bold steps for our Club. While they overlapped the years - no matter - the work was completed. The efforts started by PP **Bill LeClair** that prompted our eventual Legacy project was approved in PP **Ron Prokosch's** year. PP Ron also was fundamental along with PP Bill in transforming the way we collect and report the financial picture of our Club to the CRA. As well as our first Strat plan in years. These were no small feats. The Legacy project lead us to discussion of the breadth and scope of the program as did - and does - the financial reporting structure that we are 99% completed with.

Additionally, last year's Board of Directors have now introduced a motion to change our name. I will not comment on the virtues of the proposal except to say I am wholly in favor of it. We will have time for discussion and an e-vote in the next few weeks.

Now, while that name change for our Club pales in comparison to the other two events I've outlined - it has a weight of its own that obviously as a Club we must process. And we will. However, the extent to which we have pursued excellence in our commitment to the community and to ensuring we thoroughly comply with the CRA on our financial front all the while setting new standards in our fundraising efforts along with committing additional time to volunteer in the community caused me and frankly others to consider the following question....have we - albeit unconsciously - drifted from our core values and culture? The answer - in my view- is yes AND no.

I started the meeting with some historical events of our Club and when I look at the history of our Club I'm reminded of a quote from a famous sportsman. It goes like this.

"Ladies and Gentlemen, we will chase perfection, and we will chase it relentlessly, knowing all the while we cannot attain it. However, along the way, we will catch excellence!" That is the essence of the core values the men and women of this Club have exemplified over generations of membership that I have come to know. So- NO -we have not drifted - we continue to excel. I, for one, will never discount success or the hard work it takes to achieve what this Club has. But maybe, just maybe - our culture has languished a little.

It makes sense to me that as our projects have become more substantial, the effort required as a club member is commensurate. Make no mistake I encourage that progression. You have heard me say, think big, act big, be big! From this podium and it is clear to me that we are now the most dynamic Club in this City and likely our district. The price we pay? Is the price I see... Glue.

Within these walls of our beloved log cabin - we all are volunteers - ever more busy volunteers. We also have busy lives and businesses outside of these walls. Therein lies the rub. Effort-to-fun ratio. As your President this year, I won't allow us to trade one for the other, but rather I want us to achieve a better balance.

My point is this. We are at an extremely exciting time in our history and Calgary's history. Being a member of this Club and contributing to its success has meant going above and beyond the norm. We all have done that.

That's why my suggestion to you for this year will - on its face - might to some seem arbitrary or inequitable. It is this: I'm asking all of you to examine your participation in Rotary and ask of yourself - could I do just a little more? Not for Rotary International but for our Club. That little more for me - at the time - was to say yes to being President. For all of us, our lives are different, we are at varying stages of ages and careers so the answers are likewise disparate. It could be as little as an additional meeting, one more shift at Dream Home, signing up for one more volunteer position or maybe you can't host but you could take our Exchange student for ice cream one afternoon. These things are the real glue to our club.

They not only unite us as partners in philanthropic endeavors but build the friendships we make along that journey that really is the ties that bind us together and ultimately allows us to enjoy to continue the work we do.

My friends, let me leave you with this thought: People will be attracted to our Club because we are damn good at what we do. People will join our Club because we are damn good at who we are.







As a result they decided to advocate for a Peace Park between the two countries. As a result the Waterton-Glacier International Peace Park was created, the first such designation in world.
