In my case I selected new pair of Rotary Socks.

First of all, I want to say that I am honoured to have been chosen as your President for this Rotary Year. And while I am honoured I recognize that this is not an honorary position.

There are expectations and responsibilities to perform in this role. I intend to do my very best in executing the duties of President and in moving the club forward in the best interests of its future.



As many of you know I have had the benefit of working for several years at the District level in the Youth Exchange portfolio and to some extent at the international level of Rotary with the North American Youth Exchange Network. Who would have known that those experiences would have helped so much in preparing for this role.

During that time I observed that a lot was changing in the world of Rotary – from the re-branding and logo, to website development, resource material, training and the Council on Legislation to a more open and collaborative organization. The changes have been cascading down from Rotary International to District and now it is time and timely for Clubs to make use of the openness and resources for the betterment of each Club. For the year 2018-2019 I have selected three words to live and work by -

### ***Collaboration Innovation Communication***

There are two drivers of change – ***Pain*** or ***Gain***. We change because we must in order to avoid pain or because there is opportunity to Gain – I chose Gain. These three “words to live by” should help us steer our own ship and focus on what we can gain moving forward

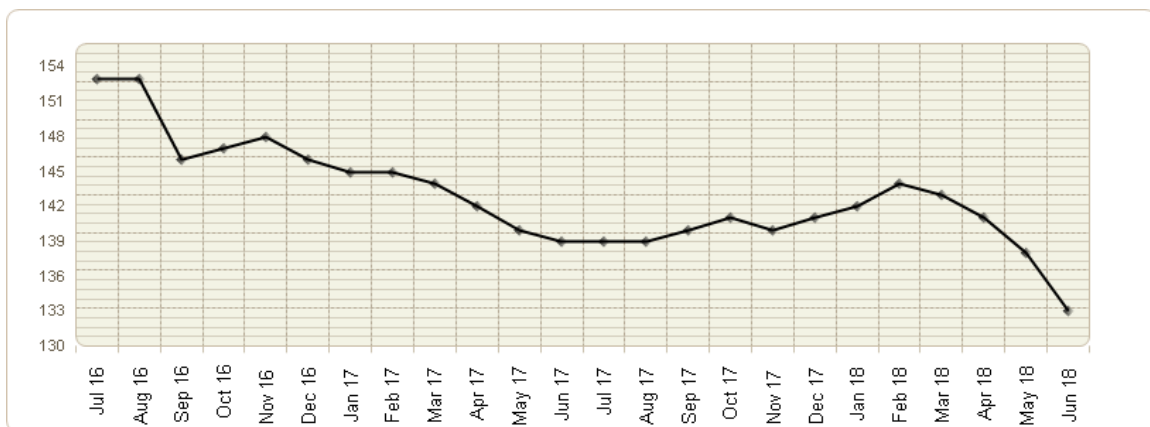
As you know this past year a great deal of time and effort has gone into creating a Strategic Plan. The plan is complete with the exception of a few committees to meet with their Director to set some Objectives. The Strategic Plan will be available on our website by the end of the month and will be adjusted from time to time thereby reflecting the dynamic nature of our club and the need to keep a working document refreshed.

That Plan has been a big step in club ***collaboration*** and it has set the direction for considerable ***innovation*** in several areas of the club’s work. The Strategic Plan had a tremendous influence on the structuring of the Committees for this year and has already resulted in committees working toward many of the objectives and setting budgets established based on the plan.

Frankly I am amazed at the progress made already after only one month into the year. We will need to be diligent and continuous in our ***communication*** as we continue to collaborate on new initiatives and innovation to ensure acceptance and understanding. We worked on this by pulling together some of the small committees.

The Motto of Rotary is “Service Above Self”... and Calgary South is exemplary in this regard. We take on some pretty large projects and raise significant dollars to support community needs both local and international. But to continue to do that work we need to keep our membership strong, engaged and healthy. We are **STRONG, ENGAGED and HEALTHY**. Accordingly, ***Membership*** is a priority again this year. Within that strategic goal the priorities are:

- ***Retention and engagement***
- ***Membership growth***



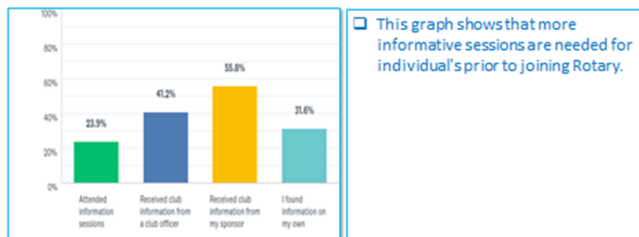
While we have had a number of great new members join the club during the past year – we still have had a net loss 138-133 as of June 30<sup>th</sup>. Most of the losses have occurred from age and health issues and some from personal and professional circumstance where they were not able to sustain their membership. Two were from dis-satisfaction.

During President Bill's year we started doing exit interviews when a letter of resignation was received and prior to a motion of acceptance at the Board. The goal was to first retrieve the situation if possible and second to learn more about the why. We are continuing with that practice – and those I have talked to are very grateful for the call and the opportunity to share their thoughts.

As well... This spring District 5360 conducted a survey of ex-Rotarians. And here are a few highlights.

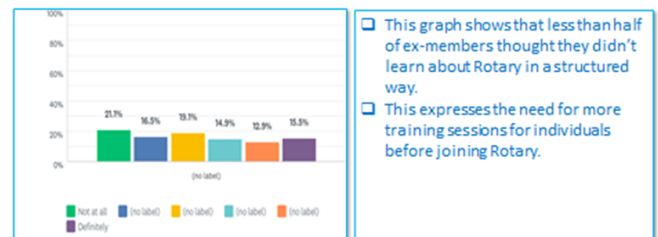
Proviso – this is a district wide survey and does not speak specifically about our club – but it does get you thinking And sheds some light on areas we could consider for new initiatives or revitalization.

8. How were you informed about club activities and your responsibilities before joining?



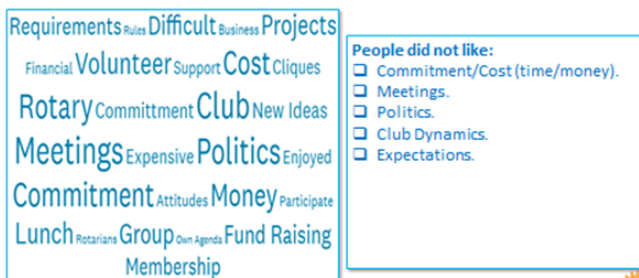

9: Did you learn more about Rotary in a structured way (e.g., new member orientation, continuing education) once you became a member?



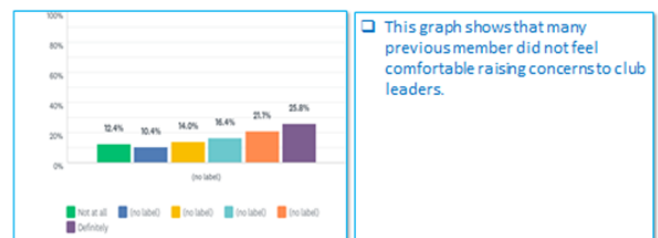

16. Are there any elements of Rotary's culture that needs to change?

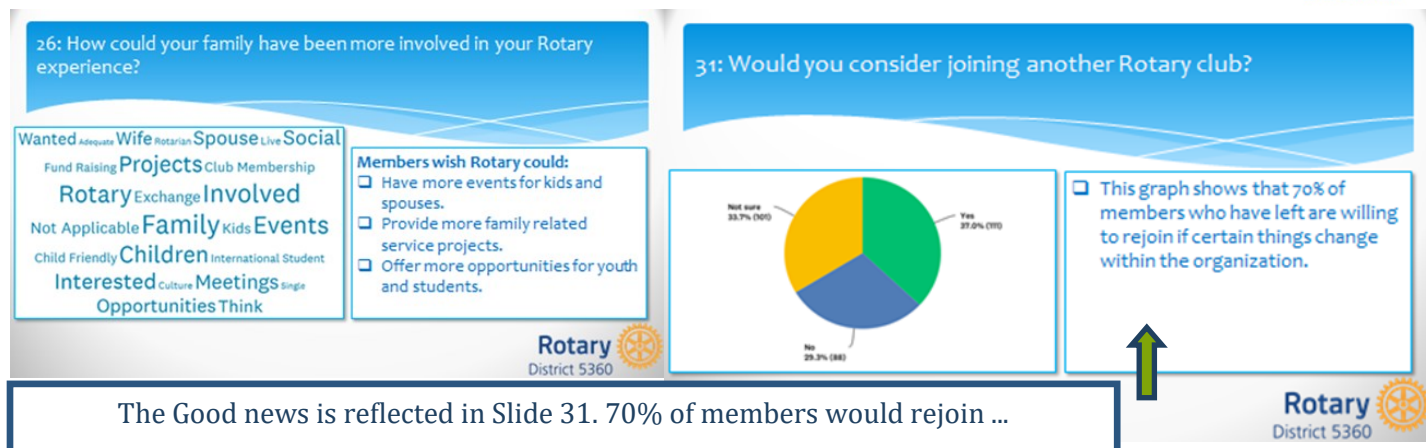

With the insights gained from this and the previous survey I plan to convene two or three focus/discussion groups to talk about new models of membership that are relevant for our club. I have had the opportunity to have a number of informal chats with a number of people in the club and I know that this membership is very much on your mind. But it is essential to do some research, collaborate with relevant groups, frame it and move to action. I also believe that the Strategic Plan and the objectives set in each of the six priority goals speaks very much to the messages received from these surveys.

Just to focus on membership itself is not going to do it. We will need to work on all of the strategic goals in order to attract and retain and fulfill the needs and interests of members and potential members. Accordingly, everyone on every committee plays a vital role in building a **relevant**, and **vibrant** club.

Thanks to the Past Presidents who have shared their wisdom on Leadership. Also thanks to the Board and Committee Chairs – your quiet work is often not recognized but is truly appreciated.

District Governor Dan Doherty Dan addressed our Club by asking us all to stand up and cheer if we are the BEST Club – and we did..... Then Dan thanked everyone for the standing ovation!! Dan chided that **Past President Bill Leclair** who had said Dan would not get a standing ovation! Dan and Marlene have traveling around in the Rotary Bus and they are getting noticed (a child wants ice cream, and someone asked for a hot dog!). Also, they pulled into the Lions campground in Red Deer and caused quite a stir. Please remember to sign the bus!

This year will be a year for change - we are ready for change! Dan has spent a lot of time looking at the stats from the surveys from last year – it is hugely insightful and impactful. Our District had 2,200 members 5 years ago and now we have 1,700 members. Not all of the reduction is from members passing away – it is important to note that we have gained 1,000 new members BUT 65% new members have left within 5 years. They state that they left for:

- Lack of community engagement. They want to be involved and not just write checks.
- Club structure. The costs, too much money out of pocket annually, meetings (times, agenda), not comfortable (hard to break into clubs 'cliques').
- Club culture. Don't feel engaged. Think about this from the lens of the new member....

We can do this – together! We can change our culture and strengthen our Clubs and impact. A current example is the Atrium and the commitment South has done for it.. money and organizing.

Support your President, keep engaged, bring in new members and have fun while changing the globe! Thanks for having me!

**President Elect Chas Filipski** thanked **District Governor Dan Doherty** for coming to our Club. He also thanked Cheryl and Marlene. Chas said that Dan's enthusiasm is contagious and we are right behind you – ready to build for the future!

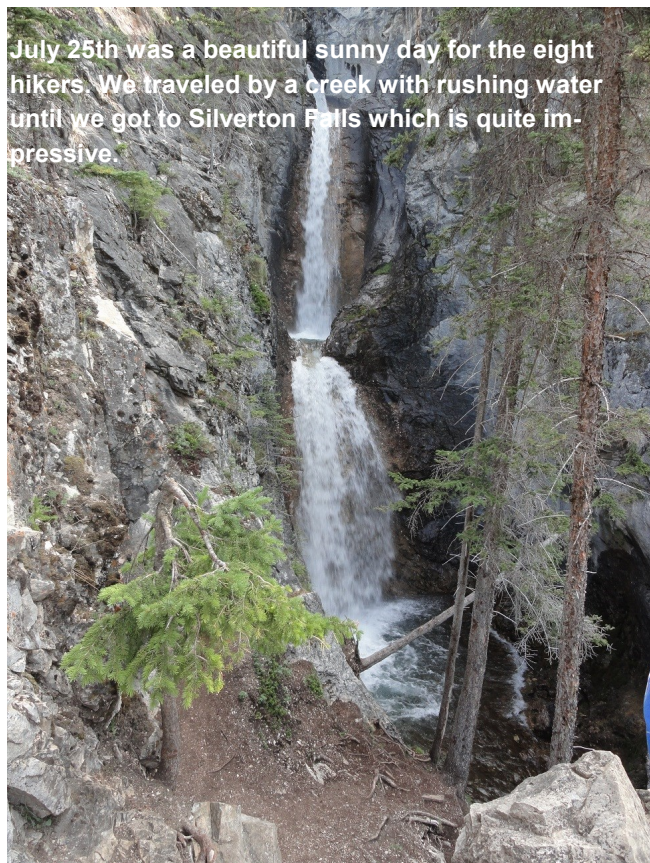

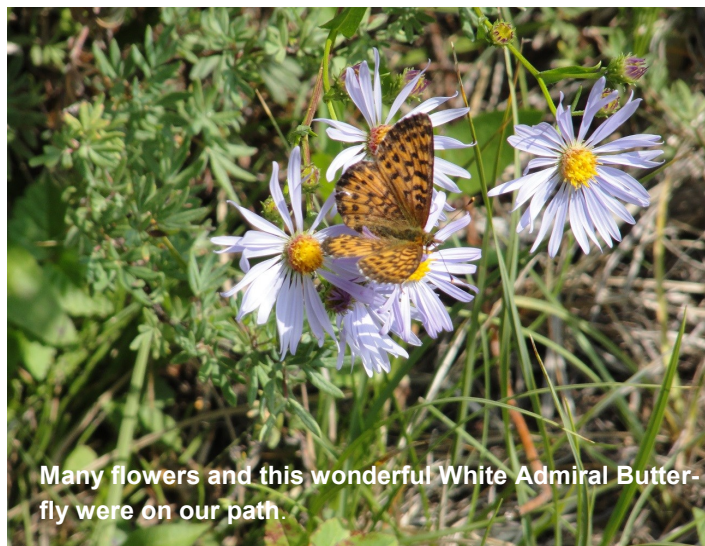
