







What is Myrrh? It is a spice that was often used to embalm the dead, and also as a pain reliever. Either way you were going to be pain free.





GUEST SPEAKER: BRYCE STARLIGHT

SPEAKER INTRO: Stan Cichon: I have the distinct privilege of introducing a very knowledgeable community developer, Mr. Bryce Starlight. Bryce represents the Tsuut'ina Nation as the VP Development in partnership with Canderel MDC Development Management Inc. It is the entity responsible for the planning and comprehensive development of 1200 acres that is located adjacent to the southwest border of the City of Calgary. This comprehensive development encompasses three major precincts that will be developed over the next 20 years providing for a wide range of retail, office, entertainment, hospitality and institutional uses.



Ladies and gentlemen please allow me to share a very brief synopsis of Mr. Starlight's career:

Mr. Starlight currently has an active role in managing the planning and development activities with the Tsuu t'ina Nation leadership as well as with their various administrative departments. He is directly involved in coordinating Legislative, Land Code and Property Tax development, as well as advising on the Nation's strategic Public Works expansion and growth. Starlight has an extensive background working with many aboriginal communities. He has been widely involved in both political and technical working groups relating to First Nations land management, water policy, and resource management.

Bryce previously spent over 5 years in the private sector, working closely with Aboriginal communities to develop their pipeline and transmission line applications throughout Alberta and BC. Mr. Starlight has earned a degree (a BA Political Science) from the University of Calgary as well as a Diploma from Mount Royal University. Ladies and Gentlemen: We are truly grateful and honoured that he is speaking to us this afternoon. Let us now extend a warm Calgary Stampede Park welcome for Mr. Bryce Starlight.

SPEAKER: Mr Starlight started by noting that the development on Tsuut'ina lands will more likely have a 10 year build out, rather than 20 years. He spoke to the proposed developments, the Taza (*noun of Dené origin: Language of the Tsuut'ina meaning: "Something wondrous is coming"*) partnership between the Nation and Canderel MDC Development Management, and how they are organized and structured to fit into the economy. The partnership is a stand-alone, autonomous entity that operates independently of Chief/Band Council direction.

Spanning 1,200 acres along Tsuut'ina Trail adjacent to SW Calgary, Taza is one of the largest First Nation development projects in North America. With three distinct Villages, its legacy encourages economic prosperity, entrepreneurial spirit and a shared vision for the future. Taza is founded on a set of standards that define an innovative framework to champion Tsuut'ina and all Indigenous communities to further transform and thrive. It operates under clear, concise legislative and jurisdictional parameters, and is dedicated to upholding treaty rights and obligations throughout its operations.









GUEST SPEAKER: BRYCE STARLIGHT

The three interconnected Villages are Taza Park, a 530 acre commercial/residential/entertainment district adjacent to Grey Eagle casino; Taza Crossing, a 330 acre health/wellness/innovation district; and Taza Exchange, a 390 acre retail/office/tourism district, with the new COSTCO as an anchor tenant. Taza is connected by a comprehensive framework of Tsuut'ina and city of Calgary infrastructure that includes the newly constructed Tsuut'ina Trail and Southwest Calgary Ring Road.

Taza recognizes that transparent, accurate, and comparable Environmental, Social, and Governance (ESG) data is critical for evaluating a company's long-term sustainability. There is also a critical need to redefine ESG in an Indigenous context, so Taza is constantly seeking opportunities to make metrics reflective of Tsuut'ina worldviews and cultural priorities.

The Taza ESG Strategy aims to change the way people think about ESG in an Indigenous context. By developing with Tsuut'ina teachings and the goal of economic reconciliation in mind, Taza seeks to make a meaningful, measurable impact in topics that matter to the Nation.
