RON PROKOSCH TRIBUTE INTRODUCTION BY DOROTHEA SCHAAB

Today, we are honoring the life of Past President Ron Prokosch who passed away June 20th following a valiant battle with cancer. Ron joined the Rotary Club of Calgary South on June 4, 1982. He was sponsored by Howard Miller. He served as a director in 1992 and 1993 and as president of the club in the 2018-2019 Rotary year.

He was involved in many committees including: the Dinner Club, Challenger Park, Social, Strategic Planning, Legacy Projects, Mentoring and Youth Exchange. He was 110% committed to Rotary. This was so evident

during his presidency when he was undergoing treatment for his cancer ... the treatments were taxing his strength, yet he would arrive at a board meeting and with "true grit" lead us through a number of challenging issues.

He also served on the Health and Wellness committee a year ago with me. He always volunteered to contact those in our club who were also battling cancer. I believe he not only found strength in those conversations, but he was able to offer encouragement and comfort to those undergoing treatment. From being involved with hosting Youth Exchange students, and from chairing the Youth Service committee while I served on the Board of Directors during Ron's presidency, I know firsthand of his commitment to youth.

Nowhere was Ron more committed than in his dedication to the Youth Exchange program in which he also served as District chair for a period. His legacy to youth exchange was certainly evident this summer in the video that Steve and Jamie produced in which former exchange students (both inbound and outbound) sent their greetings and appreciation to "Uncle Ron." Ron's legacy will carry on through Youth Exchange with the **Ronald Prokosch Memorial Scholarship** for our Youth Exchange Outbound students.

Steve Mason has also produced a slide show of some wonderful photos that the family have supplied as well as some from our Rotary photos.







Mary McPhee: I would like to say thank you for inviting me to say a few words about Ron Prokosch. My late Husband Bill, four Rotary couples and myself were great friends of both Ron and his ex-wife Lynn for years, starting in the early 1980's! We would often be together at each other's homes for dinners and any Rotary function that we could be involved with.

I do remember one time when we were all out at the Prokosch's Canmore home for a Grey Cup Game. We were about to start watching the game when the kitchen sink sprung a leak. Well, supposedly the educated men in the group, decided that this was an easy task.

Now we are talking about a Human Resource person, lawyer, a clothing salesman and two engineers. Their response to the problem was, PAUSE "Nothing to It!!!.

Well it took these men a few hours to correct this issue, I am totally convinced a plumber would have had it fixed in 10 minutes. You got to know there were many ideas, as to how to handle this situation, none really great. I might mention that there were libations involved.

In 1995 The Prokosch's, four Rotary couples and us, went to the Rotary International Convention in Nice, France. Before going there we all took a two-week tour of Italy. It was a most enjoyable trip and all of us learned a lot from our Acting Sommelier Mr. Mel Gray, we also seemed to be emptying our wallets a lot to pay for these treasured drinks. Ron would attest to that!

While at the Convention in Nice at the Closing Ceremonies, we all performed on stage in front of about 10,000 people promoting the 1996 International Convention to be held in Calgary. I know if any of you were in the four-month training for this event, you truly would know how bad we really were. We even were trained by the Choreographer of The Young Canadians. I am sure she has never had to deal with such a group before or since. We did manage to put on a successful show that seemed to please the audience. I know Ron cherished the hat we all had to wear at this performance as he still had it.

Ron and I remained friends right up until the end of his life. I was so fortunate to know Ron and be able to assist him with his deteriorating health through the years and more specifically the last three months. It was a joy to have a few dinners with his chosen friends at my home and to see the smile on his face as he enjoyed the friendship shown him.

He was an honest, trustworthy, fairly quiet individual who truly had integrity and loved Rotary, most importantly the Rotary Exchange. He believed in the four-way test and lived by it. He really gave everything he had and more to make anything he did a huge success each year. A few hiccups but always rectified. We all remember the special tribute paid him by some Exchange Students at his President's Ball. It truly was amazing and well earned.

Ron was born on September 6, 1946 in Edmonton. He and his parents and sister moved to Red Deer in 1951 where he attended junior and high school. Ron worked with his family furniture business before relocating to Kansas City to study in a program that would prepare him to work in the airline industry.

In 1964 he returned to Canada and Joined Canadian Pacific Airlines in Vancouver. Later he would attend Mount Royal with his good friend Gord Shopland PAUSE and this friendship lasted until Ron left us on June 20 of this year.

Following graduation from Mount Royal, Ron moved to Ottawa where he studied Political Science & Public Administration. Ron married in January, 1974 and inherited son Scott and moved to Toronto with the Bay. Ron and Lynn had a son Matt in July, 1975.

1978 found Ron in Winnipeg working for Canada Permanent Trust. 1980 Ron advanced his career and joined Gulf Oil as Manager of Recruitment. This same year Howard Miller, one of our cherished members from the past introduced him to Rotary. For many years Ron owned and operated a major Human Resources Consulting firm in Alberta and Saskatchewan. 2020 until his passing he was an independent Consultant/Contractor called the Prokosch Group

He held many memberships and Professional Positions. He served as Vice Chair of Calgary Rotary Challenger Park Board of Directors, Rotary International Youth Exchange and many Human Resource Positions. He also was a Member of the University Calgary Senate, and President of Rotary Club of Calgary at Stampede Park.

Ron is survived by his son Matthew and wife Loreen, son Scott and grandchildren Christina, Jake, Taylor, Joey, Catlin and Haley. I know Ron will be remembered by all of us with each of our own memories. Ron was a great friend to me and I will miss him a lot.







Mathew Prokosch shared some memories of his father. Mathew fondly remembers working on the Dream Home with him. Ron was passionate about Rotary, especially Youth exchange, and was greatly honoured by the student tribute to him at the President's Ball and the Youth Exchange scholarship in his name. Ron had some good advice – "Slow Down", take time to enjoy the important things in life, family and experiences. He worked very hard, but followed his own advice and took the time to slow down. He made time to travel and spend time with family, especially his beloved grandchildren.

Gordon Shopland was a friend of Ron's from high school days, when they were both members of a Youth Parliament. They roomed together at college and he has many good memories of their escapades. They had many gatherings over the years at the condo in Canmore and at a cabin north of Edmonton, sometimes with Ron's Youth Exchange students in tow. Rotary was a very important part of Ron's life and he was touched by the student video and the scholarship. Over the last two years, Ron struggled, but true to his commitment he carried on. He was a great friend, who is missed by so many

Volunteering at the

Hi everyone, Penny asked if I would provide information on volunteering at the Food Bank.

I have been volunteering and can tell you it is MUCH different than what you may remember when we used to arrive in full Rotary force every festive season to either sort in the warehouse, or distribute food on the assembly line directly to clients.

The Food Bank now asks for an estimated 6-week commitment on a certain day and a certain shift as this helps tremendously with contact tracing should we need to be contacted. I have been there since March and can vouch that the protocols are excellent. So that's the first thing before letting the Food Bank know you'd like to help – they would request this commitment.

The second is to understand there are various roles —sorting in the warehouse and "shopping" which is literally that. Taking a grocery cart and making the rounds to the food stations, the fridge/freezer and ending with a stack of baking to fill a cart according to colour schemes that identify how many people a cart is feeding.

If you are not sorting or shopping, you are taking the filled grocery cart and running it outside to the vehicles. Food Bank clients are not allowed to get out of their vehicles until you have left the cart at their trunk, waved through the window, and head back into the building. At which time they pack their own vehicle,



depart, and we retrieve the empty cart from the parking lot. It is then fully sprayed down with sanitizer at the doors before it goes back into the shopper's hands to refill.

If anyone is interested, I am happy to facilitate an email introduction and simply advise you are a member of The Rotary Club of Calgary at Stampede Park interested to volunteer.
