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Rotarians and Guests arriving today were greeted by Santa (**Arnie Felker**) and had their picture taken by **John Shield**. Thank you for your assistance, Arnie and John.

Our emcee today is **Corinne Wilkinson** who had quite the challenge managing all the Rotarians, Guests and Visitors as the hugging and laughing was so amazing! Corinne said how grateful she was to emcee the day today as Rotary has become her family and we are just the best people she knows. I will start by taking a page out of **President Chas's** book and share a bit of holiday history with you.

Did You Know? "A Visit from St. Nicholas", more commonly known as "'Twas the Night Before Christmas", is a poem first published anonymously in 1823 and later attributed to Clement Clarke Moore, who claimed authorship in 1837 – that is 14 years later!

He is said to have composed it on a snowy winter's day during a shopping trip on a sleigh. His inspiration for the character of Saint Nicholas was a local Dutch handyman as well as the historical Saint Nicholas. As a side note, I have MANY relatives who would tell you "if you ain't Dutch, you ain't much."

Moore originated many of the features that are still associated with Santa Claus today, while borrowing other aspects such as the use of reindeer. The poem was first published anonymously when a friend of Mr. Moore sent it in for publication to the The New York Sentinel. It is said that Moore, a brilliant professor, at first did not want to be connected with the unscholarly verse that he had written for his children. But soon, New Yorkers embraced the child-centered version of Christmas as if they had been doing it all their lives.



I would also like to take a page out of **Ben Steblecki's** book: According to the Alaska Department of Fish & Game, while both male and female reindeer grow antlers in the summer each year, male reindeer drop their antlers at the beginning of winter, usually late November to mid-December. Female reindeer retain their antlers until after they give birth in the spring. Therefore, according to EVERY historical rendition depicting Santa's reindeer, EVERY single one of them, from Rudolph to Blitzen, had to be... a girl.

We should have known... ONLY women would be able to drag a fat man in a red velvet suit... all around the world.... in one night... and not get lost.

And, what would Christmas be without a page out of **Jim Hutchens'** book: As a little girl climbed onto Santa's lap, Santa asked his usual, "And what would you like for Christmas?" The child stared at him, open mouthed, and horrified for a moment, then gasped: "Didn't you get my E-mail?" **Glen Richardson:** maybe we need to teach the little girl about a White Berry. A white berry certainly seems to be Santa's chosen means of communication.

Thank you A very special thank you to our two Christmas celebration luncheon organizers: **Darlene Whitmore and Michael Zacharki:** please stand – and to the rest of the social committee, could you please stand as well and thank you for making this such a wonderful event for all of us. As well, a big thank you to **Christine Kyte** for her homemade salted caramels and all the wrapping – you each have them at your plate.

I am very pleased to introduce **President Chas Filipski.**

President Chas began by saying Christmas is generally a time for starting traditions making memories or simply reflecting on those memories. Rotary occasions always remind me of my folks so I'd like to share a memory with you.

Through my life I've always had a memory of Christmas morning that was magical. I can quite clearly recall coming down the stairs to a house that was adorned with a beautiful tree, lights everywhere, presents and decorations that transformed my normal living room into that magical bubble. Not long after our twins were born and as they were approaching the sweet spot of the commercial side of Christmas, I spoke to my late mother about my recollection of those incredible mornings. She looked at me and said he also remembered.

I asked her to explain. She told me this. Around 5 years old when kids start to understand what the morning is all about she and my father would gather up all the decorations, presents, tree included and hide them in the garage or basement. We would be put to bed with nothing and I mean nothing, out of the ordinary in our house. Pop would read 'Twas the night before Christmas' and then say goodnight after tucking us in. Then, after that, my folks would haul in the tree and decorate it completely, put up all the decorations, place the presents under the tree and then they got to go to bed.

Hearing this I turned to my wife Terri – who already knew what her knucklehead husband was thinking, and before I could say anything, she looked me straight in the eye and said: 'if you must...!'

Well, Terri and I can tell you two things. It will be the most exhausting, tiresome, monumental exercise you will undertake at that point in Christmas. Most are putting their feet up or maybe assembling that last toy. You'll never understand why you are doing this – that is until you see the look on your kid's faces as they come downstairs and see the transformation for that first time!

Terri and I did this for three years. We look back on it and cringe but then realize the memory we've created for our sons, and also for Terri and I as well as the connection to my late parents. **This is not for the faint of heart! But if you want to try it by all means come talk to us first for some tips!**

The history books tell of how the west was settled and they tell the stories of many brave men and their accomplishments. There isn't as much written about the women who shared the challenges and were their partners along the journey.

Because of our Rotary Club's strong relationship with the Calgary Stampede, I have chosen to tell you about Guy Weadick and his partner, Flores LaDue as an example of a man written about in history books, and the female partner who was by his side for the journey.

All of us know Guy Weadick as the founder of the Calgary Stampede. But how many of us know of his wife Flores LaDue?

Flores LaDue traveled around the world & performed in a number of Wild West Shows as a trick rider and fancy roper. She met Guy while they were both performing in one of those shows. Flores was famous in her own right & retired undefeated World Champion Lady Fancy Roper after performing & competing for 31 years!

With her background, it's obvious Flores was a huge support to Guy when he was making plans for the Calgary Stampede. And she did it, much the same way our Partners support us during the Calgary Stampede. She did it out of love, and with no expectations of being recognized for it. She was in a lifelong partnership with Guy. At his life partner, she considered it her role to stand by him.

Guy and Flores lived west of High River. They are both buried in the High River cemetery. After visiting the cemetery and seeing their gravestones, cowboy poet Doris Daley wrote the following poem.



A True Partner

How do you do Miss Flores Ladue?
Let's take a ride through the sweet Alberta countryside.
In have a plan for a big wild west show, right here on the banks of the Bow.
A plan for a big rodeo.



Mr. Weadick, I'm told you talk big and bold,
Well that's fine with me cause I'm not cut out for cake and tea.
I've had my eye on you from the start Mr. Weadick, how's the state of your heart?
Guy Weadick, I might lasso your heart.

She had her trick rope and he had a dream,
Road at a quick lope, Oh what a team.
They shook out a loop and they rode to succeed and started the Calgary Stampede.
And started the Calgary Stampede.

1951, Her last setting sun.
A grave stands alone with three words carved upon the stone.

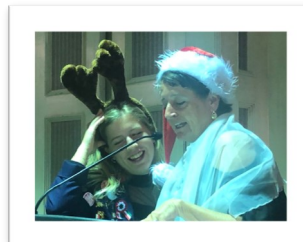

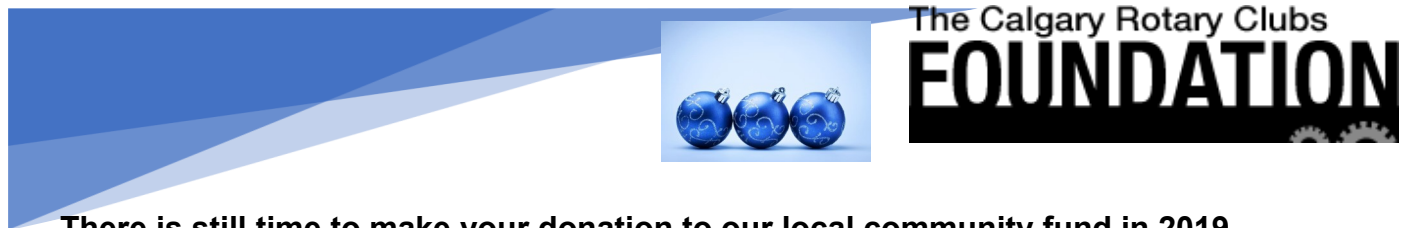

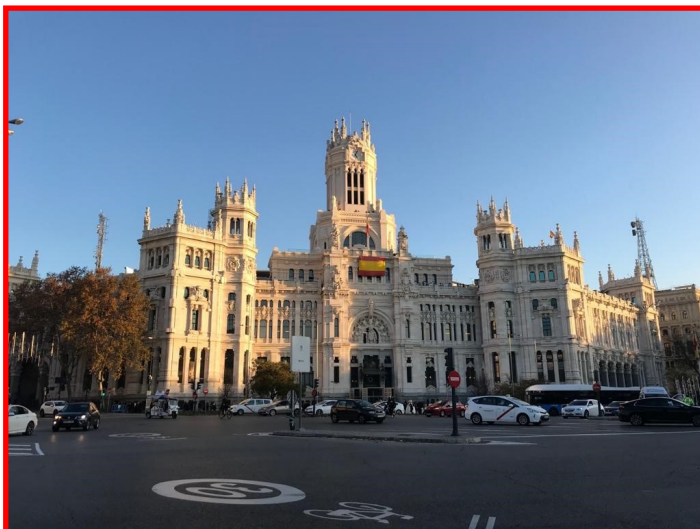
I am three months into my exchange now and it has been wonderful in almost every part. There will always be things that exchange hard, especially around the holidays.
