Mainstream Rotary or Rotary International - which is the entity you've all probably heard about, the one with 1.3 million members worldwide, philanthropic participation, polio eradication (almost there) as well as countless worldwide programs designed to better help our fellow man and promote "goodwill and friendship" in the process.

The other Rotary, for me, is My Rotary and is likely part of the reason you're sitting with us today. The Rotary that will touch your world more directly. Perhaps it's in the personal relationship of the individual who invited you here today. Perhaps it's the unique venue where we are today - our Rotary House that was built by this club. Perhaps it's something you've heard about Rotary or Rotarians around Calgary that may have piqued your interest in philanthropic endeavors.

Whatever the reason, you're here, and our Club, South Club, is your gateway to the network of clubs that make up the larger picture of Rotary and being a Rotarian.

So here's a little of my story...

My introduction to this organization and to this club was sometime around 1968. My late father, Gene, joined this very Club in that year under then President **George Adam** who is still with us. As a matter of fact, let me tell this quick fact about George. Mr. Adam is a charter member of this club and was inducted in February 1955. That makes him a member of this Club longer than I've been alive. George is slowing down quite a bit these days, but it's still a pleasure to see him whenever he's here. My point is that he's a unique tie to the very foundation of our Club's beginning - besides the fact that he's an incredibly great guy!.

Now back when my father joined, South Club had a fundraiser called the Spring Sale. It was a very beautiful name for a very ugly fundraiser. In a nutshell, the Rotarians of this Club would go around the City and pick up the junk that people would donate. I guess I shouldn't say junk as much as I should say "mostly junk". And that junk was heavy!!

It was appliances of all kinds - washers, dryers, stoves, fridges - anything like that and mountains of clothing would all be picked up in cars and trucks by the members - and some of their kids - and brought back onto the grounds here. It was so long ago that I can't quite remember where it was. At that hall were virtually all the spouses of the Rotarians who at that time were called Rotary Ann's and my late mother Marge was one of them. They are now known as our Partners and they are Partners in every sense of the word. I could spend quite a while on their contribution. Typically they are the spouses of members of this Club. As such, they have a naturally strong voice in what they see are needs within our community. They complement everything we do as Rotarians - hold their own meetings, elect their own Board and we are lucky to have their dedication. The Partners are another unique part of our Club. There are only a handful of such associations in Rotary.

Back to my story. Those amazing ladies spent hour after hour - often well into the night - sorting through the mounds of clothes - separating- pricing - categorizing and laying them out on tables that were row upon row. They would then direct us where to put the heavy appliances. All of this in preparation for the early morning start of the sale. Whatever was made on the sale of those items would be put in the coffers of the club for donations to worthwhile causes. The rest of the "junk" would be hauled away which was done by Club members. As a teenager, whose father volunteered me to lift everything heavy in sight - I cannot tell you how little I enjoyed those weekends.

Most of all, however, I lamented my inability to find the unbridled fun and laughter that permeated every Rotarian and Partner that was involved that weekend. They laughed and joked constantly no matter how dreary the work was. I had no clue as to how one found joy in that sea of misery. This was the same laughter and joking that I witnessed in my folks every time an event had Rotary attached to it.

Mercifully, the idea of the Dream Home was born right around that time. For a young person, the Calgary Stampede was all about midway rides, food, dressing up like a cowboy and maybe talking to a cowgirl or two. I can still recall negotiating with my father my time allotted for Stampeding vis-à-vis my time selling dream home tickets. While it cramped my style a bit - this was much easier than hauling fridges!

Fast forward to 1996. My education and career took me away from Calgary, and it had had been almost 3 decades since I had lived here. I had lost contact with those that I knew. Calgary had grown and was almost unrecognizable. I made the decision to seek out membership in the South Club - my father's club. This was almost entirely because my father had recently passed and I sought personal solace in a place where people my father loved convened. A place that I saw him laugh, joke, and always be happy.

I remembered one person in particular from those youthful Rotary days that knew my folks well and would give me the straight scoop on Rotary. His name was **Ken Copithorne**. Ken and another great member of this Club, **Ed Whitaker**, brought me into this Club in late 1996 under then-President **Mel Gray**. From that first day as an official Rotarian I began to see and feel what my folks were enjoying about Rotary.

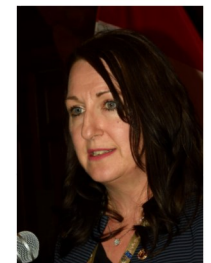
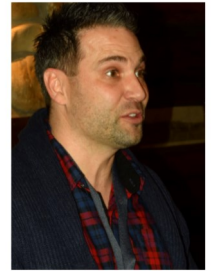

**Dana Hunter** Dana was the youngest Rotarian in Canada for 5 years when she joined. Her father had her involved with Rotary since she was 12 years old and she stayed involved due to the focus on Polio and her father had polio. Dana feels that our Club is her 'chosen family' as we help, answer questions, give great hugs, and show they care. She has loved being involved with the Dream Home and with Stampede Lotteries – come and join us!

**Hugh Delaney** My first contact with Rotary was in 1949/50. John Stein (now deceased) and I were selected to attend Regina Rotary Club every 6 weeks. We learned that business people participated in many city charitable organizations as responsible citizens to provide for support of various needy organizations. We learned the 4-way test. John eventually graduated in law and married and moved to Calgary and joined Calgary South. I eventually moved to Calgary and John sponsored me into Rotary.

When we produced a program for Regina Rotary I was chosen to lead a sing song and do fines for various absorbed reasons! When I got back to Champion High School the principal told us a Mr. Crittenden at CKCK radio called to have me do an audition as an announcer. Eventually I went down and did an audition. I had never thought about radio and was atrocious trying to be Lorne Greene and Earl Cameron! Ultimately they said I could learn and they hired me for July and August. I went to university one year and filled in when people were sick or needed holidays.

I fell in love with the business and after university I went to my home in the Yukon, built a nest egg and flew out to Regina. No jobs, so I stayed in the Yukon and went to the station daily until an opening took place. After 2.5 months the station called with an opening in the news. I said just get me in! I was a news reporter. Then I saw that the guys driving Cadillac's and Lincoln's were the salesmen. I applied 3 times when openings came. Finally they hired me in sales. Also in 1954 the radio station for a television license and Mr. Crittenden told me I was going to be the weatherman. Ultimately, I moved to Winnipeg and then Calgary. I was always aware of the Rotary Clubs emphasis on being a complete person working and supporting the Rotary participation in the community. It's been a great ride. Rotary takes care of the community I live in. It is a great time and you give it something and it will come right back to you!

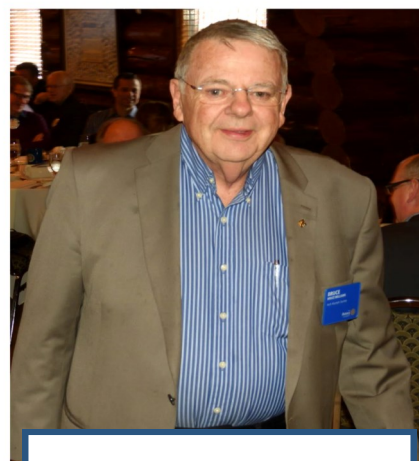
