

Upcoming Camps The Rotary Club of Calgary at Stampede Park is a sponsor a number of upcoming camps that are available in which Stay In School students may participate. RYPEN (Rotary Youth Program of Enrichment) RYPEN is ideal for teenagers looking to grow, develop their leadership skills, expand their comfort zone, and try out a new adventure. Participants must be between 13 and 17 years old when the camp happens, May 2 to 5, 2025 at the camp facility at the Little Bow Travers Reservoir. Rotary Youth Program of Enrichment | Rotary 5360 RYLA 2025 (Rotary Youth Leadership Awards) will be held from May 8 to 11, 2025, at Deer Valley Meadows, 39017, Range Rd 230, Alix, AB. RYLA delivers tangible tools and exercises for youth to be today's leaders and tomorrow's global shapers. Through innovative programming, RYLA empowers engaged youth leaders through a shared leadership and personal development journey. Equipped with practical tools, unleashed passion, and personal networks, RYLA 5360 graduates are the preeminent force for positive change in communities across southern Alberta. Projects launched by RYLA 5360 graduates have national and international impacts. Sponsored delegates must be in senior high school, over the age of 15, and under the age of 18 to be eligible to attend. RAYEC (Rotary Alberta Youth Entrepreneurship Camp) will be held August 10 to 16, 2025 near Medicine Hat. RAYEC is a week-long August camp for youth ages 13-15 interested in business and entrepreneurship. The main focus of this camp is to educate youth about marketing, advertising, preparing a cash-flow statement and writing a business plan. Campers set up their own businesses and borrow real money from actual bankers. The last day is "Business Day" at the camp, when campers open and operate their businesses. The youth also participate in many fun recreational activities throughout their week at camp. RAYEC accepts 60 youths, from within District 5360, ages 13-15 each year based on their applications. Youth Leaders Each year, 10 past Campers between the ages of 16 and 18 have the chance to attend training sessions prior to camp and return to camp as volunteers called Youth Leaders.

The Rotary Adventures in Career and Financial Wellness Camp is a transformative experience designed to help teens ages 14–17 make informed career and financial decisions. This camp offers hands-on learning, interactive sessions, and real-world insights from industry professionals, giving participants the tools they need to design a prosperous and secure future. The camp will be held in Calgary from July 3 to July 6 and topics include Investing in Your Creer; Funding Your Financial Future; Driving Towards Success; and Getting Keys to Your Castle. AIM (Adventures in Mountains) will be held in Canmore from September 21-25, 2025. This is a new Rotary Adventure program designed for 15-18 years old individuals interested in an exploration of activities, history and current issues in the Canadian Rockies. Adventures in Mountain participants will experience a variety of expert-guided explorations of recreation and educational activities, in and around, the Canmore region. AIM participants will focus on an understanding of the existing landscape, while engaging in creative thinking regarding the future of mountainous regions in Alberta and other parts of our country. In addition, students will be treated to outstanding Canmore hospitality and have the opportunity to make new friends from all parts of our great country. Youth aged 18 should be prepared to complete a Vulnerable Sector check. New Generations is a short term, customizable program for post-secondary students and professionals ages 18 to 30. Participants are fully involved in designing their international exchange that combines their professional/vocational goals with Rotary service projects and cultural exchange exposure. Rotary Youth Exchange (Long and Short Term) is an opportunity for students between the ages of 15.5 years to under 18 to experience up to a year of living in an international country. Through Rotary's long-term or short-term Youth Exchange programs, you'll learn a new way of living, a great deal about yourself, and maybe even a new language. You'll also be an ambassador, teaching people you meet about your country, culture, and ideas. You can help bring the world closer and make some good friends in the process. There is also a need for volunteers and camp counsellors for these programs.
