The founding member of NMC's collections department, Jesse has been with the organization since 2000, when it was still known as the Chinook Keyboard Centre.

Jesse is a musical instrument designer, restorer, and conservation specialist in training. Jesse was heavily involved in the design and development of Studio Bell and currently oversees the creation of new exhibitions, preservation of more than 2,000 artifacts and artist access to NMC's vast collection of "living" instruments.

Jesse explained that NMC's roots can be traced back to the installation of a pipe organ; known as the Carthy Organ in Calgary's Jack Singer Concert Hall in 1987.

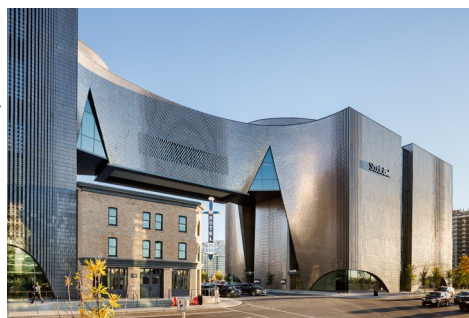
With the Carthy came the genesis of the International Organ Festival and Competition presented by TriumphEnt, which ran annually in Calgary from 1990 to 2002. The Carthy and the success of the festival subsequently inspired the creation of a new organization, the Chinook Keyboard Centre, which began developing a collection of keyboard instruments in mid-1996.

Chinook Keyboard Centre was soon renamed Cantos Music Museum and the scope of its collection expanded beyond keyboard instruments to include electronic instruments and sound equipment. In the year 2000, the museum began hosting concerts and offering gallery tours.

In 2003, TriumphEnt and Cantos Music Museum joined forces as Cantos Music Foundation, expanding programming to the collection and gallery spaces. Then, in 2005, an exhibition commemorating 100 years of music in Alberta planted the seed to expand the organization's scope to chronicle, celebrate, and foster a broader vision for music in Canada. And so, in February 2012, Cantos became the National Music Centre (NMC).

A new era in NMC's legacy began in 2013 when construction started on its new building, Studio Bell. The 160,000 square-foot architectural masterpiece in the heart of Calgary's East Village opened on Canada Day 2016 to the enthusiasm of music-lovers, tourists, teachers, and Calgarians alike.

Today, Studio Bell is home to NMC's expanded collection, which includes more than 2,000 rare instruments and artifacts, as well as four Canadian Music Halls of Fame. With interactive educational programming, live performances, engaging exhibitions, and in-house artist incubation, NMC's new home is so much more than a museum. It is a hub for music, innovation, and cultural discovery in Canada.



Jesse went on to explain the history of some of the legacy buildings that have been incorporated into the neighbourhood of the NMC, including the King Eddy which was once a biker bar, before becoming the first blues bar.

He went on to tell the story the King Eddie owner who embraced desegregation and promoted the opportunity to invite individuals of colour to mix with whites.

NMC invites you to experiment, perform and record in one of the most unique recording environments in the world. Our studio environments include three control rooms, three live rooms, three isolation booths, one live music venue, and access to over 300 musical instruments spanning 450 years of music technology.

Record using one of three historic analogue consoles in any combination of adjoining live rooms.

Each live room is designed to have its own sound and has a selection of historic musical instruments suited for the uniquely designed spaces.



Jesse explained the NMC's Four Pillars of Service

EXHIBITIONS: NMC will preserve Canadian culture and identity by sustaining our musical heritage. Their exhibitions exist to share the sounds, stories, instruments, and artifacts of our past and present in an innovative and engaging format accessible to all.

ARTIST DEVELOPMENT: NMC will foster emerging and established musical talent. Their artist development programs will offer artists time and space to create, experiment, innovate, and record in our world class recording environment. Artists will also have access to our living collection of historic instruments, legendary recording equipment, and expertise.

PERFORMANCE: NMC will elevate the live performance experience for diverse audiences large and small. Their performance venues, including the Performance Hall and historic King Eddy — host local, national, and international artists from across the musical spectrum.

EDUCATION: NMC will foster curiosity, discovery, and learning through music. Our education programs offer a diverse range of inclusive and collaborative learning opportunities for music lovers of all ages and backgrounds. From our school programs designed for students in Kindergarten through Grade 12 to our Master in Residence program, we bring the stories of Canadian music to life.

Q: Will the Bell Centre ever feature a Randy Bachman exhibit?

A: Yes. They will soon be home to an archives and collection as a part of an exhibition scheduled for 2020

Q: Any Plans for a Gord Downie exhibit (Tragically Hip)?

A: Yes. But this one will take some time. It has been in the planning and negotiation stage for a couple years, but will be coming eventually.

Q: Can you get a reward for finding an exterior tile that has disconnected from the building?

A: No – and don't try to take one off.

Q: Any events you'd like to promote?

A: Yes, we offer \$10 date nights (check website) as well as season passes that are 20% off for a limited time.

Q: What did the project cost?

A: \$191 million – 75M of which came from government. The majority of annual operating funds come from events, donations, memberships and fundraising.

Jim Cairns thanked Jesse by calling attention to his massive contributions to this project and the City itself, despite his young age. He thanked him for an engaging lunch and presentation, and applauded him for inspiring more questions (5) than any speaker before him.

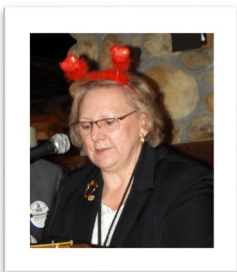
Sergeant at Arms: Jim Fitzowich:

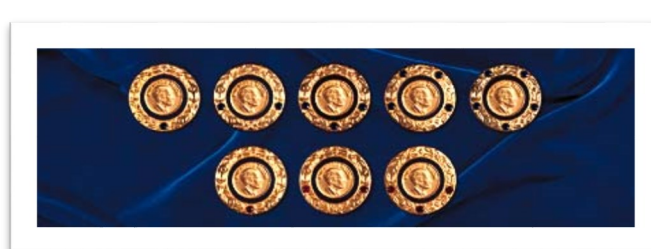

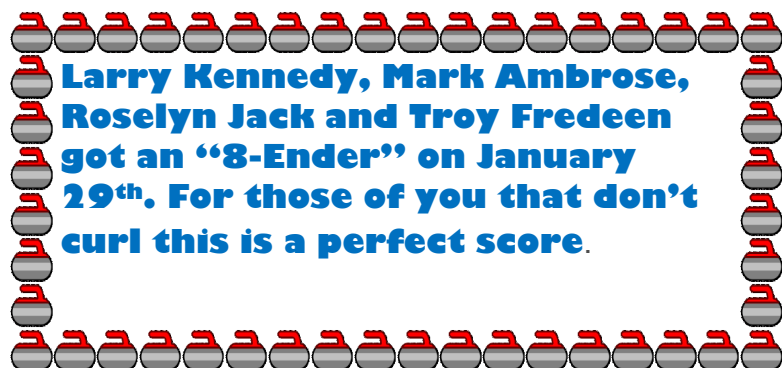
