Welcome to the January 13th meeting of the Rotary Club of Calgary at Stampede Park. I am the Club's President, **Craig Stokke.** Since today's meeting is all about numbers I wanted to present some interesting numbers to you:

- ♦ In 2021, there were 2,750 billionaires in the world. In the year 2000, there were only 470 billionaires. I am not one of them.
- ♦ The fastest record for a person counting from one to one million is 89 days. Jeremy Harper of Alabama spent 16 hours per day counting aloud, while 8 hours were for eating and sleeping.
- ♦ When you shuffle cards, the amount of possible combinations in a deck is so varied, it is possible that the resulting order of the cards has never happened before in history.
- In a room of 70 people there is a 99.9% chance that two or more people will share a birthday.
- ♦ In 2021, Calgary's estimated population is 1.37 million people. The number of Rotarians worldwide is around 1.4 million people.
- A sold out Stampeders game at McMahon Stadium holds around 36,000 people. That's around the same number of visitors we anticipate will attend the 2025 Rotary International Convention in Calgary.

Sergeant-At-Arms: Jim Fitzowich: A hush went through the room in anticipation!

Jim thought Penny should a donation to the Club from her winnings – but, Penny convinced Jim that the fund could either

go to the 'pot' or it could go to buy drinks at curling! Jim withdrew the request!



Terry Allan was asked if they recall there being a formal Club AGM with the last 27 years? He was correct!

Appears that modern AGM's have evolved from the Medieval English Kings convening Parliaments to raise money through taxation, sometimes as often as once a year. Emergence of a parliament no later than the rule of Edward I. Edward called leading nobles and church leaders to discuss government matters, especially finance and taxation. A meeting in 1295 became known as the Model Parliament, the basis for modern government, and the Roberts Rules used by this Club. In 1307, Edward I agreed not to collect certain taxes without the "consent of the realm" through parliament. This tradition continues today through modern legislatures and AGM's.

The Sergeant

The formal role of a sergeant-at-arms in modern legislatures and other bodies corporate is to keep order during meetings. The sergeants-at-arms date from the time of King Richard I (around 1189) as his bodyguard, and pre-date the rise of parlia ments. The sergeant-at-arms was especially charged with arresting those suspected of treason. All members present and online contemplating treason during today's AGM are therefore fined \$20. Other responsibilities of the sergeant-at-arms included "collecting loans and, impressing men and ships, serving on local administration and in all sorts of ways interfering with local administration and justice." It appears that I have that pretty much covered in spades.

The Chancellor

The holder of the office of Chancellor of the Exchequer is ex officio Second Lord of the Treasury, and roughly equivalent to our Club Treasurer, Mr. **Don Mintz.** The role of Chancellor dates from at least 1129–30 under King Henry I & predates both the Sergeant and the Parliament. A previous chancellor, Robert Lowe, said in 1870: "The Chancellor of the Exchequer is a man whose duties make him more or less of a taxing machine. He is entrusted with a certain amount of misery which it is his duty to distribute as fairly as he can." Budgets are a state secret until presented by the Chancellor. By tradition, the chancellor has been allowed to drink whatever they wish while making the annual Budget Speech to parliament. This includes alcohol. English chancellors have generally opted for whisky or brandy. As Treasurer Mintz hails from Saskatchewan, I leave a tipple of Canadian Crown Royal Whisky. There are no other fines today from the Sergeant, as there is nothing I can do in addition to what is coming next from our Chancellor and High Lord of the Treasury.






ROTARY CLUB OF CALGARY AT STAMPEDE PARK

I would like to introduce our Club Treasurer Don Mintz who will take us through the business portion of our meeting.

Speaker: Don Mintz presented the financial documents that all members had received by email last week prior to this meeting.



<u>Club Funds</u> are having challenges – made more challenging by the pandemic. Don presented an analysis of this account from 2018 to 2020 and it shows that annually we are in a deficit \$50-70K. We need to address this or our Club will not be sustainable in 3 years. We really need a new and repeat funding source. The Rock 'em Sock 'em Fund Raiser is a great option (so long as it can occur due to capacity limits). Please spend time thinking about this as we are all in this together.

- We have a potential sublease for the office.
- ♦ The Partners have already picked their charities.
- **♦** AGLC rules are now being correctly distributed.
- Please contact Don or Craig if you need more information or have suggestions.

President Craig:

Our Club is fantastic and we serve the community very well. This information is important so we continue to be able to do our good work. The past 4 years we have been fortunate to have a few Club members cover the deficit and we really appreciate them. But it is not the proper way to do business and it does not meet the 4-way test. The Convention will not add to our Club costs.

We will be providing manpower and operational support

In Closing: Don, thank you for bringing us up to speed with Club finances. This is never an easy topic and there is not an easy solution, but in order for our Club to move forward, we need to understand exactly where we are. We are very fortunate to have someone of your caliber, experience, and knowledge as out Treasurer. Thank you for everything.

Thank you Don. At the end of the day we all agree our Club needs to remain financially viable to continue doing our great work. There is no question we need to be responsible with our expenses, but we also need to raise revenues. We do have several options that will be debated and investigated; raising dues, finding a community project that will allow us to use the money towards Club operations, or using other funds for Club expenses... or a combination of these options. In any case, the Club will do its due diligence and


the Board will NOT make a unilateral decisions without consulting membership. Any decisions will need to be approved by membership through an e-vote. I would just suggest that the status quo, having a small group of generous Rotarians supporting our club does not meet our four way test.


