

1. "Time to Recession" has increased

- PIMCO does not feel there will be a recession in 2020.
- Trade uncertainty has diminished
- We've had a 10 year period of expansion in the economy and this is expected to continue
- Need to realize that "how much we pay for things" means it is now more costly to purchase goods and this includes investment assets.

2. "Loss given recession" has increased

- Banks don't have room to maneuver due to low interest rates, therefore if a recession were to occur it will be more painful.
- Banks are unwilling to undertake loans to corporations and there are less monies available to lend.

3. U.S. housing strength

- PIMCO likes U.S. housing.
- In the last recession over 3 million homes had to get used up, and that has happened.
- Today there is not enough supply and investing in a home is once again profitable.
- Unfortunately for entrepreneurs they find it difficult to obtain a loan today due to not having a T
 -4 slip. This is an opportunity for PIMCO to provide capital.

4. The World Leads and the U.S. lags

• Growth in the U.S. has been much slower than in the rest of the world.

5. Inflation: The devil they prefer

Unemployment is at new lows however increased wage pressure will fuel inflation.

6. Dealing with disruption

- The political fallout from trade policies will continue.
- Trade deals help economies however tensions between nations will also continue.
- Political tensions could be the catalyst to cause a recession.

7. Perceptions on Oil

- The economy is OK and there is an increased demand for oil.
- There are less monies available to increase the supply side of oil.
- Rig counts have been down but the pressure to supply will grow.
