Welcome to the January 27th meeting of the **Rotary Club of Calgary at Stampede Park**. I am the Club's President, **Craig Stokke**.

Here is a bit of history for you:

- ♦ On this day in 1756, Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart was born in Salzburg, Austria. From the age of five, through his untimely death at age 35, Mozart created over 600 compositions including 16 operas, 41 symphonies, 27 piano and five violin concerti, 25 string quartets, 19 masses, and many other works. Now, don't you feel inadequate?

Around the year 700 BC, the Roman king Numa Pompilius proposed to add two additional winter months. But until 153 BC the Roman year still started in March. - Ancient Anglo-Saxons called January Wulfmonath. It was the month hungry wolves would come scavenging.
   Personally, I call January the month everyone gets in my way at the gym. Fortunately that only lasts until February.
- Oddly enough, couples tend to separate or divorce more so in January than any other month of the year.
- Generally, January is the coldest month of the year in the Northern Hemisphere and the warmest month of the year in the Southern Hemisphere.
- ♦ A Portuguese expedition landed on the coast of South America on January 1, 1502. This is why the Portuguese named the place Rio de Janeiro (River of January).

#### **DALE STRUKSNES: INDUCTION**

**PENNY LECKIE:** It gives me great pleasure and I am truly honoured to introduce you to, and to welcome as a member of our Rotary Club, someone I have been friends with for almost 40 years. At the same time, I have mixed feelings about Dale Struksnes joining our Rotary Club, because he and his family have covered numerous Dream Home shifts for me over the years. With Dale as a Member of our Club, I am going to have to hustle to find replacements.

As I work my way through this introduction, you will realize Dale and his family are sports enthusiasts. It's no coincidence that is how I first met Dale, so many years ago. Dale's wife, Debbie, who is here today, is one of



my best friends, and has been since we worked together at KPMG in the mid-1980's. Debbie and Dale played in a mixed slow pitch league. I don't know how it is these days, but back then, you had to have a certain number of girls playing or you forfeited the game. I couldn't hit, run or catch, but I did own a baseball glove, and I was a girl. It wasn't unusual in the summer for Debbie to say to me, "Dale just called, wondering if you could play slow pitch with us." It was always fun to go out, so my answer was usually, "yes". When I arrived at the ball diamond, Dale was always sure to tell me his game strategy, mostly being, if you stand here, you shouldn't be in the way, and if there is a stray ball hit your way, this is who will run over and catch it for you.

Dale grew up on a farm near Hussar 30 miles east of Strathmore. This gave Dale his strong work ethic and taught him at an early age the importance of family and community. His first job after high school was as a roughneck, working on drilling rigs around Alberta. This gave him a passion for the oilpatch. His career evolved & he left the drilling rigs but throughout his career Dale remained in this industry.

Dale obtained a Bachelor of Commerce Degree from the U of C. He obtained both his CMA and CPA designations. I would have to search for it, but somewhere, I have a picture of Dale and I attending our CMA graduation together in 1991. Who knew 30 years later, I would be sponsoring him to join Rotary. Dale's professional career in downtown Calgary started with the accounting firm, PWC. Like many bright accountants, Dale left the accounting industry and went to work for an oil company. He also obtained a Certified Engineering Technologist designation in Petroleum Technology from SAIT.

Dale was with Shell Canada from 1988 – 1996. He initially worked as a wellsite geologist on high profile discovery wells in the Caroline area and other Alberta Foothills deep gas plays. He also provided business analyst support to the Gas Development department and worked within the Purchasing department doing supply chain management analysis. The majority of Dale's career was spent with the engineering firm, Fekete Associates. He was with them from 1996 – 2013. Fekete was a reservoir engineering consulting firm. Dale's roles became increasingly more important. He was responsible for production optimization reviews, regulatory applications and reserve evaluations.

On a personal note, I want to share Fekete Associates had their office in our building. We crossed paths with Dale and other members of the Firm on a regular basis. The leaders of this Firm genuinely cared for people, and it was a family atmosphere within the Firm. When they heard through the grapevine, ie, Dale, that I was raising funds for scholarships for young single mothers, one of the partners phoned me, invited me to their office and presented me with a substantial cheque as a donation. I know Dale made many dear friends during his time at Fekete, and he continues to maintain those relationships. The Firm sold to a US based entity, IHS Market in 2013.

With IHS, Dale assumed a Director role, leading the legacy Fekete Associates Firm within the worldwide IHS Market organization. As the Director of Consulting, Dale was responsible for business development, personnel and project management. He managed a technical team of engineers and geologists on petroleum engineering projects throughout Canada, US, Europe, Africa, South America, Middle East, SE Asia and Australia.

For a variety of reasons, Dale made the decision to retire and leave IHS Market in 2018. This gave him the opportunity to focus on supporting his mother through her final days. His time for the next couple of years was taken up with the administration of a complicated Estate of farm property and other assets amongst both farming and non-farming siblings. No easy task. Dale is busy these days staying current and educating himself about investments and financial matters. He manages the family's investments, but finds he has spare time. He is ready to focus on giving back to the community.

As previously noted, Dale's commitment to being involved and giving back to the community goes back to his childhood. Over the years, Dale has volunteered with Habitat for Humanity, Calgary Food Bank, Wings over Springbank airshow, the High River flood cleanup, and as a casino volunteer for a number of other charities. Somewhere along the way, Dale obtained his pilot's license. He currently volunteers with the Hangar Flight Museum. He supports the Sandstone MacEwan Community Association by assisting with community cleanups, casinos, and working as a "rink rat" maintaining the outdoor skating rink. Not much fun when the temperature dips...

Dale and Deb met at a learn to curl clinic held at the Calgary Curling Club many years ago. A number of the students joined a league together, and they started curling at the Big Four. This is when Dale and Deb got to know one another. Dale once told me that if he wants to embarrass Debbie, he tells people that they met "between the sheets". A few years later, I thought they were going to the NFR rodeo in Las Vegas, but they tricked me and eloped while they were down there.

Over the years, Dale has played hockey, fastball, slow-pitch, curling, volleyball, badminton, golf and others. Dale has slowed down his active sports involvement to mostly hiking and curling. Knowing his background, I recruited him, and he has been playing regularly on our Rotary curling team. Dale and Debbie have been loyal Flames fans and season ticket holders since 1983. Dale and Debbie have two daughters, Carissa and Kirsten. Carissa is married to Tom, and they have a dog named Daisy. The family is very close.

Carissa graduated university with double degrees as a geologist and geophysicist. When the downturn happened a few years ago, and I knew she wasn't as busy as she could be, I suggested she come and help my office get through busy season. Just last week, we toasted Carissa's success in passing the final exam to become a CPA. She has some work experience requirements to complete which means she has to work for another firm, but we hope to get her back at our office one day.

Kirsten went to university in South Carolina on a volleyball scholarship. Following her graduation with a marketing degree, when her visa ran out, and I knew she wasn't as busy as she could be, I suggested she come and help my office get through busy season. Kirsten resisted the pull of a career in accounting. She left our firm last year to pursue other interests. She is still passionate about volleyball and is involved with coaching in the U of C Junior Dino program. I still think she would make a great accountant, and maybe someday, she will be lured into it.

As I mentioned, the theme of sports flows throughout this introduction. Murray Flegel invited Dale for coffee earlier this week, and I am sure you can appreciate there was lots for them to chat about. In a minute, Murray is going to come up and, as a Past President, provide the induction for Dale. To close with a sports analogy, I know Dale will be a great team player for our Rotary Club. So, please join me in welcoming Dale Struksnes as the newest member of the Rotary Club of Calgary at Stampede Park.

#### **CLUB INVESTMENT POLICY PRESENTATION**



#### SPEAKER INTRO: PAST PRESIDENT PENNY LECKIE:

Towards the end of Chas' year as President, I was approached by a woman in the investment industry.

To be frank, she was difficult to understand, so I had the impression she wanted to discuss our Club's investments with CRCF. It turns out she knew someone at CRCF who had referred her to me, and she was hoping to get me to refer some of my clients to her. Anyways, I agreed to have lunch with her and because I thought it was about Rotary, I invited Chas to join us, since he was President.



The time spent with the investment lady was a complete waste of time, as she was really just making cold calls with anyone she could connect with. The meeting had nothing to do with Rotary... However, after she left, Chas and I visited a bit longer. Because the topic had been investments, Chas and I reflected on the Club's substantial Stay in School portfolio, and we felt the Club's Board should have a better understanding of how the funds are invested, and the Board should play a larger role in their administration.

The funds had always been invested at Richardson with Keith Bekker, and the Stay in School committee steered the ship. Club Treasurer Don Mintz had some interaction with Keith, but really hadn't been in his role as Treasurer long enough to get familiar with the investments, and there had been many other matters requiring his attention. I think it is fair to say that the Members of our Club have been so focused on raising the funds for Stay in School, that there wasn't a broad understanding of the amount of funds that had been accumulated, and the fiduciary obligation and responsibility that goes along with administering a substantial pool of capital.

At the end of our lunch, Chas and I determined that at least once a year, the Board should be brought up to speed on what was happening with the Stay in School investments. It was too late in Chas' year to do anything, but one of the things I wanted to have happen in my year as President was a report to the Board by the investment manager.

Coincidentally, and to his credit, Keith Bekker called me. He was calling to express his concern about the Stay in School funds. Markets were changing, and with the current mandate he had for the funds, he was not comfortable with how the funds would perform. I told Keith that one of the things we were hoping to do in my year was to have a presentation from him to the Board. I asked him if he would attend our next Board meeting. Keith was ore than willing to speak to the Board, and he sent materials out in advance.

I had spent five years on the advisory board of CRCF, and I had served on the Foundation's investment committee. Michael Ruttan replaced me on the CRCF board, but thankfully, had a year of overlap on our Club's Board. At the time, Jim Fitzowich was Chair of CRCF, and had served on the Foundation's investment committee with me. Jim attended our Board meetings as President Elect of our Rotary Club. CRCF had recently undergone a review of its investment advisors, using a third party consultant. Jim, Mike and I were familiar with the process. On receipt and review of Keith's material, it was very clear our Rotary Club needed to undertake a similar process. Once Keith Bekker presented his material, and expressed his concerns given the current markets. Once Mike, Jim and I spoke about our experiences with CRCF, and once Don Mintz spoke about conversations he had with Keith and concerns expressed by Keith, everyone on the Board knew we needed to develop a plan to review our Club's investments and to recommend a path forward. Keith supported this initiative. He was willing to be involved and provide whatever information was necessary.

I was very grateful and this Club is very blessed that as I looked into the screen of Brady Bunch faces, there was one face looking back at me, that I knew could take on the role of leading the investment review. The Club is further blessed that Jim Fitzowich agreed to take on the role of Chairman of the Investment Review Committee. Jim is here today to tell you about the work of the Committee he Chaired.







#### **CLUB INVESTMENT POLICY PRESENTATION**

**SPEAKER: PRESIDENT-ELECT JIM FITZOWICH** Chair of the Club Investment Committee, presented the results of the recent review of Club investment policies. The Investment Committee mandate is as follows:

The RCCSP Investment Committee ("Investment Committee", or "RCCSP IC") has the following mandate and terms of reference established by the Board in March 2021:

- A review of the 3 collections of Investment Policy Documents (CRCF, SIS, Club Operating).
- A review of the corresponding funds' performance, including the intended purpose.
- ♦ If appropriate, a recommendation to the RCCSP Board on changes or consolidation of the 3 current Investment and Distribution Policies
- If appropriate, a recommendation to the RCCSP Board on changes or consolidation of the 3 current investment fund managers.

Committee options for considerations were:

- 1) Status Quo Leave "as is"
- 2) Change SIS Investment Policy direction to Richardson Wealth

Use CRCF Investment policy and investment mandate

RCCSP Investment Committee to prepare and propose different Investment Policy Statement (IPS)

3) Roll SIS Fund into CRCF

Pro's: Better returns at relatively low risk, existing governance structure and distribution policy in place.

Con's: Less RCCSP direct control over investment decisions and distributions.

4) Run SIS Manager review and selection process:

IC Committee to run RFP process with new draft IPS.

RWM to propose new "balanced fund" mandate proposal to replace current practice

Mawer solicitation to propose new "balanced fund" mandate proposal

In summary, the following steps were taken by the CIC. Luckily, CRCF had just completed an exhaustive and comprehensive review of its investment policies at great expense, and we were able to piggy-back on its experience and findings. The Club has 3 directors on the CRCF Board, so we are familiar with their process and deliberations.

The Club's old Investment Policies were reviewed:

A new IPS was proposed for Board approval incorporating CRCF and Manager Input

Performance of current funds (CRCF, SIS, Operating) were reviewed:

The Stay in School (SIS) fund management showed large gaps to other industry metrics and best practices.

The Committee conducted a competitive RFP process for the SIS funds:

1) Richardson Wealth: Balanced fund mandate2) Mawer: Balanced fund mandate

3) Mawer: Customized Fund within scope of proposed IPS

4) Alternate Option: CRCF

Approval of new IPS/Manager (Mawer) and Implementation Plan.

An updated Committee is implementing the new IPS and SIS investment strategy.

**Recommendation on current Reserve Accounts:** 

Leave "as-is" as they provide working and reserve capital for Club Operations







#### **CLUB INVESTMENT POLICY PRESENTATION: Continued**

**Richardson Wealth Management and Mawer** were chosen for the RFP because of their familiarity with Rotary and RCCSP in particular, local Calgary presence, track records and willingness to take on a fund the size of SIS (which is not large in relative terms). Criteria used for quantitative ranking of the proposals included 5 year return, volatility, distributions and capital preservation. The **Mawer Portfolio Options** had the highest cumulative rating.

At the December RCCSP Board meeting the following was approved:

Approval of a new RCCSP IPS:

Incorporated Manager RFP responses, and current CRCF and SIS IPS content. The new IPS is posted on the Club website for Member perusal. (Link to IPS Document)

Provided for "bespoke" RCCSP distribution policy: higher of 2/3 of annual gains or "floor" amount

Approval of a new non-CRCF Investment Manager subject to the new IPS:

Richardson Wealth: Balanced fund mandate
 Mawer: Balanced fund mandate

3) Mawer: Customized Fund within scope of proposed IPS

4) Alternate Option: CRCF

Approval of new IPS/Manager Implementation Plan.

New Club Investment Committee mandate and membership criterion

Implement new IPS and SIS investment strategy.

**Recommendation on current Reserve Accounts:** 

Leave "as-is" as they provide working and reserve capital for Club Operations.

The detailed process undertaken and the data/comparisons used to arrive at the Committee recommendations are detailed in the PowerPoint file that is available on the Club website.

This is a confidential document, so is restricted to Members Only: 2022 RCCSP Club Investment Policy
