President Ken Farn presented the annual mid-year review of Club activities and status.

- Dream Home: Despite weather concerns early in the week, overall results from the Dream Home and the new Split 'Em 50/50 exceeded 2015 results by about 20%, with a total revenue to the Club of \$578,000. Great results in a tough economic environment.
- SISP Golf Tournament: Another succesful golf tournament managed to avoid the extreme weather event on that day. Net revenue from the tournament, plus the annual contribution from the CRCF's earnings, has added approximately \$200,000 to the SIS Foundation, growing it from \$3.2 M to \$3.4M. This growth, if sustained, should allow us to reach the Steering Committee's goal \$4.0M in 3 or 4 years. The \$4.0M level for the foundation is considered to be self-sustaining in this low interest rate environment, provided we remain with about 40 students in the scholarship program.
- Family Picnic: We managed to slip a little fun into summer with our Olde Tyme Rotary Picnic and thanks to good weather and our hosts Bob and Carol Brawn, we enjoyed a wonderful day with Rotary friends & family at the Bow Valley Ranch. Response was great and as you know the social committee is planning to hold the event again this August.
- Country Thunder: Our first Country Thunder occurred in the third weekend in August and was a manpower challenge. However, we pulled it off even though we had fewer volunteers than required. We raised \$95,700 over the three days plus an additional \$20,000 net from our 50/50 lottery. Although stretched to the limit, we had a lot of fun volunteering and most volunteers are willing to do it all over again this August. The Steering Committee is already organizing other Rotary Clubs to help us make this year's event even more successful. Our plan is to make this a Calgary wide "Rotary Event" so that all clubs who volunteer can benefit.
- CRCF: A spectacular \$63,747 was donated by our members! A second installment was received from Mario Stella's estate and each one has been quite transforming! Last year's asset balance including Snuggs Endowment and Mario's initial \$1.0M contribution totaled \$3,928,000. Today's balance including a partial re-investment of last year's CRCF's dividend, a second transfer from Mario's estate, plus this year's generous member contributions of close to \$64,000 means the CRCF balance will approximate \$4.8M \$4.9M by June of 2017. This is a significant increase in capital, and in the near future, will generate dividends of well over \$200,000 per annum for Community Service work, as compared to this year's dividend of \$115,000.

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- Rotary International: RI Foundation's 100th anniversary will occur in June 2017 and all clubs were asked to make a special effort to support the many Humanitarian efforts of RI around the world. I am pleased to announce that we have also exceeded expectations. Contributions of \$38,400 for the annual Paul Harris Fellowship Fund and \$7,600 for Polio Plus has been collected. Both of these amounts exceed historical totals. So on behalf of your board of directors, we sincerely and humbly thank you for your amazing generosity! Please give yourselves a "well deserved" hand for all of your volunteer efforts to raise funds for community service and for your generous donations to CRCF & RI. It is amazing to see how our membership supports this club and why our club is so highly regarded in the District.
- **Stampede:** Also in December we received the final draft of the New CS Lottery Agreement which will be signed in the next few days. This is a three year contract and is an excellent agreement, as it covers advance ticket sales, which continues to grow, and a generous portion of the profits from the popular Split 'Em 50/50 Lottery and from the Dream Home. And all we have to do is sell DH & Split 'Em 50/50 tickets on the grounds.

Proposed Legacy Project

In December a memo and project summary was sent to you, outlining the merits of a New Legacy Project to succeed the Rotary Mattamy Greenway. Your Board of Directors passed a motion at the December 12th board meeting to approve the \$1.0M Rotary Atrium as our club's next Community Service Legacy Project. The word "Legacy" suggests "Long-Life" Rotary naming privileges as well as significant community impact.... and of course multiple – year funding commitment. Not-with-standing our club's sound financial position, the Board is required to present "multiple- year" funding commitments to the club membership for approval.

A motion was tabled to be debated and voted upon for a proposed Legacy Project for the next 3 years, the Rotary Atrium, a Rotary – Bethany Partnership.

The motion is as follows:

"That the membership of the Rotary Club of Calgary South (RCCS) hereby ratifies the Board of Director's motion as approved on December 12th, 2016 adopting the Rotary Atrium as our club's Legacy Project for Rotary Years 2016/2017, 2017/2018 and 2018/2019. This Legacy Project shall be supported by a three year financial comitment, payable to the Bethany Care Foundation for an amount not to exceed \$500,000. Such financial commitment shall be reviewed annually by the Board of RCCS to assess what portion of the funds up to the level approved are still required."

The Director' motion was as follows:

"That the Board approve the \$1.0M Rotary Atrium, being a District 5360 approved Legacy Project, to be built within the new Bethany Riverview Alzheimer Facility located in southeast Calgary, as our club's next community service legacy project. Rotary Club of Calgary South as the project's lead club, will provide funds over three contiguous Rotary years, beginning this year to an amount not to exceed \$500,000. Our financial commitment shall be reviewed annually to determine what portion of funds up to the level approved arte still required. This entire motion being subject to membership approval."

process to where it is now – ready for our action and commitment.

Aging and Dementia

We start aging when we are born

Rotarians are aging, we need to plan for our future and the future of all Calgarians.

Prevalence of dementia is 1 in 11 people by age 65

Prevalence increases with each 5 year increment of aging

By age 90, 50% have some form of dementia

It's not just older adults -15% of people diagnosed with dementia are under 65.

And it's about Caregivers too

Each diagnosis of dementia directly impacts at least 12 people

The effect on caregivers can be profound.

In Calgary 9% of older adults are caregivers and their health becomes compromised.

The need and the philosophy

Calgary – 13,000 people living with dementia and approximately 2000 dedicated dementia beds across a number of providers

It takes a village to raise a child and I challenge you that it takes a village to support a person through their dementia journey... and to care for those who care for them.

Bethany - 70 years of operation – from 19 beds in 1945 to operating in 7 communities and serving 2000 residents and their families; Bethany opened the first residential style dementia care site 15 years ago in the community of Harvest Hills.

The Art of the Possible

Imagine bringing outdoors into the indoors for those who can no longer access nature... imagine if it was you and you could no longer safely smell flowers, put your feet on grass, be surrounded by plants. Remind yourself of the commitment Rotary made to have the Rotary Mattamy Greenway become fully accessible for all Calgarians... but, we missed one specific group – those who have dementia....

Imagine a campus of care

Community supports

Integrated housing and care options

"Aging in Community".

4 way test to the Project

Is it the truth: The truth is dementia need is growing...

Is it fair to all concerned: It is fair to those who have dementia, and for those who love them... **Will it build good will and better friendships:** It is a terrific option to bring nature to people and people to nature in harmony. Bringing a friend to the Rotary Bethany Atrium will help sustain friendships...

Will it be beneficial to all concerned: Without a doubt – those who have dementia, those who love them and all Rotarians will wear this as a badge of honor and respect.

In the 2017/2018 and 2018/2019 Rotary Years, revenues are conservatively estimated to be \$665,000. Known funding commitments, without the Legacy Project, are estimated to be \$475,000. This leaves \$190,000 available to fund other commitments, including the Legacy Project in those two years.

President Ken opened the floor for questions and discussion

Ken Copithorne noted that he approves of the Project but asked if the process for selecting future projects could be reviewed to allow more Club member input?

The Strategic Planning Group will be asked to review the future process, but the logistics of involving the club as a whole are complicated. The current project has gone through our usual due diligence by the Board appointed committee and has been approved by the Board and incoming presidents.

Bruce MacDonald asked if the project was sustainable?

Our funding is for capital only, as part of a \$65,000,000 overall project that is already under construction and largely funded by a reputable organization. The Club is already committed to \$120,000, but no more if the motion is not approved. Operating costs are not in our mandate.

Earl Huson questioned why our annual commitment is not a fixed amount, as for previous Legacy Projects?

The problem is that, while other Rotary Clubs have come forward to commit funds, the Downtown Club has advised that their priorities may be changing. The level of their support is unknown at this time, so our level must be flexible, up to the approved maximum of \$500,000. It could be less, depending upon other funding sources.

Stephen Cobb made the point that perhaps Rotary international should be approached to shift its focus from polio to Alzheimer research in an effort to attack the problem at its source, rather than just treating the results?

A good idea in the long term, but right now we have a current problem that needs addressing.

Norm Legare asked if there is any danger of this beautiful new facility becoming an elitist centre that people could buy their way into?

Although patients do pay to live in the facility, they are assigned by AHS on the basis of need and not financial resources. Patients go where assigned, not necessarily where they want to be.

President Ken put the motion to the floor, seconded by Murray Flegel.

The vote was in favour of proceeding.



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President Ken Farn opened the meeting by asking **Lisa Fernandes** to accompany us in the singing of O'Canada and Rotary Grace.

President Ken introduced the head table – Director **Luanne Whitmarsh**, Treasurer **Larry Kennedy**, President Elect **Bill LeClair**, President Elect Nominee **Ron Prokosch**, and Sergeant at Arms **Jim Fitzowich**.

Visitors and Guests: Rod Bower introduced our visitors and guests. Today they included special guests **Emily Stokke**, incoming short term exchange student, **Sophie Neville** from Brisbane, Australia, and past Member **Rob van Haarlem**.

Health and Wellness: President Ken advised that **Leon Popik** was hospitalized with a stroke just before Christmas, but is now recovering at home. Calls and visits are welcomed.

Neil Pasricha was born in Oshawa, Ontario in 1979. His father comes from a small village near Amritsar in northern India and his mother is from Nairobi, Kenya. While at Queen's University, he wrote for the campus humor newspaper, *Golden Words*. This led to New York and writing for *Saturday Night Live* and *The Simpsons*. He returned to Toronto and worked for Proctor & Gamble in their marketing department. After this, he ran a Quiznos Sub franchise which he sold to attend Harvard Business School. After graduation, he ran Leadership Development at Walmart Canada. In 2015, Pasricha founded the *Institute for Global Happiness*. He has since left Walmart to devote more time to the institute.

In 2008, Pasricha began writing a daily blog called 1000 Awesome Things. In this blog, he offered an uplifting thought every work-day. His blog came out of a need to find positive things in life following a divorce and the loss of a close personal friend through suicide. In 2010, he published his first book, *The Book of Awesome*. He has since published several other books, including *The Happiness Equation* in 2016. In other work, Pasricha has spearheaded The Awesome Project - an initiative with book publishers and educators to provide more books and funding to elementary schools.
