She is you.


And she is me.

I have known and admired Mike since the mid-seventies when we were both at the U of C. Mike will speak about his personal journey as an immigrant and why we are all lucky and should be very proud to be Calgarians and Canadians. A little about Mike.....



Mike has lived his life following his personal mantra of “learn, earn, return”. In addition to being a FCPA, an entrepreneur and business leader who has served on many corporate and not-for-profit boards, Mike is a humanitarian, tireless volunteer, philanthropist, community leader and an exceptionally proud citizen of Alberta and Canada. He is also an elected senator-in-waiting under Alberta law.

Over the years, Mike has received a long list of honours. The following are just some of them.

- Calgary's citizen of the year
- Philanthropist of the year
- Immigrant of distinction
- Chair of the police commission
- Recipient of the Queens Diamond Jubilee medal and the Alberta Centennial medal
- Past president of the Kiwanis Club of Calgary
- The Rotary International integrity award.

Above and beyond all that, Mike has been married to Linda, who is a very elegant and friendly lady, for forty six years. They have three highly accomplished daughters – a physician, a lawyer and a CPA. Just as a glimpse of Mike and Linda's philanthropy, a few years ago they allowed to be public, their donations of a million dollars each, to the U of C, the Central Library and the Children's Hospital.

I too have been a recipient of Mike's generous spirit - I'll bet Mike doesn't remember this. On a very cold and stormy winter evening in 1974, I was bundling up at an exit at the U of C to go home. Mike came by and he was on his way home too. I barely knew Mike at that time. He asked how i was getting home and I told him that i had to take a couple of busses to Braeside. He asked me how long it would take and I said that if the busses were on time, about an hour.

I remember Mike immediately saying “you'll freeze out there waiting for busses. Come on, I'll give you a ride”. I am sure I didn't decline his offer too strongly. During the long, probably forty-five minute drive, I asked Mike where he lived. He said, by the university. I was stunned by the character of this man. Mike was a poor student then with probably very little money for gas. Yet, knowing how long it would take him to drive me all the way to Braeside and then drive all the way back to his home by the university, he very kindly and unhesitatingly gave me a ride.

SENATOR IN WAITING—MIKE SHAIKH

Mr. Shaikh spoke to his journey to Canada and his love of his adopted country. Yesterday was Canada's birthday. Today is my birthday I wish you all belated Happy Canada day. God Keep our land glorious and free. "Protegera no foyers et non droits"

I have been asked to you about the beautiful country we live in. Also, I have been asked to talk about my personal journey and the opportunities that allowed me to succeed and make our country richer and better for all.

I dislike talking about myself. So I will go quickly about myself to set the stage.

Born in Pakistan, I started to work in my Father's business when I was 11 years old. This became a full time day job, while I finished my schooling at night, 6 days a week. I always wanted to do my CA, applied to several countries and was very lucky to get an admission to U of C in Canada

My father had taught me a few lessons which I followed and have served me very well and has been foundation around which I lived my life.

First, LEARN from the mistakes and successes of yourself and others, EARN both a living and the respect of others, and RETURN to your community. Second, never rely on one source of income, and never work for someone else.

Ladies and Gentlemen, when I came to Canada. I felt that had landed in heaven. When I became a Canadian Citizen, and officially joined the Canadian family, I felt this immense pride. Most of all, I felt that the people were very nice. A clean country, with very little crime, protection of human right and property.

Our former PM Diefenbaker once said:

"I am a Canadian, a free Canadian.
Free to speak without fear,
Free to worship God in my own way,
Free to stand for what I think is right.
Free to oppose what I believe is wrong.
Free to chose those who shall govern my country.
This heritage of freedom I pledge to uphold myself and the mankind."

Friends. This is my Canada.

Our forefathers were very prudent to draft a Charter of Rights for Canada in 1867, which is now the envy of many countries. Several countries have adopted our charter (Israel, Hog Kong and some Eastern European countries). Mind you, we followed the Magna Carta, signed June 15, 1215.


Canada prides itself being a secular society that embraces diversity, treasures tolerance and respects all religions.

As Canadians, we have a major role to play in what happens in this country. I like to stress two things:

1. We must prepare and guide our young to be our future leaders. We can do this...by getting them involved in our community. We can do this.... by creating opportunities for them, and encouraging them to participate

We must do is to work together to build our nation. Let's take this opportunity to reinforce our commitment to champion DIVERSITY and make Canada the leader and model to end racial discrimination around the world.

Great leaders inspire action through mentorship and encouragement. Each of us has the ability to help prepare our youth to become our future leaders



SENATOR IN WAITING—MIKE SHAIKH

If you would let me indulge for a moment. I wish to say a few words about our parliamentary system. We follow the bicameral system with upper and lower houses. In our confederation in 1867, we adopted the Charter of Rights and designated the following Senate seats, in accordance with the configuration of the country at that time:

ONT 24
QUE 24
Western Canada 24 Man, Sask, Alta, BC, 6 each
Eastern Canada 24 NS 10, NB 10, PEI 4
Newfoundland, when it joined in 1949 demanded and got 6
And, each of the NWT, Yukon and Nunavut have been granted 1.
Total - 105

This is supposed to represent regional representation. However, it was based on the 1867 population base. Changes to the seat allocation would need change to the constitution. Which no one wants to take on – see Meach Lake 1987 and the Charlottetown Accord 1992.

The Senate's Job is to

1. Legislate ... Policies, listen to concerns
2. Investigate ... Issues referred to the Senate

Deliberate.... Full and careful consideration of bills brought forward by the House


We are like the House of Lords in the UK. USA changed to have Senate and Congress, both elected. Abolishing the Senate because of perceived ineffectiveness or partisanship is not the answer. Why? A majority government could then pass any laws without an opposition. I call it Autocratic rule, or TYRANNY of majority government. To do away with the Senate and leave the house of common all the power?????

Therefore, I put to you that the Senate is the place for second and sober thought. The role of the Senate is not to govern, but to hold to accord those who do.

My predicament is that Alberta has a law that our Senators will be elected, with the names passed on to the Prime Minister for consideration. Conservative governments have committed to assigning vacant seats to an elected person, but the Liberal government have reserved the right of selection to the Prime Minister who selects from a list of candidates who support liberal policies. Although I was elected with over 300,000 votes from Albertans, I have been waiting 8 years to fill one of the vacancies that have occurred during that time. At the age of 72, even if I was selected, I would only be able to serve for 3 years, until age 75.

I wish to be a non-partisan supporter of Alberta interests, but my time is running out.

Walter Flores thanked **Mr. Shaikh**. It is a pleasure to thank Mike you today on behalf of our brand new President, my fellow Rotarians and guests. What a treat it is to hear from such an accomplished member of our community. Like many of us that make up this great country, Mike immigrated to Canada, where he not only made this country his home, but more importantly, helped make it better with tangible contributions to the public and private sectors. These accomplishments are greatly recognized, including a Rotary International Integrity award. We can't wait to see him continue to make a positive impact in our country as a member of the Senate. Thank you Mike for all you have done and for what's to come and thank you dearly for sharing your day with us today.



President Penny also thanked **Mike** on behalf of the Club. In appreciation of his participation in our meeting today, our Club has donated \$100 to the Calgary Rotary Clubs Foundation. The return on these endowed funds will ensure our Club is able to serve our Community into perpetuity.

I won't do it every meeting, but from time to time, as I open our Rotary meetings, I will acknowledge THE LAND, the abundance it has provided, and express gratitude to its stewards who came before us, the members of the Treaty 7 Nations as well as the Pioneers who settled this great region.

Sergeant at Arms: Tom Walton was interrupted by technical difficulties, but later submitted the interesting information that he was going to test us on.


"The year the name Dominion Day was changed to Canada Day was 1982. The Prime minister at the time was the Right Honourable Pierre Trudeau.

The holiday was officially renamed as a result of a private member's bill that was passed through the House of Commons on July 9, 1982, two years after its [first reading](#). Parliament passed the bill in five minutes, without debate. Only 12 Parliamentarians were present when the bill was passed.

"What's in a name? That which we call a rose By any other name would smell as sweet;"


The Play is *Romeo and Juliet* and the words were spoken by Juliet. Canada Day or Dominion Day – it still smells as sweet"






