"I was fortunate enough to meet Michele about 15 years ago through her husband Blair. Blair and I met while we served on a community association board for a few years and have been friends ever since.

Michele worked for CIBC and Assante Financial Management prior to working with me. Michele was incredible at her day job of assisting me to serve my clients. But her passion was the stage. At night she performed in over 45 shows as a singer/dancer/actor. She is also an accomplished director and choreographer.

Michele's husband Blair began the Calgary Fringe Festival in 2006. Michele was involved as the volunteer office manager and box office coordinator.

In 2007 she kicked Blair out and took the reigns as the Director, then added the responsibilities of Producer in 2008. So she quit her day job and has been focused on the Fringe since then. Please give a warm welcome to Michele Gallant. "

Michele began by asking: What is the Calgary Fringe Festival?

It is an indoor theatre festival that starts on the August long weekend and lasts for 9 days.

Four Core principles of a Fringe Festival:

1. Fringe Festivals are un-juried (artists are selected by lottery draw or first come, first serve).

2. Fringe Festivals are uncensored (only thing we ask

is (1) artists give plain disclosure to patrons as to their show content and (2) as long as artists aren't breaking the law, they can put whatever they want up on stage).

3. Fringe Festivals are accessible to artists and audiences.

4. Fringe Festivals return 100% of the ticket price to the participating artists.





The beginnings of Fringe:

- \Rightarrow The first Fringe Festival started in Edinburgh, Scotland in 1947 as a post-war morale booster.
- ⇒ The first Canadian Fringe took place in 1982 in Edmonton, with the help of the City of Edmonton. Today, Edmonton Fringe Festival is the 2nd largest Fringe Festival in the world. Last year the ED-MONTON FRINGE: 850,000 + attendees. \$ 1.2 million in box office sales went back to the artist.
- ⇒ In 1994, the Canadian Association Fringe Festivals (CAFF) was established as the governing body for Canadian Fringes with 32 (and counting!) Fringe Festivals across North America.

Calgary Fringe Festival Beginnings:

- ⇒ In 2006, Calgary hosted the first Fringe Festival between 17 Avenue and Downtown locations. In 2007,the Calgary Fringe Festival was re-located primarily in Downtown Core, with theatre venues at the Glenbow Museum, EPCOR Centre (Arts Commons) and the #1 Royal Canadian Legion.
- \Rightarrow 2008 saw the Calgary Fringe Festival put down some roots in historic Inglewood with most of our theatre venues within walking distance.
- ⇒ The current Calgary Fringe is now a full-length 9-day Fringe, and is situated in the calendar between the Winnipeg Fringe and the Edmonton Fringe Festivals.

Impact on the City:

- ⇒ In 2010, the City of Calgary invited arts groups and organizations in for a meeting. In that meeting, they asked for our help: they said, "Calgary is becoming known as a great place to work. But we also need to be a great place to LIVE." Went on to say as non profit / charities, we can do this work much more effectively than they ever could.
- ⇒ Around that time, an independent consultant agency interviewed various artists, arts groups, and organizations ... and one of the questions asked was why is arts relevant in our city / society? Why should Calgarians care? One of the representatives from an arts organization said "I HATE having to answer that question, over and over again." But to me, it was an important question that we needed to be able to answer. We needed to be able to clearly demonstrate why we ARE here. We needed to be able to illustrate the impact we make on our city, in our businesses, in our community, to our citizens, and to our society that makes what we, as an arts focused organization, so relevant and necessary.
- ⇒ In 2012, Calgary was voted the Cultural Capital of Canada. That designation came with a \$ 1.6 million federal government grant. It's part of a national program to recognize special activities in Canadian municipalities that harness the benefits of arts and culture in the community.
- ⇒ In 2014, Calgary was named by the New York Times as one of the Top 52 places to visit (# 17) because of our amazing reputation for award-winning public art. 78% of public art presented was created by local Calgary artists.
- \Rightarrow In 2015 16, 80% of Albertans attended an arts event or activity.

Impact to our Artist:

Fringe Festivals' foster true **Entrepreneurial Spirit** in their artists:

- ⇒ Artist Payout Median in 2016 was \$ 2,500. The artists pays a nominal fee to be a part of our Festival.
 \$ 700 gets them 6 performance timeslots over the 9 day Festival, a performance venue w/lights, staging, and sound, and full technical, box office, and marketing / promotional support.
- \Rightarrow Artist keeps 100% of the box office receipts (less GST and ticketing surcharges).
- \Rightarrow We promote the Festival as a whole. The artists are in charge of promoting themselves.
- ⇒ We are an **UNCENSORED** theatre festival. Which means the artists are free to choose to put on to the stage whatever they want, however they want.
- \Rightarrow Anyone can participate! We don't segregate. Anyone with any level of experience can join.

Impact to our Citizens:

- \Rightarrow AUDIENCES: all tickets affordable. All venues accessible.
- ⇒ RECONCILIATION: talk about T'suu T'ina nation Chile Elementary School and their version of the Jungle Book.
- ⇒ DIVERSITY: Nearly 25% of Calgarians are foreign born, with close to 120 languages spoken. 12,000 new immigrants come to Calgary annually, and in 2010, was the first city in Canada to have elected a Muslim mayor.
- \Rightarrow INCLUSIVE: anyone can do shows. Anyone can see shows. Anyone can volunteer.

Gena Rotstein thanked Michele Gallant and noted that the Fringe festival is very timely now due to the economic contribution it makes to our city. When she lived in Ramsay and Inglewood she saw it grow over time and it is quite a gem. It is one of Calgary's best kept secrets. Thank you for coming today and sharing your time. See you at the Fringe!

President-Elect Ron added his thanks to the Speaker: "On behalf of the Club, I would like to add my gratitude for the time you have spent with us today. Because of your presentation today. We have made a \$100 contribution to the Stay in School Fund in your name.

This Edith's Checkerspot butterfly was quite striking.


