She co-founded Calgarybased Evoco, leading the innovative SaaS firm from initial concept through to a 2012 acquisition. Evoco's technology became the

standard construction management system for global retailers including Walmart, Home Depot, and Staples. Most recently, Alice was the CEO of Chaordix, a pioneering software leader in the crowdsourcing and open innovation space, with global clients including LEGO, Procter & Gamble, KPMG, and IBM.

Alice was the recipient of PROFIT's W100 designation as one of Canada's Top Female Entrepreneurs and was named one of Alberta's 50 Most Influential People for 2013. Alice was recently awarded the 2016 Rod Charko Service Award, established to recognize an individual who has gone above and beyond to enhance the technology ecosystem in Alberta.

Dilan Perera began talking today by saying It is a pleasure to introduce our newest member **Dave King** to my fellow Rotary Club Members. Dave was sponsored into our club by **Past President Bob Brawn**. Dave's Dad, **Frank King** sponsored me and **Bob Brawn** seconded my application for membership, I was thrilled to second Dave's application.

Dave will talk about his family, his Rotary history and his professional life. so, I won't steal his thunder. Dave <u>won't</u> talk about his personality and character, so I will. When we return to our clubhouse and you get to know him, you will quickly realize that Dave is clearly a man of principle and high integrity. He has that rare combination of intelligence, business savvy and excellent people skills.

Even though he has accomplished a lot already, Dave is down to earth and humble. To give you an indication, I asked if he would like to be introduced as "David" or "Dave", he said, "we are all friends, let's go with Dave". Dave has a sense of fun about him and a genuine kindness toward others.

I have also seen Dave step up, take charge and display strong leadership during a very difficult time for his family, when Calgary had a devastating flood. those of us who were privileged to know Frank, and know Jeanette, can clearly see that the apple has certainly **not** fallen far from the tree. Dave King began today by saying that "I'm happy to be sharing some background on myself and my family and a bit of the road to joining Rotary".

My parents **Frank and Jeanette King** have been long time Rotary and Rotary Partners members. I grew up hearing stories of them going to Brazil, or some other exotic place, and having dinner with fellow Rotarians. This was a constant theme, and it always left me wondering: "Can you really go on a trip around the world and have Rotary friends there?" I joined so I could find out...and so far, I believe it!

My sponsor for joining RCCSP was none other than Uncle Bob. **Bob Brawn** and his wife **Carol** are my god parents and have been friends of my parents since their university days. I come by a love for Rotary and its mission, because I have some of its finest people in my life.

I was born in Edmonton, and promptly convinced my parents to move to Calgary when I was 2 years old. I spent a lot of time in sports, with competitive downhill ski racing on the Lake Louise team (not as good as **Spencer Tonkinson** of course!), and track and field. During my high school years, I was in pretty good shape, and my skiing claim to fame was a race at Sunshine Village that started at the lodge, had the racers run up the Strawberry run, put on their skis and boots at the top, and ski down. I won that race, and also beat Ken Read, the legendary Crazy Canuck. Naturally, it's been all down hill since then! Today I still run, and along with a couple of half marathons with my daughter, I was training with my dad to run in the Huntsman Masters Games in Utah when he passed away two years ago.

I met my wife Christine in Grade 9, and after a few years, I finally convinced her to marry me. We've been having a blast for 30 years now! We have a 25-year-old daughter Zoe, who is a U of C graduate with a Software Engineering degree.

Her grandfather was always so pleased to have another engineer in the family. Our extended family in Calgary is led by my mom Jeanette, sister Linda and her family, little brother Steve and his family as well as Chris's younger brother Mike and her mom and dad, Rick and Dauna. Away from Calgary, our true love is Maui, where we surf, paddleboard, and scuba together as often as we can.

I was lucky to grow up in a household that had no boundaries on what you could achieve. Whether it was running with the Olympic torch, or watching Uncle Bob grow business after business. Today I carry that same enthusiasm and can-do attitude with me.

After dropping out of Engineering at the U of C, a point my engineer daughter reminds me of regularly, and switching to Economics, I pursued roles in technology companies and started my career at Xerox, and then Compaq Computer. From there I built an electronics manufacturing company with a friend, and we became the 7th fastest growing tech company in North America in the late 1990's We did 6 rounds of financing and took it public on the TSX, complemented by 3 acquisitions, and my love of building companies was secured.

Today I am working on a project to help diversify the Calgary economy. For about 3 years we've been working on a blockchain technology company dabbling in both software and hardware in the United States. Fast forward to the collapse of oil and gas prices and we realized that we could leverage Calgary's skills and natural resources to build a high tech and clean tech company right here at home.

We are building high tech liquid immersion data centers that we prototyped over the past 2 years. We generate our own power in the field with natural gas-powered generators to operate high performance computer clusters for artificial intelligence and machine learning. Our computers actually sit in large tubs of special heat transfer mineral oil to cool them, so we can put over 300 computer servers in 300 square feet of space. We save 60% in operating costs, and 80% in real estate costs, and we are building them here with plans to export to world markets.



We are partnering with SAIT, the U of C and the U of A to serve their research needs and expose student and researchers to world class computing. Why build a gas pipeline, when we can use our abundant natural resources, turn it into high demand compute...and export our services over the internet...with a world leading, made in Alberta solution.

I joined Rotary because every one of you I have ever met has been warm, heartfelt, fun, and giving. I hope that I can live up to the standards of this club for many years to come, and I thank you all so very much for having me.

At the end of Dave's presentation, **President Penny** welcomed his mother, **Jeanette King**, to our meeting. It's was great to have her present.

Dear Rotary Partners:




