

DR. DRU MARSHALL: IGNITING INTERNATIONALIZATION



Benno Nigg introduced our guest speaker, **Dr. Dru Marshall**. Dr. Marshall is the C.O.O. of Igniting Internationalization and the Provost at the University of Calgary. Dr. Marshall has her PhD specializing in obesity in children. She is very associated with sports, being named Coach of the Year from 3M, and twice nominated as the most influential woman in sport.

Dr. Marshall opened her comments by sharing that there is such a good feel in the room. She has been to many meetings where this doesn't happen so we should cherish it. Dr. Marshall apologized that prior to the University of Calgary, she spent 30 years in Edmonton at the University of Alberta. She knows we can imagine the competition and how for 30 years, she focused on distancing herself from Calgary. But she has seen the light, and is now very passionate about our city.

The U of C is on the rise. Were ranked #1 in terms of youth in North America, and #9 in the world. The university just celebrated its 50-year anniversary on April 29. The Internationalization strategy was passed in 2012, and launched in early 2013. That strategy has set the U of C on a different path. Why should we care about internationalization? Because Calgary wants to be a top university and become a global hub. All of the challenges we face today need different cultures and expertise and experience from different countries.

Eyes High is a wonderful motto for a strategy in which the goal is to become one of the top five universities in Canada.

Out of the Eyes High strategy, Dr. Marshall and a colleague created the academic and research plan – that being Internationalization.

The plan has four goals: increase diversity, increase cross cultural competencies, increase academics and research partnerships with key institutions around the world and last, continue our long history of international development

The strategy realized that we can't be all things to all people. Our world is big and resources are limited. So the countries of emphasis were identified as USA, Mexico, Germany, China, Tanzania, and the Middle East.

The first goal: 10% of our undergrads will be exchange students. These are additional students and pay more than Albertans and Canadians attending the U of C. Exchange students enrich our academic environment - Calgary is the 4th most diverse city in Canada.

Cross culture means exchanges going both ways – our students going away to other countries on organized trips, and U of C receiving academic teachers from other countries.

The partnership with China is very interesting – a 2 plus 2 program. Students study two years in China, and two years here, and end up with a degree from both countries. A 2 plus 3 program, adds a year in Calgary so students earn their masters degree.

Our research strategy is tied with international strategy. U of C is seen as an energy university producing energy leaders in companies. Focus is on clean technology and environmental sustainability. We have labs in Beijing, where students are learning world-wide about different energy strategies.

Mexico is our second site – opening a new lab there. The federal government in Mexico has provided \$12M for Mexican institutions to work directly with the U of C. Researchers from both universities are working together.

Then there is the campus in Qatar dedicated to nursing. Over 500 students are working towards their Bachelor of Science in Nursing and their Masters in science. These students and graduates are fundamentally changing health care in their region.

The fourth goal, expanding international development, is an exciting program in Tanzania, with a number of projects like safe water, environmentally friendly projects and poverty-related issues. This program just received a \$14M grant from CEDA.

Jim McNeil thanked Dr. Marshall by saying that great universities need great leaders – under the current leadership the U of C has been able to attract outstanding community leaders and an engaged university population. Thank you for visiting us, and helping to make our university even greater over the next 50 years.

A donation of \$100 for the Stay in School program was made in Dr. Marshall's name.

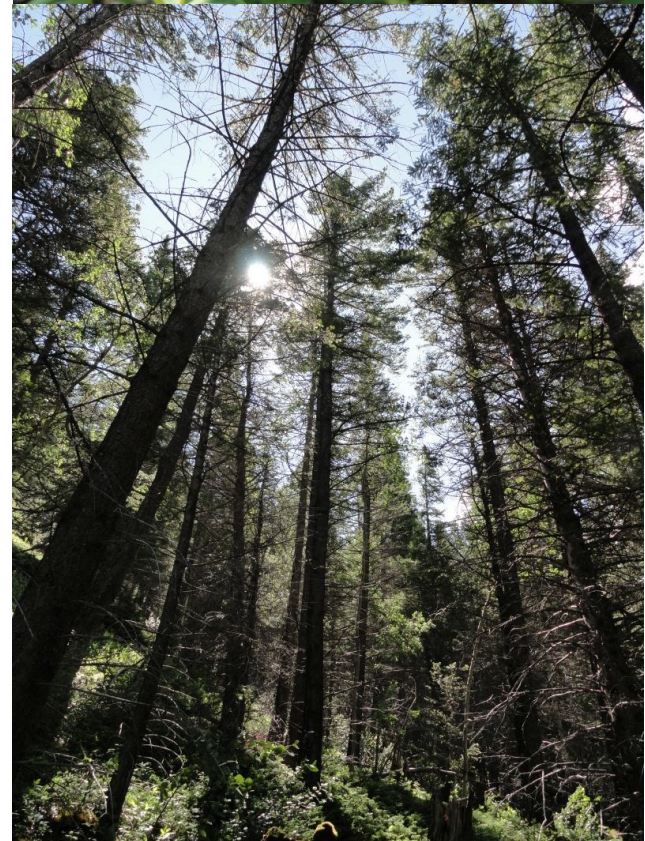


HIKING CLUB
